COAST LEAGUE VOTES TO END SEASON SUNDAY AND LET PLAYERS WORK

Four Club League Thought Impossible and Decision Is Quickly Reached to Close Down Entirely; Los Angeles and Vernon Will Play Nine Game Series to Decide Championship.

LOS ANGELES, July 13.—(U. P.)—There's just one little grain of comfort here in the suspension of the Pacific Coast league after tomorrow's game—Los Angeles fans will get to see at least five more games, as Vernon and the Angels scrap it out for the pennant.

Patriotism played an important part in the final session of the league magnates here last night, at which the official swan song was chanted. With players from the Salt Lake, Vernon and San Francisco clubs being summoned before draft boards under the work or fight order, it was deemed best to end the season and release the players for war work, than to fight for them by appeals to higher authorities.

"We did the only thing we could consistently do," stated Allen C. Baum, president of the league, today. "I know the public is still interested in the game, but under present conditions I feel the fans will commend our efforts and wait in patience until the end of the war enables resumption of the sport. I am sure baseball is due to come back stronger than ever."

The meeting decided upon suspension after tomorrow's games was attended by President Baum, President Powers of the Angels, who also represented Salt Lake, Cal. Ewing of Oakland, and President Straub and Manager Graham of the Seals. Baum also represented Sacramento. Their session was short and to the point. The situation was familiar to each director, so only means of meeting it were discussed.

Powers and Straub favored an attempt to finish the season with four clubs, dropping Salt Lake and Sacramento. It was held by the others that this would be impossible, so a decision to end the season tomorrow night was quickly reached.

NATIONAL LEAGUE MEN TO STAY BEHIND JOHN IN BOUT AGAINST BAN

They Think Junior Major League Cannot Well Afford a Contest With Older Crowd, Which Owns All Ball Parks in Greater New York; Will Await Disposal of the Perry Case.

NEW YORK, July 13.—(I. N. S.)—The board of directors of the National league has decided to stand firmly behind President John K. Tener in his fight against Ban Johnson. This was the belief among baseball men here today, following an announcement by President Charles Ebbetts of the Brooklyn club, in which he has taken a personal stand beside Tener.

Though few expressions have come from National league club owners since President Tener announced his intention to have nothing more to do with affairs of the National commission in which the American league is concerned, it is believed the directors have conferred with the result that Tener will have the unanimous backing of the league.

Will Await Perry Case

Developments in the case are expected to come slowly, and not until the Perry case is definitely disposed of will the time arrive for a complete showdown.

That the American league could ill-afford the break with the National, is the belief in baseball circles here, for even though the Junior major may be better off in some respects, it has no ball park in Greater New York and a baseball war of any length between the majors would be serious for the American league without a foothold in the Metropolis.
