# Oregon Clergy Will Work as Camp Pastors—Army Chaplains Aid in P. M. C. A.

## OREGON'S CLERGY HAS LARGE PART IN WAR ACTIVITY

An Average of Ten Per Cent of Preachers Engaged in Y. M. C. A. and War Work.

CAMP CALLS ARE HEEDED

Sacrifices Reflected in Pulpit and Parish, Where "Bit" Is Done With Rest.

N AVERAGE of almost 10 per cent of Oregon's clergy have either partly or wholly given up their church work and are now engaged in army or Y. M. C. A. work. Many of the ministers have enlisted as Y. M. C. A. secretaries, others have received appointments as camp pastors and still others have been advanced to the position of chaplain. The Pres byterian church has given the most men in Oregon, their percentage being about 25. The Methodist and Baptist churches almost tie for second place, their percentage being around 15.
