CHRISTIAN CHURCH
OPENS CONVENTION
AT TURNER MEETING

Twenty-ninth Annual State Assembly in Progress; Will Continue for Two Weeks.

The twenty-ninth annual state convention of Christian churches of Oregon opened last night at the convention tabernacle at Turner. A representative gathering is already on hand and today a banner crowd is looked for. The morning session will be delivered by Rev. Samuel J. Backster of Yakima, Wash., and tonight the Rev. H. O. Breeden, D. D., of Los Angeles will preach. At the communion service this afternoon, when many hundreds of people are expected to be present, the Rev. S. M. Conner, now of Portland, a veteran preacher of Indiana, will preside, and some 60 deacons will assist.

The feature of the week will be the patriotic services to be held on Tuesday, when Governor Withycombe and Judge L. T. Harris of Salem will give addresses. The service flags of the Christian churches of the state will be unveiled during the afternoon, and the dedicatory speech will be delivered by the Rev. Harold H. Griffith, pastor of the First Christian church of Portland. In the evening a splendid patriotic pageant will be presented by the Christian Endeavorers, entitled "Keeping the Flag Clean."

Wednesday the Christian women's board of missions will hold its sessions, reports will be given by the state officers, and the annual election will take place. Mrs. J. A. Bennett of Silverton, wife of the minister at that place, is the present president, and Mrs. C. J. Kurts of Portland is secretary and editor of the state missionary paper. Many addresses of special importance and interest to missionary workers will be given. Other departments of church work will be held forth during the week, and will be featured by lectures and symposiums. Among the prominent persons present to take part in the convention sessions, in addition to those already named, are Rev. A. McLean of Cincinnati, president of the foreign society; Rev. W. F. Turner and Roy K. Roadruck, both of Spokane, Northwest representatives in church and Sunday school work; Mrs. Clara G. Eason of Forest Grove, dean of Oregon Sunday schools; Rev. Clarence F. Swander of Portland, state secretary, and others.

Rev. F. C. Porter of Salem, president of the Oregon Christian missionary convention, is now in service in France.

KING ESTATE SELLS
BUILDING TO UNITED
BRETHREN CHURCH

Three Story Building at 160 First Street Sold for \$15,000; Other Sales Reported.

One of the most important sales of the week was the transfer by Frank L. McGuire of the three-story brick building at 160 First street from W. D. King and other heirs of the King estate to the board of trustees of the Woman's Missionary society of the Church of the United Brethren in Christ. Headquarters of the United Brethren are maintained at Huntington, Ind.

The second story of the First street building will be used as a meeting place for a Chinese mission by the new owners, the ground floor being rented for business purposes. The missionary society expects to take possession at an early date.

The lot on which the building stands is 25 by 100 feet and is described as the south one half of lot three block three, city of Portland. Consideration amounts to \$15,000 in cash. The property had an assessed valuation of \$14,500 in 1917.
