At Home
Portland—Eighty-four wooden and 26 steel vessels were building or under contract, in the yards of the Portland district, of which 26 wooden ships are for the government.

Portland—Adjutant General White, of the Oregon National Guard, awaited official word from Washington on Oregon's quota for the selective draft.

Portland—The temperature reached 85 degrees.

Announcement of the selection of the site for Portland's new \$3,000,000 grain elevator and freight terminal was expected to come from the dock commission soon.

Portland—Ivan Humason, city fuel and ice controller, began an investigation to learn the reason for the increase in prices for coal and ice.

Washington—General Goethals, general manager of the Emergency Fleet corporation, announced that in addition to the 425 steel and wooden ships already contracted for, 100 wooden ships would be built.
