

PETITIONS READY TO ENTER RYAN

Friends of Judge Are Preparing
to Run Him Independently for
State Treasurer:

Salem, Or., July 18.—Petitions are prepared for circulation for putting the name of Thomas F. Ryan on the ballot as an independent candidate for state treasurer, according to reports going the rounds here. Judge Ryan was defeated in the recent primary election for the Republican nomination for that office by O. P. Hoff, the present labor commissioner.

Friends of Judge Ryan have been urging him ever since the results of the primary election were definitely known to make the race as an independent, and it is assumed that they have overlooked the letter which Judge Ryan wrote to the Republican club of Oregon on May 2, just 15 days prior to the primary election. The letter was addressed to F. W. Mulkey, Ralph E. Wilson and Ralph W. Hoyt, comprising a committee on arrangements for a luncheon, to be attended by all the candidates. Judge Ryan could not be present, so he sent a letter, in which he said:

"In the matter of the pledge to your club, as presented in your communication, I beg leave to state that I am 100 per cent, and over, in the affirmative with regard to the loyal support of our country in its present crisis and will give my unqualified support to the nominee of the Republican party for the office of state treasurer and will do all I can to assist in the advancement of the Republican principles and policies and the rebuilding of the party in this state. I pledge my unqualified support to him who does secure this nomination and will do everything in my power to promote his interests and secure his election in November."

At the time the letter was written Judge Ryan felt very confident that he would be the nominee of the Republican party for state treasurer, but the Republican voters decreed otherwise.

Three Officers Are Suspended by Chief

Chief of Police Johnson suspended Police Officers R. L. Schad, George B. Giddings and J. L. Van Carman Tuesday afternoon. Schad was formerly a motorcycle officer and he was suspended on the strength of charges preferred by two Hindus whom he arrested a short time ago for speeding.

It is charged that he accepted \$50 bail money from the foreigners and failed to turn it over to the desk sergeant. Chief Johnson said that it was against the rules of the department for anyone except the desk sergeant to accept bail money.

Officers Giddings and Van Carman are accused of statutory offenses by girls. Giddings worked in uniform and Van Carman was on the war emergency squad. All three officers stand suspended until their cases are brought before the civil service board, which acts as the court of appeal.

Edward Moss was arrested Wednesday night at 9 o'clock on a warrant sworn by Mrs. Pearl Howell. Moss was arrested on a charge of robbery and was taken to the police station on a charge of larceny and is being held in the city jail in default of \$300 bail.

Mrs. McDowell told the officer that Bowman, while he was delivering a trunk at her home, attacked her daughter, and that, attracted by the noise, she covered Bowman with a gun and held him until the officer responded to a telephone call for assistance.

Record in Launching Of Ships Is Sought

Washington, July 18.—(I. N. S.)—Organized labor this afternoon started a campaign for a record launching in American shipyards on Labor day. Telegrams asking leaders to cooperate in an effort to beat the Independence day record of 95 launches were sent out this afternoon by Samuel Gompers, president of the American Federation of Labor.

Holt, state health officer, and Dr. L. G. Ross of St. Helens made a trip to Goble Wednesday afternoon to investigate the reported epidemic.

United Foresters Begin Convention
Madison, Wis., July 18.—(U. P.)—The United Order of Foresters opened its quadrennial convention here Wednesday by electing as supreme officers. Resolutions were adopted urging all bodies of the order to invest all surplus funds in Liberty bonds. R. C. Sherrard of Chicago is the supreme ranger.

Only One Protected
London, July 18.—(I. N. S.)—There is but one private house in all London protected against German air raids by sandbags and zinc plates. The residence is in southwest London. The house is occupied by a naturalized German.

WONDERFUL SPIRIT SHOWN BY YANKEES

PARIS, July 18.—The spirit of the American wounded rivals that of warriors of ancient Greece, according to James J. Bingham, a Y. M. C. A. field worker, who was gassed while carrying wounded from the firing line.

Bingham, who is recovering and who expects to be back at his post within a few days, declares he saw any number of wounded Americans who after being brought into the first dressing stations, refused to have their wounds attended until their comrades had received treatment.

"A typical case," he said, "was that of a young man who had a fractured leg and two bullets in his arm. When a doctor tried to dress the wounds the soldier waved him away. 'Don't bother with me now. Look after some of those other fellows,' he said. And he refused absolutely to let any one touch him until the others were cared for. That is the spirit shown by all."

Last of 'Old Crow' Gang Is Captured

The last suspected member of the "Old Crow" fake whiskey gang was captured by Inspectors Howell and Goltz on a busy downtown street Wednesday evening at 5:45 o'clock.

The arrested man was identified by a representative of the Seattle police headquarters as Owen Baker, one of the Baker brothers alleged to have been operating a buncos game recently by selling a liquid containing 99 per cent water and 1 per cent artificial coloring in whiskey bottles bearing the label "Old Crow." Baker was taken to Seattle last night where he faces charges identical to that city for violating the prohibition law and for securing money under false pretenses.

Claim to Skeleton Has Not Been Made

Chief Deputy Coroner Goetsch announced Wednesday that Mrs. E. Latourelle had not claimed the skeleton of a man found on Hayden's Island on July 4. The coroner said, however, that paper. Mrs. Latourelle believed from the description of the clothes that the body found floating in the Columbia river near Dodson last Monday might be that of her husband, who had been missing since November 1917, but this identity has not been established. According to Mrs. Latourelle her husband went hunting with a friend last fall and never returned home.

Would Be Sweet to Kaiser, It Is Charged

Carl Lincke, a German alien enemy who was employed as a waiter at the Multnomah hotel, is being held in the county jail until authority is received from the United States attorney general's office to intern him for the duration of the war.

Lincke, according to the information filed with the federal authorities, is alleged to have used six cubes of sugar in a cup of coffee several days ago, and to have remarked, "Here's one for myself and five for the kaiser."

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A statutory charge has been placed against Bowman, who is held in the city jail in default of \$300 bonds.

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PRIZE MONEY FOR CONVICTS PLANNED

Warden Murphy Asks State for
\$50 to Be Paid Winners of
July 4 Athletic Contests.

Salem, Or., July 18.—Warden Murphy of the state penitentiary has presented to the secretary of state a claim for \$50 to be paid convicts as prizes for winning athletic events at a Fourth of July celebration held at the penitentiary. The claim has the approval of the governor.

Secretary of State Olcott has submitted the claim to the attorney general for an opinion as to whether it will be legal to pay the claim from funds appropriated by the legislature for the penitentiary. "The records of this office," says the letter from the secretary of state to the attorney general, "do not show that a similar claim has ever heretofore been presented to it for audit."

The penitentiary has exhausted its maintenance appropriation and at a recent meeting of the state emergency board it asked for authority to incur a deficiency of \$70,000. The board authorized a deficiency of half that amount but expects to meet again in the fall and authorize a further deficiency. The claim in question is drawn upon an appropriation for musical and literary purposes and for amusements and purchase of a moving picture machine.

Astoria Has Club For Service Men

Astoria, Or., July 18.—The Soldiers' Sailors and Shipbuilders' club is the name of the latest social and civic organization in Astoria. It was organized at the city hall Wednesday. Mayor F. C. Harley was named president. Over 50 of the active ship workers from the different yards formed the charter list. The patriotic side of the organization will be extended to the soldiers and sailors. Every man in uniform will be the guest of the club and have free use of the premises at all times. It was voted to have a select list of honorary members. President Wilson was the first to receive the distinction. Then Secretaries Baker and Daniels, E. M. Hurley, Charles H. Schwab and Samuel Gompers were named.
