WAR WORKERS WILL DISCUSS CAMPAIG ON Y.W. C. A. FUND

Delegates Will Gather for Two Day Meet in Spokane, July 23-24.

A conference of state organizers and war workers for the purpose of discussing and perfecting preliminary plans for Young Women's Christian Association will launch in the Northwest either the last of October or the first of November, will be held in Spokane, July 23 and 24.




