

# IT'S 'GOOD MORNING MR. ZIP, ZIP, ZIP,' FOR O. A. C. GIRLS

Training Detachment at Corvallis Sings to Co-Eds on Way From Breakfast Each Morning.

## RESULTS PLEASE OFFICERS

Technical Training Progresses Smoothly and Next Course Will Have 600 Men.

Corvallis, Or., July 6.—The girls at the O. A. C. dormitory now have their own morning reveille to the tune of "Good Morning, Mr. Zip Zip Zip" or "Pull Down the Shades, Mary Ann, Mary Ann," given by the soldiers of the O. A. C. training detachment of the national army as they march by Cauthorn hall between 6 and 6:30 in the morning.

And there are now 250 voices because there are 250 men in the infantry detachment, stationed on the campus, who are giving five hours a day to instruction by college professors in blacksmithing, carpentering, radio work and auto mechanics. Then regular military drill comes from 6 to 6:30, 7:30 to 7:50 in the morning and from 3:30 to 5:20, 7 to 8 in the afternoon.

This detachment will be at Corvallis till August 15, when they will be scattered wherever men of their training are needed, to the various training camps or to France. The college has contracted to care for 500 men beginning August 15, and the government has asked it 100 more in addition can be handled. A barracks building housing 600 men is being built; this will contain kitchens, and a smaller separate building will have bathrooms and an infirmary. So far the men have no uniforms, but the groups are distinguished by colored arm bands. However, a telegram has announced that the suits are on the way. Blue denim are the official uniform for all working parties, and most of the class work requires their use.

**Athletes Have Part**  
The commanding officers are Captain W. L. Toose Jr., First Lieutenant Charles E. Morio, adjutant, and Charles L. Robinson, and Second Lieutenant William J. Beach, all of whom were transferred from Camp Lewis. The medical officer is Lieutenant Charles M. Frase from Fort Stevens, and the dental surgeon is George M. Hoffman of Portland, who is seeing his first service.

"First class ball team" is the description of the baseball nine which Captain Toose is coaching, according to Professor H. C. McDowell, who has charge of the recreational work. He is planning track meets, boxing matches, basketball games and races.

The business men of Corvallis have equipped the baseball team. Captain Toose cannot praise them too highly for their cooperation in all things. "They certainly have come through, too much can't be said in their praise, and for the women's club, too." That organization has entertained the soldiers at several dances, and the motor club has taken all the men out over the surrounding country.

The detachment is stationed on the campus by government contract in which the college agrees to take complete charge of the meals. In place of drill work, by turn three or more each day act as dining room caretakers. Should someone commit a breach of military discipline, one means of punishment is to assign him to kitchen duty during the free week ends.

**Boys Heavy Eaters**  
The overseer of the kitchens makes out a week's menu ahead of time and submits it to the captain for his approval. The dining room is in Waldo hall, one

of the girls' dormitories, where the kitchens are equipped with dishwashers, electric freezers and patent potato peelers. The 250 men eat about 100 loaves of bread a day together with hot breads. For shortcakes, between three or four crates of berries are used. "The boys eat no more than the school girls as far as I can see," states the overseer.

Following is an average day's menu: Breakfast—Mush, creamed codfish, hash, coffee, bread and butter; dinner—beef and dressing, potatoes, beans, steamed cherry pudding; supper—Spanish brown beans, brown bread, sauce, salad and tea.

A card bearing the message, "The gym floor is fine for dances," and addressed "To the soldier boys," has perhaps urged the formation of a jazz band. The officers say that if the card had been addressed to them "she" might have gotten quicker results as they are required to pass on all such action. Time for such entertainment is limited, however, the men not being allowed off the campus except from Saturday noon till Monday morning reveille.

## MANUAL IS ISSUED IN SERIAL FORM TO AID FOREST FIRE RIGHTERS

Fire Laws, Telephone Building, Trail Construction and Other Work Covered.

"The Western Fire Fighters' Manual," issued in serial form by the Western Forestry and Conservation association, in cooperation with the district forest service, for the use of all fire wardens and patrols, men on construction work, forest supervisors, forest rangers and others connected with fire fighting work, has made its appearance.

"The Fire Fighters' profession," by E. T. Allen, secretary of the association, is the title of the first chapter. It explains the firefighters' profession, the purpose of the manual and the relation of the officer to the public. Other chapters following, most of them not yet published, deal with fire laws, telephone building, trail building, lookouts, tools and equipment and fire fighting.

**Trail Building Is Explained**  
"Trail Building" is the work of R. S. Shelley, former deputy supervisor of the Oregon National forest, but now supervisor of the Sitka National forest. In this pamphlet the trail expert takes up the location, construction and maintenance of trails, explaining all the details with diagrams and illustrations.

The latest chapter to be issued is "Telephone Construction and Maintenance," by Clay M. Allen, telephone engineer in the district forest office. Mr. Allen goes thoroughly into the forest telephone problem, treating with crossings, transpositions, underground crossings, installations, material and apparatus in a thorough fashion, with appropriate diagrams and illustrations.

**Telephone Is Important**  
The importance with which the telephone in forest work is regarded by forest officials is proved by the fact that 800 miles of telephone lines have been constructed in the national forests of Oregon and 1600 miles in the forests of Washington.

The manual is being issued in serial form for the greater facility of the fire workers, who may fasten one or more chapters in loose leaf note books when needed.

One of the chapters being prepared is by William E. Ober, Jr., on his fire finder, which has been adopted as the standard instrument by the United States forest service.

**Enlisting Boy Army**  
Denver, Colo., July 6.—(U. P.)—The boy's division of the Denver Y. M. C. A., of which J. G. Arnold is secretary, is asking every boy to spend his summer vacation in productive work, preferably in food production. The national war garden commission is cooperating, and furnishing the boys with canning and gardening manuals.

## PRIVATE CAPITAL IS NOT AIDING IN HOUSING PROBLEM

Herbert Gordon of Chamber Committee Says Conclusion Nears That Government Fund Needed

## INVESTMENTS DO NOT LURE

E. B. MacNaughton Makes Address Before Civic Club; Matter Will Be Put Up to Schwab.

"Private money is not going to meet Portland's housing problem," declared E. B. MacNaughton, Portland architect, speaking before the legislative council of the Oregon Civic league at the Hazelwood, Saturday afternoon. "We have to call upon the government for help."

"We ought to do it immediately. We have already lost time, and the fact that, mistakenly, we announced some months ago we would handle our own housing problem and would not call upon the government for aid is being used against us by our neighbor to the north, as it makes the application for funds which we have neglected making."

Herbert Gordon, chairman of the joint housing committee of the Chamber of Commerce and the Board of Trade, said the committee has just about reached the conviction that local capital will not swing the housing matter. Lloyd Wentworth, district officer of the shipping board, he added, has recommended that a man be secured who can work from the shipping board office in stimulating house construction and in aiding the financing of proper housebuilding companies. Such a man is now being sought, Mr. Gordon announced.

**Investors Slow to Respond**  
The housing committee recommended that a company capitalized at \$250,000 be financed, partially through subscriptions of business leaders and largely through popular subscription, but has so far been unable to induce the essential preliminary subscription. Mr. Gordon said that property-owners have been having a hard time for several years to get proper return on their investment, and now, with prices for both material and labor sky-high, they are reluctant

to tie up money in housing investment. Mr. MacNaughton doubted if ever again there will be any particular eagerness to get into real estate again. "The European convictions against the unearned increment and speculative profits are reaching this country," said he. "The gamble and the unearned increment have largely given the real estate business its lure, and I do not anticipate that there will be a great deal of eagerness about it in the future. At the same time we are compelled to reckon with the fact that we have a great increase in our industrial population. Aided and abetted by the war, between 10,000 and 15,000 by autumn—which means 35,000 more people on the

most conservative estimate—and we must prepare to provide them with shelter that will not be shacks nor barracks, but permanent and attractive homes."

**Question for Mr. Schwab**  
Both speakers advised that strong presentation of Portland's claims and needs be made when Charles M. Schwab, head of the shipping board, arrives in Portland within the next few days.
