

WOMAN WHO UPHOLDS THE KAISER DRAWS FINE AND REBUKE IN COURT

Mrs. Anna Exline, Proud She Is
German Born, Says Amer-
icans Tell Lies.

Mrs. Anna Exline, German-born but Americanized by marriage and long residence in Portland, was fined \$100 by Federal Judge Wolverton this morning on two charges of violation of the espionage act. She admitted on the witness stand that she had made remarks attributed to her, but denied that they "came from her heart."

One remark is that the kaiser is a kind and noble man. Another was that the United States had no business shipping munitions to the allies and that if the munitions had not been shipped, this country would not now be in the war. She also had said she was proud of being a German.

She charged also, it was alleged in the indictment, that the speakers who address workers in shipyards are hired to tell lies about Germany and the Germans and that the newspaper accounts of German atrocities are all lies.

Judge Wolverton warned her against repetition of such statements and said the fine was made only \$100 because she had dependents.

Mrs. Exline afterward said her praise of the kaiser was based on her own recollection of him when she was a little girl more than 25 years ago when she saw him riding through the streets of a German city where she was reared.

War Trophies May Be Brought to City

Robert Dougan, Washington Agent of
the Chamber of Commerce, Outlines
Plan for Effort to Secure Prohibition.

An effort to bring to Portland the war trophies exhibit that has been attracting such attention in San Francisco may result successfully if plans outlined today to the Chamber of Commerce by Robert Dougan, its Washington agent, are successful. The exhibit is a valuable collection of trophies from allied battlefields, including objects as small as a medal and as large as a huge armored tank. In a message to the chamber today Mr. Dougan says:

"The war exhibit goes from San Francisco to Chicago after two weeks in the former city, to stay until September and then it will tour the west again. But in the meantime it will be curtailed in size because the treasury department will use some of the display in the fall Liberty loan campaign. A month intervenes between the San Francisco closing and the Chicago opening, however, and I will try to have it routed east by way of Portland."

IMMIGRATION CASES IN OREGON DISTRICT SHOW BIG INCREASE

Inspector Bonham Reports 837
Investigations and 77 Ar-
rests in Year.

R. P. Bonham, inspector in charge of the U. S. Immigration service for the district of Oregon, has made his annual report to the department of labor in Washington, D. C. He reports 837 investigations and 77 arrests.

The increase in number of cases in more than 500 per cent over 1916-17. Seven anarchists were taken care of and several members of the I. W. W. came up for investigation. Some have been "dwelling in seclusion" since. Nine white slavers, 24 insane aliens and a number of seamen of foreign countries, seeking to desert and work ashore for the high wages, paid since the war began, were rounded up.

The cases of 11 Japanese, who sought to acquire a residence in the United States, were handled. Seven tried to swim ashore. Two at least were drowned.

A marked falling off in the number of violations of the Chinese exclusion act is noted, due to strict inquiries made by the department.

A number of cases await settlement in the courts, including Chinese slave cases, one British subject imported by a magazine and arrested as a fake Marine hero, several slackers, some German sympathizers, and some whose cases are still under investigation.

HOSEA W. TAYLOR, WHO FURNISHED STONE FOR CASCADE LOCKS, DIES

Had Charges of Quarrying and
Shipping of Huge California
Granite Blocks.

Hood River, July 11.—Hosea W. Taylor died at his home in Cascade Locks Monday. Mr. Taylor was widely known as one of the contractors who supplied the stone for construction of the locks at the Cascades. He had charge of the work of quarrying and shipping the huge granite blocks from Raymond, Cal., and upon the completion of this work in 1914 he moved to Cascade Locks to take charge of the contractors' quarry getting out basaltic rock for the lock walls. His last work on the canal was in 1914, when he had charge of the quarry and stonecutting for construction of the upper lock wall.

Mr. Taylor was married to Addie J. May in 1892, and his widow and one brother survive him. He was a member of Columbia camp No. 57, Woodmen of the World of Cascade Locks, and Washington lodge, A. F. and A. M.; Oregon commandery No. 1, and Al Kader temple of Portland.

John R. Kinsey Passes

Hood River, July 11.—John R. Kinsey, who had been engaged in the property business here for 18 years, died at his home here Monday night.

Mr. Kinsey was born in Fry's Valley, Ohio, 55 years ago. He was for a number of years associated with T. J. Kinnaid in the grocery business here, later establishing his own store. His wife and two adopted children, Catherine and Maurice Kinsey, survive him.

Bishop Paddock in Italy

Hood River, July 11.—Right Rev. Robert L. Paddock, Episcopal bishop of Eastern Oregon, is serving as the first American chaplain on the Italian front, according to news received by his sister, Mrs. F. G. Hutchinson, of this city. Bishop Paddock has been detailed with a group of 2000 American ambulance drivers recently ordered to the Italian front. He left Oregon about a month ago.

Action Deferred On Phone Merger

The city council considered today but deferred action until Friday on the proposal to merge the Pacific Telephone & Telegraph company and the Home Telephone company lines in Portland.

Question as to the form of service to be maintained under the merger and the rates to be exacted has arisen, some members of the council believing that the automatic system should be made universal to the exclusion of the "hello

girl" and the entire "manual" system.

That the heavy investment of the Pacific company must be protected in some way, however, is apparent to the commissioners.

H. C. of L. Strikes at Foundation of Life

Again the high cost of living has struck. It falls as usual upon the person who seeks to lift himself from the sordid walks of life. It strikes at the very foundation of human life—the feet. Shoeshiners have raised the price of shoes. They used to cost a dime. Recently the shiners raised to 15 cents on Saturdays, Sundays and holidays, exempting soldiers, however, from these seasonal raises.

Now every day will be a holiday, so far as the shoe price is concerned. Shoeshiners' union No. 15668 having decided to make it 15 cents right along. Boas Menaschi, secretary of the union, explained today that prices of materials and wages have gone up to such an extent that the raise is imperative. He says some shiners are now demanding from \$100 to \$125 a month.

Reckless Driving Is Charged

Two witnesses subpoenaed by the city to appear against A. L. Finley, charged with reckless driving, failed to show up. New subpoenas were issued and the case set over until Saturday morning. Officer Reek has charged Finley with reckless driving. The officer testified that in his opinion Finley used poor judgment in endeavoring to cut in ahead of a rapidly moving street car at Fifth and Stark streets Tuesday night. Finley's bail was set at \$250.

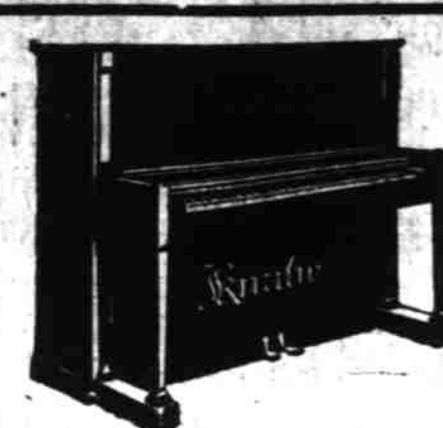
PORTLAND LEADS FOR MARINE RECRUITING IN FIRST DAYS OF JULY

Local Station Enlists 34 in Three
Days; Los Angeles Second
With 21 Recruits.

Portland leads the entire country in the number of enlistments in the marine corps, according to Lieutenant H. P. Potter, who received word from San Francisco that during the first three days in July 34 men had enlisted through the Portland office, which exceeded the number in any other city. Los Angeles came the nearest with 21 enlistments.

About six more men will be added to the state recruiting force to assist in the enlistment drive, according to Lieutenant Potter. These men will be assigned to duty at the local recruiting office in the Panama building, while the men now stationed there will be transferred to a number of new stations to be established at Salem, Pendleton, Medford and Corvallis or The Dalles.

Sergeant George N. Spear of the Portland office, who was recently transferred temporarily to Roseburg to relieve the officer there, who was obliged to undergo an operation, will return to the local office next week to take charge of the publicity work of the recruiting campaign.

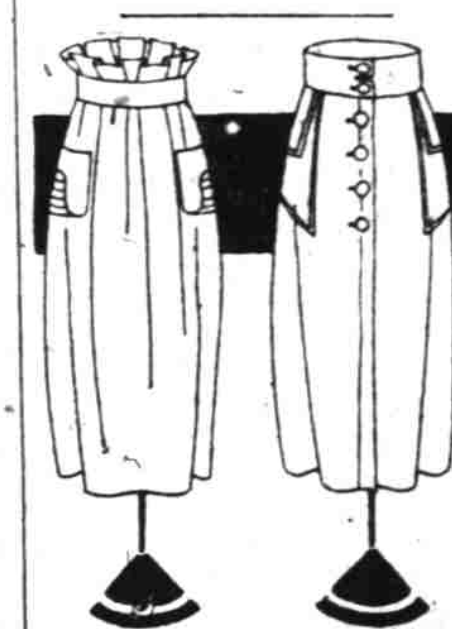
