

PENITENTIARY TO GET \$35,000 FOR DEFICIENCY FUND

Senator Mosier Refuses to Allow Full \$70,000 Asked Without Senator Wood's Sanction.

LIME BOARD GIVEN \$5000

Board Declares \$10,000 Needed, but Lime Can Be Turned Out at \$1.50 a Ton October 1.

Salem, July 5.—At a meeting of the state emergency board here today, Warden Murphy of the state penitentiary asked for an appropriation of \$70,000 to run his institution during the balance of the year. Because of the opposition of Senator G. C. Mosier the board refused to vote the full amount at this time, but instead voted to authorize the prison to incur a deficiency of \$35,000, with the understanding that a further appropriation will be considered at a future meeting of the board.

That the penitentiary was squarely up against it for funds was revealed by the statement made by Frank Davey, bookkeeper at the institution, which showed that only \$900 is left out of \$100,000 appropriated by the last legislature for the maintenance of the prison.

Senator W. D. Wood, chairman of the senate ways and means committee, and Robert N. Stanfield, speaker of the house of representatives, were absent, and Senator Mosier said he would not vote for the \$70,000 appropriation, which would be more than one third of the entire amount allowed by the last legislature for maintenance of the prison, without a hearing from Senator Wood.

Places Burden on Wood. He insisted that Senator Wood, as chairman of the ways and means committee, should share the responsibility of voting more funds for the institution. But in order to meet the immediate needs of the prison, he agreed to support a motion to allow the prison \$35,000. This amount was carried by the unanimous vote of the five members present.

State Treasurer Kay said that a meeting of the emergency board would have to be held probably in October to consider needs of other state institutions, and at that time the question of allowing the prison additional funds will be taken up. An effort will be made to have a full attendance of the board members. The statement made by Frank Davey showed that the cost of maintaining the prison the last six months was \$60,135, while Warden Murphy pointed out that the increase in cost of supplies, in salaries, expense at the prison work camp, expense of maintaining convicts employed at the state lime plant, all contributed to exhausting the appropriation before the end of the biennium.

He said he had promised the guards another raise in wages if it was approved by the governor.

Lime Board Gets \$5000. Replying to the question from Representative K. K. Kubli, Governor Withycombe said he considered the state was confronted with a serious situation financially as a result of the failure of the war emergency fund measure to get on the ballot by initiative. He said he intended to counsel with others in regard to the advisability of calling a special session of the legislature to put the measure on the ballot.

The emergency board also voted a deficiency appropriation of \$5000 for the state lime board.

A. B. Cordley, chairman of the board, asked for \$10,000, and Governor Withycombe made the motion to allow that

sum. The governor, Secretary of State Olcott, State Treasurer Kay and Representative Kubli voted for the motion, but Senator Mosier voted against it. Senator Mosier's vote killed the motion, as five members are required to authorize an appropriation.

Governor Withycombe declared that this action was an injury to the \$150,000 industry in this state, as the farms were badly in need of lime.

Senator Mosier then moved to allow \$5000, and later it is shown that the farmers will buy and use lime—more funds can be allowed to complete the plant as desired. Senator Mosier also declared he wanted Senator Wood to share the responsibility in this case.

The motion was adopted.

Chairman Cordley said the \$10,000 he asked for was needed to build terminals, elevators and bunkers. With but \$5000 he said the bunkers could not be built. He said if funds were provided lime would be turned out ready for the farmers by September 1, which would be in ample time for next year's use. The plant being built will have a capacity of 100 tons daily, he said, and he estimated that farmers would take all the lime produced. He declared under present conditions the plant could not be duplicated for less than \$35,000. It has cost \$20,000. He said lime would be furnished farmers at \$1.50 a ton, f. o. b. Gold Hill.

Only the strongest endure it for long. I stood it two hours my second time.

"At Trent the famous martyr Battist was tied to a cart and dragged through the city. Officers spat on him and their wives jabbed him with batons and umbrellas. A Czech soldier, moved by the sight, shouted: 'Long live Battist! Long live liberty!' He was at once arrested and shot. Battist was hanged. Masses of trenches destroyed."

"Today the neighborhood of Trentino is destroyed. Only two months after the outbreak of the war the Austrian government found it necessary to assure the people that only 14 per cent of Italian soldiers had been killed."

"This percentage has increased at a high rate. In defiance of the law classes which could not be called up in other sections of Austria were called in this district. Even the women were mobilized and sent to work in the trenches, where many of them were killed. More than 100,000 of our people, a third of the population, have been interned."

Women Are Mistreated. "At Aidena, a village in the Lagarina valley, the major in command was in the habit of making the women who had remained pass in line across the square. He chose the one that pleased him best, and if she did not submit she was given 25 lashes and then interned."

"Damiano Chiaso, an old schoolmate of mine, sentenced to death, was placed in front of a firing squad and tortured for 10 minutes while the command to fire was withheld."

"Wounded and discharged soldiers are interned and the separation allowances are not paid their families. 'It is our conviction that unless we smash Austria the strongest claim of a dominant race to the right of tyrannizing over the world will be made good.'"

British Bring Down Ten German Planes

London, July 5.—(U. P.)—Ten German airplanes were accounted for by British airmen Wednesday, according to the British official communiqué. During the day and night 16 tons of bombs were dropped on enemy targets.

"On July 3 the weather was cloudy and enemy activity was slight," the statement said.

"Our machines carried out a number of reconnaissances. Six hostile machines were destroyed and four were driven down out of control. During the day and the following night we dropped 16 tons of bombs on the railway junctions at Lille and Courtrai. Our machines returned safely."

REMEDIAL TREATMENT IS PROPOSED NOW FOR MEN NEEDED IN ARMY

Draft Board Member Believes Aid of Experts Could Be Obtained in City.

A plan to give corrective and remedial treatment to the men rejected for army service because of slight physical deficiencies is being suggested by various members of the local draft boards as a solution to the problem of finding men to fill their quotas.

J. Thorburn Ross, of local board No. 2, said Friday that while the boards were too busy at present to undertake anything along this line, he thought money could not be better expended.

"Most large cities have base hospitals where some of this corrective work is being done," said Mr. Ross, "and while Portland has no base hospital, I believe the surgeons would be willing to give their services if some means could be found for furnishing the necessary material. I believe that dentists would do the bridgework if there was a fund to furnish the filling."

Present physical regulations are so stringent that many strong, healthy men are being rejected because of such minor defects as one-half inch too short or a pound under weight, which should be easily remedied.

The money spent in transportation to and from army camps in the case of rejections would go a long way, thinks Mr. Ross, toward remedial work, and help make a splendid race of fighting men.

Local boards are exercising extreme care with the men who are to entrain July 23, in order that the large percentage of rejections made in the last selective service quota from the state will not be repeated by army physicians.

Tribute to Pershing Paid by Home Town

Laclede, Mo., July 5.—(I. N. S.)—Here in Laclede, where he was born, General John Joseph Pershing Thursday was paid high honor at a history-making Independence Day celebration. Two scores of his old Linn county school and playmates, who still know him as "Johnny," were among the thousands who paid tribute to the Missouri soldier.

From a platform in the newly christened "Pershing Park" the general was eulogized in speech and song. Thousands listened, standing upon ground over which the bare feet of the boy Pershing once patterned.

Ban Is Lifted From Small Steel Orders

Washington, July 5.—(U. P.)—Slight relaxation in the strict government control over steel distribution was made by the war industries board today. Hereafter orders for steel not in excess of five tons to be used in essential civilian work may be filled without written consent from the director of steel supply at Washington. Blanket authority is still held over all other steel orders, however, and individual written approval of each order is necessary before manufacturers of steel may make shipments.

25,000 Armenians Reported at Erivan

Amsterdam, July 5.—(U. P.)—Twenty-five thousand Armenians have occupied Erivan, according to a Vienna dispatch received today.

Erivan is situated in Russian Armenia, about 100 miles south of Tiflis.

Deportation Story Told in Chicago Trial

A. S. Embrey, One of Men Taken From Bisbee, Ariz., in July, 1917, Relates Experiences With Deporting Mob.

Chicago, July 5.—(U. P.)—The story of the wholesale deportation of 1,100 men from Bisbee, Ariz., in July, 1917, was told in federal court here today as part of the defense of the 100 leaders on trial here today.

A. S. Embrey, witness for the defense, one of the deported, told the story. He testified he was herded with scores of others into a boxcar, by armed men, who, he alleged, were employed by the copper mining companies.

"We didn't get water for hours," Embrey said. "We were imprisoned in a park for a while. Our guards over-turned some tubs of water and told us to drink out of the puddles. Some 1,100 of us were bused and there were broken arms. Soldiers treated us all right when they took charge of us. We had tents and plenty of food."

Among spectators today was John Ross, of Portland, a writer, lately recorded as arriving in this country from Russia. He sat with the defense attorneys.

FRENCH FINANCIER VISITS; M. CASENAVE TALKS SHIPS

submarine warfare till the end of the war.

Ship Building Gets. "France expects to get 6,000,000 tons from the United States. The increase in activity in American shipyards allows us to expect that, on the whole, the problem will be near its solution. On the Pacific coast only one shipyard was working in 1916. There are 18 yards now, and are producing 250,000 tons a month in steel shipping. The Atlantic and Gulf coasts will produce 300,000 tons a month and the Great Lakes district, 150,000 tons. The output of all could be pushed to 800,000 tons a month from the tonnage of wood and concrete ships. Looking at these figures one can hope that the problem of transportation, the war's leading problem, has been solved practically."

M. Casenave left Bordeaux, France, bound for the United States, the day the Lusitania was sunk. He returned here to attend the interallied war conference last November. That event, he says, was the first assembly of the war mechanism in the allies, and even after it was held the public of the allied nations did not and does not realize what minute complications war involves. M. Casenave had spent many years in China, where he raised his grounding in finances of a public nature.

"America's part in the war," he said, "has been one of salvation. America has lightened the financial burden of France to such an extent that her own part in the fight has been made possible. Heavy credits were secured for the allies in America by American money, thus solving a nation set to but one accomplishment—victory."

Lieutenant Verdier tasted Hun barbarity three days after French mobilization was complete. German "Big Blacks" began their three days after he reached the trenches as a private.

"The Big Blacks were disagreeable then, but now they are nothing. We had no ordnance to combat them then, for the 300 pieces of artillery were as nothing. Today we have 6000 pieces of heavy ordnance in service and 15,000 pieces of artillery altogether. The French can put 2000 pounds of ammunition over a front of one yard in from four to six days. With such support our battles are easy."

At the first battle of the Marne we thought 20,000 shells fired in a day was wonderful and a maximum of attainment. Today French munitions factories are turning out 300,000 shells daily. Our offensives are backed by heavy artillery at every 35 yards, with light guns between, giving us a field piece at every eight yards. Our last great offensive was at Verdun. The hard part is not the fighting or the taking of trenches when we have good artillery backing, but in holding the trenches we have taken from the Boche."

Yankees Stand Like Veterans. "I was in Paris on leave the first time the German long range gun dropped her shells. They make about the same hole as the German 15. It is a depression about one yard wide. Night air bombardments are more demoralizing than the fire of the long range gun, but the latter is annoying to workmen, for it fires during working hours."

"When my division left the trenches in Lorraine we were relieved by American boys. When they filed into the pits the old French poilus said: 'These boys are beautiful, well groomed and splendidly uniformed and they spend money like millionaires. But will they stand the trenches?'"

"They did stand—stood like veterans. I saw them at Lorraine taking the fire of the Big Blacks just as well as the French soldiers had. I saw American boys landing at a French port from a former German ship. They were helped off by German prisoners. We passed 12 troop trains coming west. In all cases your boys act and are received just as the French were. The girls appear at stations to bid them God-speed in the same way."

Close Sympathy Between Nations. "Indeed, there is much sympathy between the two nations and with that existing understanding between the boys of France and America is natural. It is amusing to hear the attempt to speak to one another. But the Americans are learning rapidly. The French poilu talks largely with his hands, and thus makes himself understood, too."

"I can say that the feeling between the two armies is splendid. The American boy in France is received as well as the French soldier is in America, and that is saying a great deal."

"France mobilized an army of 1,500,000 men, of which 2,000,000 are dead or incapacitated. We are keeping our 45-year-old men in the trenches now. Your young men, with the spirit of our first 'iron' divisions, are doing wonders to encourage them and keep up the good fight. The quality of your men counts as much to us as their quantity."

"Oh, killing the Boche and other actions. But the great war medal in the world today is the service pin worn by the fathers of American boys who are in the trenches, or about to go there."

MILITARY TRAINING AT WILLAMETTE U. REGARDED ASSURED

Professor Darden and Five Students Ordered to Training Camp at Presidio.

Salem, Or., July 5.—Professor W. A. Darden and five students will go from Willamette university to officers' training camp at Presidio, San Francisco, to receive military instruction, beginning July 12. Appointments were made by Dean George H. Alden in response to orders received from Adjutant General McCain at Washington. This is taken to mean that military training for Willamette university is assured, and Professor Darden and five students will be assistants to the military instructor to be assigned by the war department.

Dr. Carl Gregg Doney, president of Willamette, is now in Washington for the purpose of obtaining approval of the war department to establishing military training here.

Five students designated to go to the training camp are Harlan Hunt and Ralph Barnes of Salem; Francis Cramer of Westport; Y. Louis Stewart of Althea; and Harold Dimick of Woodburn.

As Ralph Barnes is already in Wisconsin attending military school it is likely he will not be able to go to San Francisco, in which case Dean Alden announced that Oscar D. Olson of Woodburn would be appointed.

Students who take military training at Willamette will be regularly enlisted soldiers, subject to call of the president at any time, but with the assurance that they will not be called until they finish school unless grave emergency arises.
