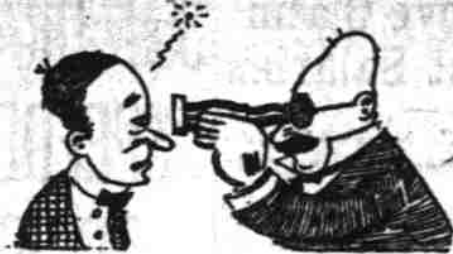

ST. HELENS TEAM AND CORNFOOT'S STILL TIE IN SHIPYARD LEAGUE

Foundation Club Loses Hard-Fought Contest to the Down River Team and Cornfoot Wins Easy Game From Supple & Ballin; Grant Smith and Standifer Are Winners.

UTTING across their fifth straight victory Sunday, the Cornfoot and St. Helens clubs are still tied for the leadership of the Columbia-Willamette Shipbuilders' Baseball League. The Cornfoot tilters defeated the Supple & Ballin team on the Vaughn street grounds by the score of 10 to 3, the St. Helens players nosed out the Foundation team in a hard fought contest, 5 to 4.

The Standifer-Clarkson team defeated the Peninsula club and the Grant Smith-Porter team annexed its first victory of the second half of the season by winning from the Columbia River Shipbuilders' company team, 13 to 1.

Next Sunday, the Cornfoot team will tackle the Standifer-Clarkson team on the Vancouver grounds, while the St. Helens team is billed to battle Columbia River tilters. If both teams should win next Sunday they will still be tied and they will fight it out for the leadership between themselves on the following Sunday.

Cornfoot Wins Easy Game
Pearl Casey's Cornfoot team had little trouble connecting with the slants of Pitcher Mench of the Supple & Ballin team and was returned winner by the score of 10 to 3 in a seven-inning contest. Eight hits, including three doubles, a homer, gave the winners their runs.

The fielding of the losers was very poor. Shortstop Woods booted five grounders.

Rutherford pitched a fair game, easing up after his team mates had piled up a big lead. The five hits he allowed were bunched in two innings and accounted for all the runs scored by Supple & Ballin.

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Hornsby Case May Be It Likely to Force an Issue

New York, July 8.—(I. N. S.)—Interest in baseball circles concerning the application of the "work or fight" order to the National Pastime is centered today in the case of Roger Hornsby of the Cardinals.

The star shortstop of the St. Louis Nationals has received notification from the draft board at Fort Worth, Texas, to engage in some essential occupation or be classified in Class 1-A. Hornsby has announced his intention to appeal the case on the ground that he has a dependent mother.

Baseball men here are inclined to believe that a ruling in the Hornsby case by draft officials at Washington may bring about a definite interpretation of the status of ballplayers under General Crowder's ruling, and a decision, one way or the other, will be received with satisfaction, as it will relieve the suspense under which baseball clubs are operating.

President John K. Tener of the National league, is quoted today to the effect that the Hornsby case may furnish the test for which baseball men have been waiting, and he has indicated that the National league will welcome a decision.
