

TEAL URGES THAT MOVE BE MADE TO GET GOOD SERVICE

Advices That City's Right to Transcontinental Train Be Taken Up With Officials.

NEW RATE PLAN PREDICTED

Says Time Coming When Mileage and Value of Service Rendered Will Become Basis.

That Portland should strongly urge before the director general and regional director of the federal railroad administration the recognition of this city's right to a transcontinental train service, along with other Pacific Coast terminals, was advised by Joseph N. Teal in an address before the Portland Traffic and Transportation association Wednesday afternoon at the Chamber of Commerce.

"The understanding, when the Northern Pacific was assigned to handle the passenger traffic of Portland, was that the North Coast Limited train would be run through to Portland," said Mr. Teal. "What Portland is getting is a stub-end service, while the transcontinental train continues to run through to Puget Sound. This gives Seattle the transcontinental service and the question is, 'What Portland is getting is a stub-end service?'"

Question to Be Brought Up
Regional Director R. H. Alshon of the railroad administration is expected in the city next week, and the question will be laid before him. If Director General McAdoo comes to Portland it is the intention of the commercial interests to submit the question of discrimination to him also.

Mr. Teal's address dealt fundamentally with the changes in traffic administration that will grow out of the unification, simplification and elimination of duplication incident to government administration of the nation's lines of transportation.

Any element to prevent the development of water transportation where it can serve the needs of traffic either better or in relief of rail lines. No longer, he predicted, will it be possible for rate cutting and other destructive forms of competition to destroy water transportation. Trolley, auto truck and boat, he said, can each have its own opportunity.

Scientific Basis Is Predicted
He predicted, too, that the time is nearing when rate making can and will be on a more scientific basis, and will be governed more by mileage and the value of the service rendered. Mr. Teal referred to some of the evidence given as to the past methods of rate making.

One expert testified, he related, that he had fixed rates by intuition. Another stated that the cost of rendering the transportation had not at all figured in the rate fixed for that transportation.

"The future tendency is inevitable that rate making will be more largely based on mileage and the cost of the service," said Mr. Teal. "Never again will it be possible to name rates aimed at the elimination of other forms of transportation, particularly water transportation."

Hearing in Portland Ordered
"As a corollary, any community which has natural advantages which would be recognized in rates based on mileage and the cost of rendering the service will be more and more permitted to enjoy the benefits of such natural advantages, and it will require a strong justifying reason to justify the government in any other course."

It was announced at the meeting that the western classification committee had ordered a hearing in Portland, August 24. J. H. Lathrop, manager of the association, will represent the city's shipping interests. Mr. Lathrop, who is representing Portland at the Chicago rate hearing, had wired as follows to Mr. Teal:

Committee to Lay Foundation
"Representatives are here in force, representing the commissions of Idaho, Arizona, Nevada and New Mexico, and commercial organizations of Spokane, Missoula, Great Falls, Boise and Salt Lake. Seattle, San Francisco and Chicago are also represented. Application of intermountain interests for graded commodity rates, based on present percentage relation of class rates, figures \$4 per cent for Spokane and 66-2-3 per cent for Salt Lake of present coast commodity rates. Other territories are graded proportionately. It is thought intermountain interests expect nothing from this committee but laying of foundation for complaint to the interstate commerce commission, based on the unfairness of present intermediate rates."

Would Reduce Revenues
Simmons will argue that it would be impossible to get the money necessary for withdrawal of the liquor. Unless the banks are given time to relieve themselves of this paper they will fail, Simmons will warn.

He will submit figures showing how prohibition will reduce the national revenues at a time when the need is for every dollar that can be raised, even at the expense of peoples' clothing. Dry Forces Confident

Prohibitionists secured a decisive victory in the senate late Wednesday. By a vote of 38 to 33 the senate overruled its presiding officer, who had ruled the prohibition amendments were not germane to the food stimulation bill. His decision meant that prohibition would have to be shelved.

Swims Into Deeper Water to End Life

Kirkland Good Leaves Note Behind—Grief for Dead Wife Believed to Have Been Responsible for Suicide.

Kirkland Good, 43 years old, jumped into the Columbia slough Wednesday opposite East Fifty-seventh street and was drowned. A short note was found written on a board nearby which read: "I die for you, Grace." Grace was his wife, who died recently, and grief over her death is believed responsible for the suicide.

Good resided at 10 East Twenty-fourth street. He left his home at 5 o'clock Wednesday to visit his wife's grave and it is thought, walked from the Rose City cemetery directly to the slough. He jumped in where the water was shallow, swam out to the middle of the slough, threw up his hands and sank.

Logie Richardson of the county clerk's office said that he saw the body this morning, but could not get near enough to prevent Good's drowning. Deputy sheriffs recovered the body this morning. Good is survived by his mother, sister and a younger brother who is in the army.

BOND PAYMENTS TO BE READJUSTED

Committee Appointed to Work Out Plan for Handling of Fourth Liberty Loan.

A spirit of patriotism pervaded the meeting called last night by Robert E. Smith of Roseburg, executive manager of the Oregon Liberty loan committee to discuss methods of handling bond subscriptions by employees of industrial plants. Representatives of 10 big industries, one railroad and 12 banks were in attendance.

The meeting was called because of complaints coming from employees in shipyards who purchased bonds of the third Liberty loan, agreeing to have installments deducted from their weekly pay, and afterwards left the shipyard where the contract was made and secured other employment. Often the men are obliged to make long trips to make their weekly payments, they say.

Management of a number of industrial plants have been transferring accounts of men who leave their employment to Portland banks and instructing subscribers to continue payments at these banks. Some confusion has resulted from a want of uniformity of method in handling the situation and the most important business of last night's meeting was the appointment of a committee of five bankers and five representatives of industrial plants to devise a workable plan for use in the fourth Liberty loan.

The committee was appointed on motion of D. H. McCosh of the Standiford Shipbuilding company and consists of the following members: F. J. Lamy, Williamette Iron & Steel works; P. B. McCall, Columbia Shipbuilding corporation; G. F. Nevins, Portland Gas & Coke company; C. W. Craig, Foundation company; D. H. McCosh, Standiford Shipbuilding company; F. H. H. U. S. National bank; Walter Cook, Ladd & Tilton bank; C. Detering, Northwestern National bank; J. N. Edliefen, Peninsula National bank, and L. H. Look, First National bank.

It was also decided that for payment of installments on the third loan arrangements should be made by each industrial plant, whereby any employee bond subscriber severing connection shall have the option of completing payments at the plant or at a Portland bank designated by the company. Emory Olmstead presided at the meeting.

AUSTRIANS SAY THEY FALL BACK IN ALBANIA

way down the valley of Devoll, was repulsed."

London, July 11.—(U. P.)—Italian forces, aided by French and Albanian, together with British naval units, are sweeping northward across practically the entire width of Albania in what may be one of the most important military and political offensives of the war.

According to the latest dispatches received here the allied troops, in addition to making important gains on the 60-mile front between the Adriatic and the Devoll river, are threatening the Bul-

garian right wing in the vicinity of Monastir, 115 miles from the sea. The main military objective of the allies evidently is the old Roman road connecting Monastir with the sea at Durazzo, possession of which would permit free movement of troops and supplies directly from the Adriatic into southern Serbia and would seriously weaken the enemy's hold on a great portion of the occupied areas of that country.

15-Mile Gain Is Made

Starting at the Vojutza river, the Italians, with the aid of British monitors, have advanced to the Semeni river, a maximum gain of 15 miles. The nearest portion of the old Roman highway lies just the same distance northward along the Skumbi river, west of El Beas.

But the offensive also has far reaching political aspects. Already considerable forces of Albanians under Essad Pasha are fighting with the allies and are rendering valuable assistance. Any considerable advance by the French in the Monastir region will have its effect on Bulgaria, which is reported to be low in morale, both militarily and economically. The most significant angle, however, is the probable effect on the southern Slav nations of Austria, already on the verge of active revolt. A decisive allied victory in Albania may prove the torch that will ignite the whole of the discontented elements of the dual monarchy.

Austrians Admit Defeat

One of the significant phases of the Italian advance is the frank admission of reverse by the Austrian war office. The latest official statement from Vienna said the Austrians "in the face of pressure from strong enemy forces" had withdrawn across the Berat-Pier line. Fieri already is in the hands of

the Italians and Berat, the most important city in Southern Albania, appears about to fall.

Italians Repulse Enemy

Rome, July 11.—(U. P.)—"An enemy attack on Canova, on the Asiago plateau, was repulsed," the war office announced today.

Austrian Losses Put at 250,000

Washington, July 11.—(I. N. S.)—New prisoners captured by the Italians along the Piave place the Austrian losses in the last offensive at 250,000 men, Rome dispatched said this afternoon. The prisoners say the Italian offensive was a complete surprise to the Austrian high command.
