

WAR PRISONERS MAY SEND AND RECEIVE GIFTS

War Department Tells How to
Communicate With Men Held
by Enemy.

ADDRESS MUST BE PLAIN

Sender Must Also Place on Con-
tainer His Name and Address
and Sometimes Relationship.

Washington, July 1.—For the information of friends of American soldiers who are prisoners of war, the war department has prepared the following circular relative to the possibility of communication with them:

Prisoners of war are entitled to receive and send letters, money orders, and valuables, as well as parcels by post (not exceeding 11 pounds in weight), when intended for international mail, free from all postal duties.

Domestic Mail and Money Orders

Domestic mail and money orders are subject to the regular postage charges and money order fees, respectively, as no provision is made for the free transmission in the domestic mails of the United States of matter mailed by a prisoner of war in this country to a person residing therein, nor for the mailing by a person in this country of matter addressed to a prisoner of war who is detained in the United States.

All mail should be plainly addressed to the prisoner of war, giving his rank, full name, and the name of the prison camp where held (if known), followed by "prisoner of war Mail, via," New York." Mail intended for prisoners of war of enemy countries interned in the United States should be addressed to them by name, followed by the designation of the war prison barracks where interned.

Name and Address of Sender

In addition, all prisoner of war mail should bear the name and address of the sender written in the upper left hand corner, and in the case of parcel post packages the relationship of the sender to the prisoner of war addressed should be clearly stated, immediately following the sender's name. Parcel post packages for prisoners of enemy countries may not be sent by organizations or societies, and only one such package per month may be sent to any one prisoner of war, the limit of weight for each package being 11 pounds. If more are received, the one apparently from the prisoner's next of kin will be forwarded and the others held in New York pending communication with the sender, with whose consent such excess packages may be forwarded to some other prisoner of war who, in that particular month, has received no package from any source. If such consent be not given the packages will be returned to the sender.

List of Permissible Articles

Only the following articles may be included in packages sent to prisoners of war: Belts (not made of leather), brushes (hair, tooth, shaving and shoe), buttons, candy (hard), cigars, cigarettes, comb, crackers or biscuits, gloves (not made of leather), handkerchiefs, knife (pocket), needles and thread, pencils, pens, soap (solid or liquid mouth wash), towels, underwear, personal photographs, periodicals published prior to the beginning of the war. Letters and parcels received for, or dispatched by, prisoners of war will be subject to careful censorship.

MERGER IS PROPOSED OF LOCAL TELEPHONE COMPANIES' HOLDINGS

Home Company Bondholders
Make Move; Permission of
U. S. Officials Asked.

Consolidation of the Home Telephone company with the Pacific Telephone Telegraph company, for the sake of public economy and to safeguard the interests of the bond holders of the Home company, which is now in the hands of a receiver, was today proposed by the Portland and Los Angeles bond holders of the automatic system.

The bond holders have asked the department of justice at Washington, D. C., to consent to the merger and a copy of the petition has been presented to the mayor and commissioners of Portland.

The city is asked to lend its indorsement to the plan.

The Home company bond holders have also started negotiations with the Bell line officials.

Former Action Held Invalid

The petition states that the Bell company has already taken over telephone concerns of other cities and that Portland is the only place of any size where the people are compelled to carry the burdens of two telephone systems.

Owing to the fact that the control of the Northwestern Long Distance company, secured by the Bell interests, was declared a violation of the anti-trust act, the Pacific system disposed of its acquired holdings in this company and promised the department of justice not to absorb any more independent concerns without the approval of the department.

This is the reason for the appeal to the federal authorities. It is also recited that the competitive conditions between telephone companies originated before the era of public regulation of telephone rates and service and that, with the new regime, the public is able to protect itself against unjust charges. The petition further says:

Organized September 11, 1905. "The Home Telephone & Telegraph company of Portland, Or., was organized September 11, 1905, for the purpose of taking over a certain franchise, permitting the construction and operation of an automatic telephone system in the city of Portland, which was granted to Charles E. Sumner with the approval of the voters at a municipal election held on June 6, 1905. "The Home company has an authorized capital stock of \$4,000,000, of which \$2,674,708.33 has been issued. A bond issue of \$4,000,000 was authorized, of which \$2,924,000 are outstanding. The plant was taken over from the construction company by the Home company on April 1, 1908, and paid for in bonds of the company, together with a like amount of stock as a bonus. No money has gone into the plant from stock sales, as all improvements, extensions and renewals have either been covered by monies received from bond sales or from earnings of the company."

BAND CONCERTS ASSURED

City Council Decides to Add Music to
Park Attractions.

Municipal band concerts in Portland's city parks became an assured fact for this summer when the city council at a special meeting today agreed to go ahead with the musical schedule. Park superintendent Keyser will announce the musical program in a few days. It is stated, however, that the first of the series will be given at Washington Park next Sunday at 3 p. m.

It is planned to have 32 concerts during the season, in conformity with the usual summer schedule. The first appearance of the municipal park band, of which Percy A. Campbell is the director, will be on the Fourth of July, when the band will participate in the big street parade.

The members of the city council had hesitated to have music in the parks this season because of the war necessity of economy, but it was decided that the people were entitled to the entertainments especially during the war period.

JITNEY BUS ASKS AN INCREASE

Commissioner Mann Believes Linnton
Request Unjustified.

Operation of jitney buses on the Portland-Linton run is not profitable on the basis of a 10-cent fare, according to L. H. Kapture, possessor of a temporary permit to run on the route. Kapture appeared before a special meeting of the city council this morning and asked permission to increase the fare beyond the 10-cent limit. The mayor referred the request to Commissioner Mann. According to the stand taken by Mann, however, the advanced rates asked for are not warranted, and the request will be turned down. Kapture was granted this permit to operate just before the council last week voted against the Kapture amendment which was intended to eliminate the jitney franchise provision of the present city ordinance.

PROPOSAL MADE FOR ONE CENT TOLL FOR SOLDIERS ON BRIDGE

Threat Made to Call Off Military
Police Unless Toll on the
Bridge Is Removed.

A proposal to reduce the Interstate bridge tolls for army officers and enlisted men to the nominal sum of 1 cent was proposed as a remedy by Chairman Rufus C. Holman at a meeting of the commission this morning. If Attorney General Tanner of Washington holds that the Clarke county commissioners have no authority to reduce the tolls, the question of this big toll reduction for soldiers will be taken up immediately on a different line, it was agreed.

No other action with reference to the tolls was taken, as the commission will await the legal opinion of the Washington state attorney.

Mayor Baker attended the session and when it was brought out by Chief of Police Johnson that the 30 military police who police streets of Portland daily will be called off unless bridge tolls are removed, he agreed to have this question taken up at once by the city council.

Plans for the regulation of jitneys between Portland and Vancouver were discussed and referred to District Attorney Evans of Multnomah county, and District Attorney Blair of Clarke county, for solution.

Speeders along the Oregon approaches to the bridge will be arrested and heavily fined if they persist in their fast driving. Sheriff Hurlburt agreed to station a motorcycle deputy there for the protection of the public. It was brought out that 13 lamp posts have been destroyed by reckless drivers.

THREE MACHINES RETURNED

Police Find Motor Vehicles Which
Had Been Stolen.

Quick and efficient work by the sheriff's office brought back to their owners three machines, although one of them was a total wreck.

A motorcycle, the property of Joseph Thomas, was found by Deputy Sheriffs Rexford and Lamont on Buckley avenue and Gilbert road.

A Chevrolet car, belonging to Ben Hayden of Vancouver, was found on Buckley avenue near the Sandy road. A money belt containing \$27, presumably the property of the thief, was found in the car. It will be returned to him, if he will call at the sheriff's office, they say.

A car stolen from the Russell street garage, the property of W. W. Cole, was found at the bottom of a 30-foot bank, a complete wreck.

COUPLE CONFESS ARSON

McMinnville Man Laid Fire Which
Wife Later Lit.

Deputy District Attorney John Collier returned this morning from Tillamook where he had gone to investigate an arson charge placed against Arthur R. and Ethel White of McMinnville who were suspected of setting fire to a barn at McMinnville with the intent of recovering \$1800 insurance. The man and wife confessed to firing the barn insured as well as another barn. Mr. Collier reports the husband was at Tillamook getting out spruce for the government. On one of his occasional visits home, he confessed, he prepared the fire which his wife later lit. They were endeavoring to get money to pay off a mortgage on their home, they said. No criminal charge has yet been placed against them.

WOMAN AWARDED DIVORCE

J. D. McCann Brings Suit for Divorce,
Charging Misconduct

Irene Carry was granted a divorce from F. O. Cray by Circuit Judge Gatens this morning. Cruelty was the basis of the suit. The defendant was ordered to pay her \$400 in monthly installments of \$12.50 beginning July 4. She was given permission to resume her maiden name, Neelands. J. D. McCann began suit for divorce against Louise C. McCann, alleging that she had a habit of leaving home and visiting another man. They were married at Vancouver, Wash., in 1911. He asks to be decreed the owner of two lots in Montavilla and to be awarded the custody of two children aged 6 and 8 years.

Police Man Is Arrested

F. C. Freiberg, a motorcycle policeman, was arrested late Saturday night by Deputy Constable Watkins on a warrant charging him with having violated the rules of the road in not keeping to the right hand side. He was released on deposit of \$50 cash bail. Freiberg, it is said, ran into an automobile a few days ago on the Canyon road, injuring a little girl, who was in the car, quite severely.

CONGRESS PASSES 35 BILLION DOLLAR APPROPRIATION BILLS

Largest in World; All Except
\$4,500,000,000 Goes for
War Work and Loans.

Washington, July 1.—(U. P.)—The world's first \$35,000,000,000 congress was a reality today when the last appropriation measure of this session was introduced in the United States house of representatives. Including loans to the allies expenditures authorized at this session totaled \$35,189,000,000.

The appropriations are divided as follows:

Army bill, \$12,089,000,000.
Navy, \$1,659,000,000.
Loans to the allies, \$7,000,000,000.
Sundry civil expenses approximately \$3,000,000,000.
Fortifications, \$5,500,000,000.
Shipping, \$2,500,000,000.
Railroads and war finance corporations, \$1,000,000,000.

tions, \$1,000,000,000.
General deficiency bill, \$992,000,000.
Ordinary governmental appropriations, \$1,448,000,000.

This sets a new record for legislative appropriations. The bulk of this money is for strictly war purposes. The sundry civil and ordinary appropriation bills, totaling less than \$4,500,000,000, are the only measures appropriating funds for other than war work, and they are much higher than they would be in peace times.

The allied loan appropriation was increased by \$1,500,000,000 in the new bond bill just passed by the house.

Most of the general deficiency bill is for the "military establishment." This includes \$712,232,817 for clothing and camp equipment and \$13,936,554 for construction and repair of hospitals.

The house appropriation is raised from \$60,000,000 to \$110,000,000.

An appropriation of \$8,215,730 for the navy is also carried in the bill which will likely be rushed through today.

Sundry Civil Bill Approved
Washington, July 1.—(U. P.)—The house has approved the conference report on the sundry civil bill, carrying nearly \$3,000,000,000 appropriations for the shipping board, food and fuel administrations and other departments.

The most important change in the bill since it was passed by the house is one increasing the war labor board's appropriation from \$1,000,000 to \$1,500,000.
