

COUNCIL WOULD KNOW WHAT SORT OF SERVICE MERGER CAN PROMISE

Telephone Consolidation Question Will Be Studied by Members of City Commission.

Consent of the city council to the proposed merger of the Home Telephone company and the Pacific Telephone & Telegraph company, will depend upon what assurance of an adequate service will be given under the consolidation plan, according to the views of the city commissioners, expressed at today's council meeting.

Full investigation of the proposition by the mayor and commissioners was decided upon and a report on the merger scheme will be ready for consideration by the council next Friday morning at 3 o'clock.

"I must be assured that the telephone service of Portland will be ample to take care of the present demand, before I will agree to the merger," said Commissioner Mann, who declared the present service objectionable. He suggested that the people voted to grant the Home company the franchise, they should also be given a chance to vote on the merger.

Commissioner Barbur advised that before any action is taken by the council, a joint meeting be held with the representatives of the Home company and the Bell company.

Advance information on the kind of service to be given under the merger plan was also demanded by Commissioner Bigelow.

Representing the bondholders of the Home company at the meeting were: R. S. Howard, chairman, and H. H. Hoffman. Other bondholders' committee members who have joined in the petition for consent to the merger are Jefferson Myers, Dr. K. A. J. Mackenzie and Frank Branch Riley.

Ex-Governor Oswald West, receiver for the Home company, is now on his way to Washington to present the merger petition to the department of justice.

Commissioner Kellaher is author of resolutions designed to have the city take over the Home property if suitable terms can be arranged.

INTERNEES GIVEN INCREASE

Council Raises Salary of Men Offered Better Positions.

Consolidation of the medical departments and the city and county hospitals will be sought by the mayor and city commissioners. According to Commissioner Barbur, the two departments should be merged for the sake of economy. A meeting with the county commissioners will be held to determine upon the feasibility of the consolidation.

The question came up at today's meeting of the council when City Health Officer Dr. George S. Parrish pleaded for an increase to \$85 a month for the two internes now employed at the city emergency hospital. An ordinance granting the increase was passed.

Appointment of a woman attendant at the emergency hospital when a vacancy shall arise was insisted upon by Commissioner Kellaher. The ordinance was passed granting the salary rise on the recommendation of Commissioner Mann as a means of keeping the two internes from leaving to accept more remunerative employment elsewhere.

O. A. C. Will Send 24 Men to Be Trained

Score of Students and Four Faculty Members Are Offered Opportunity as Assistants of College Drillmasters.

Oregon Agricultural College, Corvallis, July 10.—Twenty students of the Oregon Agricultural college, who will be in attendance next fall and four faculty members will be sent to the Presidio for 60 days of intensive training, beginning July 15, to fit them for assisting the three or more regular army officers who will have charge of training students in the military unit which will be established at the college in September. Men who care to serve the government by taking advantage of this special training at the Presidio, are asked to apply to President W. J. Kerr immediately that their names may be forwarded to the war department. Expenses including housing, food, uniforms and railroad fare will be met by the government, and pay at the rate of \$30 a month will be allowed.

TACOMA, TOO, LACKS HOUSING FACILITIES, SAYS BUSINESS MAN

J. M. McCormack, Merchant,
Tells of Industrial Activity of
Puget Sound City.

Tacoma is experiencing the same lack of housing accommodations that prevail in Portland, says J. M. McCormack of the McCormack Brothers department store of Tacoma, who is in Portland visiting his advertising manager, Herbert W. Little, a patient at the Portland Open Air Sanatorium.

"Tacoma now has a population of 16,000," said Mr. McCormack. "There are five big shipbuilding plants employing about 15,000 men. All industries are thriving, wages are high, houses are scarce and hotel facilities are taxed to the limit. Merchandise sales are heavy, patrons being willing to pay the increased prices. Difficulty in getting the goods is a handicap to the merchant."

"With the advance in the streetcar fare rates to 7 cents, the transportation troubles are ended and the patrons seem willing to pay the price. One reason may be that the company has doubled its service."

"Camp Lewis is bringing money into Tacoma. The highway to the camp is being hard surfaced and widened on the double track plan. Traffic is very heavy on the road now. I have seen a string of cars with only five or six feet between the machines running from the city to the camp. Morals of the city are greatly improved."

Mr. McCormack pays a word of praise to the industrial activity of Portland. The McCormack Brothers have a branch store at Seattle.

Vancouver Project Is Again Rejected

Washington, July 10.—(WASHINGTON BUREAU OF THE JOURNAL).—Efforts by Senator Fiske to obtain further consideration for a deep water project survey to Vancouver, Wash., have proved unavailing.

In conference with General Black, chief of engineers, and Colonel Newcomer, of the rivers and harbors board, the question was reviewed. The answer returned was that the survey does not come within the terms of the war emergency required by the rivers and harbors bill of last year. General Black seemed to think the claim is sufficiently near Vancouver for land connection to be made for accommodation of industries.

EARLY CLOSING HOURS FOR DRUG STORES IN SUMMER IS ADVOCATED

Oregon State Pharmaceutical
Association Starts New
Movement.

There will be no more ice cream orgies at the corner drug store after 9 o'clock at night—or 10 o'clock Saturday—if the druggists of the state follow literally the decision of the Oregon State Pharmaceutical association, adopted this morning at the convention in the Multnomah hotel.

The resolution reads: "In the interests of conservation of man power as well as fuel and light, it is advisable for druggists to close earlier in the evening, as well as at least part of every Sunday. The president of this association is hereby directed to call upon all Oregon druggists to adopt closing hours not later than 9 p. m. on week nights and 10 p. m. on Saturdays, with one fifth of their usual hours on Sundays during the season between October and April inclusive."

H. F. Brandon New President
H. F. Brandon of Portland was unanimously elected president of the association for the ensuing year. Other officers elected were: J. C. Perry, Salem, first vice president; E. A. Robinson, Portland, second vice president; N. E. Reed, Bend, third vice president; A. W. Allen, Portland, secretary; B. F. Jones, Portland, treasurer.

Retiring officers are: W. Hal McNair, president; H. F. Brandon, first vice president; E. A. Robinson, second vice president; J. C. Perry, third vice president. Mr. Allen and Mr. Jones were re-elected to their offices.

Milton A. Miller, collector of internal revenue, addressed the druggists on the alcohol situation and its relation to the druggists, explaining the law affecting the use of alcohol and answering questions on the subject.

Picnic lunches, races, throwing contests, bowling contests, horseshoe throwing and other contests are a part of the program. In the afternoon speeches will be given by Mayor George L. Baker, W. F. Woodward, W. K. Newell of the food administration and A. G. Clarke, with dancing in the evening.

At the business sessions Tuesday, talks on conditions in the drug business were made by Mr. Woodward, Mr. Purcell, Ross Plummer and J. E. Dunn.

Resolutions were passed favoring the merging of all national associations interested in the drug trade into one strong association, and endorsing the Edmonds bill, creating a pharmaceutical corps in the army.

A committee was appointed, which will cooperate with the national association committee of the National Association of Retail Druggists.

Dater Head of New Forest Department

P. H. Dater, formerly city engineer of Portland, has been put in charge of the office of engineering of the district forest office by an order effective Monday. Mr. Dater was formerly with the forest service.

The change of the office of engineering from under the direct supervision of the district forest office to a distinct branch by itself is a move long contemplated by the forest service. The Washington office adopted it several months ago. Mr. Dater will have charge of maps and surveys of the forest service.

Henry Crosby Emery Interned in Germany

London, July 10.—Professor Henry Crosby Emery, who was a member of the Root mission to Russia and who was arrested by the Germans on the island of Heligoland, and has since been held as a prisoner, is now interned at Darmstadt. It is learned by way of Amsterdam. Diplomatic efforts to secure his release are said to have failed.

U. S. to Send Only Trained Men Oversea

Space Too Cramped in France for Training of Recruits; Cantonments in America to Be Enlarged.

Washington, July 10.—(U. P.)—Only seasoned men, trained at least six months on American soil, are to be sent to France under a new program being worked out by the war department. Enlargement of several cantonments to accommodate thousands of additional men is part of this plan. The present practice of rushing troops across with only three weeks' or more training is to be abolished now that a fighting force of considerable strength has been placed on the allied lines.

With over one million men in France, facilities there are becoming more burdensome and there is little room for untrained troops. Under the new policy draftees will be put through an extensive six months' training course, the unit selected out of the remaining fighting men sent across for a short finishing off behind the lines.

IDAHO AND MONTANA FIRES THREATEN TO BURN LARGE AREAS

Much Land Already Burned Over
and Hundreds of Men Are
Fighting Spreading Flames.

Lewiston, Idaho, July 10.—(I. N. S.)—Forest fires in the reserve southwest of Orofino are spreading, and calls for more men to fight them have been sent here by P. M. Lamoreaux, assistant supervisor at the Orofino station. Nearly 200 men are fighting the fire on Rocky ridge, 60 miles southwest of Orofino, and between four and five sections have been burned over.

On Trail creek, 40 miles east of Pierce city, 70 men are on duty and 50 men left here last night to reinforce them.

Supervisor Howell of the Kootenai district reports that a fire has burned over 2000 acres. Along Rhoda creek a fire 600 acres in extent is being fought. Gedyne Creek has a fire zone of a thousand acres. About 400 acres are burning. More than 150 men are battling flames in these localities.

Supervisor S. G. Pullaway at Grangeville, reports a number of small fires, but no serious damage.

Most of the fires, according to reports, are in old burns. Smoke from the Montana fires, mingling with the smoke from Idaho fires, fills the sky and makes the work of fire fighters difficult and exhausting.

Another Russelite Sentenced to Prison

Seattle, Wash., July 10.—Frank Shaffer of Everett, alleged business manager of the International Bible Students' association of Everett, was sentenced this morning by Federal Judge Jeremiah Neterer, to two years and six months at McNeill's Island.

Shaffer was arrested by the United States mails to circulate volume seven of Pastor Russell's forbidden book, "The Finished Mystery." He has filed notice of appeal.

Masked Men Deal WITH A SEUFERT

Iterated, called upon Arthur Seufert between 10 and 11 o'clock on the night of July 2, and forced him to accompany them to a pre-arranged rendezvous. There, under pressure of stern adjuration and sterner looking weapons, Seufert signed the pledge prepared for him, a promise to buy \$1000 worth of War Savings Stamps before January 1, 1919. Such was his initiation into the Limit club.

As a result of his activity in his efforts to determine the identity of the vigilantes who handled the case of young Seufert, F. A. Seufert Sr., the father, has received warning that he may expect drastic action if he carries his investigation too far. In retaliation, Seufert senior has closed the Seufert cannery and properties to the public, and offered through the newspapers, a reward of \$100 for the name of the man who held it; \$100 for the name of the man who offered it; and \$100 for the name of the man who carried it.

"All friends and all strangers are warned in the future when driving into my cannery and cannery to stop when ordered to do so by my employees, who have been instructed to let no one pass unaccounted for," reads Mr. Seufert's published warning, which continues: "We are now called upon to produce as much food as we can for our government and our people, and we can do so only by the use of our cannery. Any malicious person so inclined could cause us a vast amount of trouble. For this reason I hope that the people of this vicinity will not feel ill of me, as this has become necessary to avoid trouble."

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The trouble started when Detective F. A. Murray tried to quiet the soldiers. Murray was badly hurt. Three of the soldiers, Privates Ernie Taylor, Philip Kane and Arthur Raymond, all western men, were arrested. The others fled.

Reed College Men To Go to Presidio
