

BRITISH PREPARED FOR BLOW BY HUN

Allies in Strategic Positions Have as Many Troops or More Than Germany.

With the British Armies in France, July 24.—(U. P.)—The situation on the British front is one of prepared waiting. It is an open secret that Crown Prince Rupprecht's plans were perfected weeks ago for a drive against the British. Everything is ready, including great masses of storm troops, huge concentrations of artillery of all calibers, and airdromes crowded with flying craft.

Date Set Several Times
Rupprecht is simply waiting for the high command's cue, which doubtless depends on events on the German crown prince's front. It is believed that Rupprecht actually has set the date several times. The last was timed to follow the expected success in the Champagne, but he was forced to call it off again. His group of armies, however, is still intact, his reserves being only slightly cut down by Friedrich Wilhelm's demands.

It is absolutely certain that recent events have so lessened the confidence of both the army and the folks at home in Hindenburg and Ludendorff that some dazing stroke is urgently needed in the quickest possible time. But with barely ordinary luck the allies henceforward should be able to give something of their own trend to developments.

Allies Breathing Easier
Undoubtedly there is much heavy fighting ahead. But without going into actual figures, the allies today have in strategic positions as many or more troops than Germany.
Barring accidents, it is merely a question of the best way to use them. The Kaiser has over 200 divisions (2,400,000 men) on the west front, but little more than a fourth of these are worthy of the name "shock divisions." Their quality and quantity are now on the down grade.
The allies are not yet out of the woods, but they are certainly warranted in breathing easier. The British are very keen and certainly are ready.

GERMANS CALL FRESH TROOPS FROM NORTH

Fresh Reserves Identified

With the American Armies in France, July 24.—(U. P.)—Despite orders to hold to the death, the crown prince's rear guard is being forced to give way before the allied attack along practically the whole battlefield.

Prisoners declare the units of the rear guard were ordered to remain at their positions and hold off the Americans to the last. Before the violence of the American assault they were being wiped out or taken prisoners.

The advance is proceeding cautiously at all points, however, owing to the great mass of German reinforcements and their increasing resistance. On many sectors the battle occasionally loses all resemblance to a rear guard action and appears as though the Germans intended to make a permanent stand. New German reserve divisions are being constantly identified.

"Fake" Play Wins
The bitterest fighting is proceeding north of Jaulgonne, where the Americans are enlarging their bridgehead. Americans are pressing northward along the main road from Chateau-Thierry to Fere-en-Tardenois, the region of Epiais near the east of Chateau-Thierry, carrying the enemy retirement toward Fere-en-Tardenois, one of their principal communication centers. In this region our forces captured Marie farm, an important strategic point.

Coming through a certain woods, an American unit found the Boches had established machine guns every 10 yards. They were seemingly impressive. The Americans massed as though for a frontal attack. While the Germans' attention was centered on these forces other Americans made a wide encircling movement and suddenly charged the enemy from both flanks. They were taken completely by surprise and surrendered to escape slaughter.

Unusual Scenes Greet the Eyes
Everywhere are the most impressive and unusual scenes. French and American soldiers are fishing in the Marne at points where the Germans recently crossed the river. American troops, wagons and guns continue to pour across to the north bank.
In covering activities, American contingents are passing through Torcy, Bourches, Chateau-Thierry, and other historic points, which a week ago were held by the Boches.

The results of heavy artillery fire are seen everywhere—dead Boches, dead horses, smashed wagons, wrecked houses and trees snapped off like matches. Beyond Chateau-Thierry I saw a potato patch with most of the crop blown out of the ground by shelling. In the midst of a shallow German dugout, covered over by the foot board and head board of a wooden bed taken from a nearby house. The Boche occupants had left

blankets, coats and other equipment in their flight.
The villages north of the Marne are badly wrecked and display shell marks that remind one of the queer freaks played by our American tornadoes. One shell, hitting the side of a house, tore off the wall that served as the back of a cupboard. The dishes stood revealed on the shelves, untouched.

Prisoners Repair Roads
Along the road near the river, which was hit by the enemy a few days back, I saw prisoners at work filling in shell holes and smoothing the way for American wagons and guns.

The Americans are in the highest spirits, despite the fact they are literally smothering their food and rest on the run.
Two doughboys bringing in two Boches, forced the latter to carry a captured machine gun. Then they decided their packs were getting heavy and made the prisoners carry them. En route to headquarters they came upon two dead Germans.

"I think the Boches ought to bury their own dead, don't you?" asked one of the doughboys.
"Sure," answered the other.

Whereupon they set the two prisoners at work digging graves.
The morale of the Boche prisoners is very low. They are saturated with the power of the Franco-American attack.

Indian Tactics Win Again

With the American Army at the Marne, July 23, 9:30 p. m.—(U. P.)—Americans were in action all day north of Chateau-Thierry against German units that were under orders "to fight to the death."

After a hard struggle, during which the Americans employed the tactics of the old time Indian fighting on the western plains, German strong points, defended by machine guns, were penetrated.
Fighting with rifles and bayonets, the Americans overcame all resistance, overcoming the German field fortifications. A few hundred German prisoners were taken.

Much of the fighting was over wooded ground where the American riflemen fought from behind trees and clumps of bushes, slowly and steadily moving forward, meanwhile picking off the German machine gunners one by one.
Rain barred aerial observation today, but German prisoners told their captors that the Teutons were constructing new fortifications behind their positions all along the Alsne-Marne-Rheims front.

The scene of fighting described by Mr. Wales evidently lies between the Marne and the Ourcq, where Americans yesterday took Rocourt and stormed Chatelet forest.

Pershing Confirms Capture
Washington, July 24.—(U. P.)—Capture of Jaulgonne by American troops was confirmed today by General Pershing.

"South of the Ourcq our troops have continued to press the retreating enemy," the communication said.
"Our units crossing the Marne have gained possession of Jaulgonne and the woods to the west."

"In Lorraine a hostile raiding party was repulsed by our troops during the night of July 22 to 23," section E added.

"In the Thann sector on July 20 our troops carried out a successful raid on the enemy's lines, capturing several prisoners. On the same day one of the patrols in the St. Die sector entered a German trench and killed several of the enemy."

French Official Report
Paris, July 24.—(U. P.)—(12:35 p. m.)—Artillery fighting is proceeding violently between the Alsne and the Marne and between the Marne and Rheims, the French war office reported today. German counter attacks west of Rheims were repulsed.

"Between the Marne and the Alsne and in Courton and Roi woods both artilleries were greatly active," the communiqué said.
"West of Rheims the Germans counter attacked at 9 p. m. In the Virgny region the French broke the enemy assaults and maintained their positions."

U. S. Cavalry in Action

With the American Armies in France, July 24.—(U. P.)—American cavalry is in action for the first time in this war.

Mounted men are reconnoitering north of Chateau-Thierry, harassing the enemy. They have introduced a new departure in warfare, acting as grenadiers on horseback. Several enemy detachments have been broken up by grenades hurled by the cavalrymen.

Hun Artillery Active in North
London, July 24.—(U. P.)—Raiding operations and cannonading on various sectors of the British front were reported by Field Marshal Haig today.

"South of Buquoy we made successful raids, taking 18 prisoners," the statement said. "Our casualties were light."

"In another raid, northwest of Albert, we secured prisoners."
"An attempted enemy raid northeast of Bethune was repulsed."
"Hostile artillery was active on the northern portion of the front, particularly in the neighborhood of Loree."

No Chance for Damages
Chicago, July 24.—(U. P.)—Hopes of claimants for damages growing out of the Eastland steamship disaster here were shattered today by the announcement that a salvage concern had a prior claim against the \$46,000 realized in selling the ship. The salvage claim practically wiped out available cash. The Eastland sank in the Chicago river three years ago today, killing 800.

37 BOCHE PLANES BAGGED BY ALLIES

Allied Aviators Make Big Haul Monday; Four Balloons Brought Down.

Paris, July 24.—(U. P.)—Thirty-seven German airplanes were shot down and four balloons destroyed by allied aviators Monday, the official air ministry communiqué issued today declared.

"Franco-British aviators shot down 37 German airplanes and fired four balloons," the communiqué stated. "Twenty-nine tons of bombs were dropped on enemy concentrations and communication centers. American aviators collaborated with the characteristic pluck of the United States. They participated in the preceding days' victories."

British Bomb Offenburg
London, July 24.—(U. P.)—Destruction of one enemy airplane during raiding operations was reported today by the British air ministry. All British machines returned safely. The statement follows:

"In a raid carried out on the afternoon of the twenty-second instant the main station of Offenburg was hit and bursts were seen on the sidings. One hostile machine was destroyed. All our machines returned."

"On the night of the twenty-second-thirty-first repeated attacks, attended with good results, were carried out against the enemy's airdromes. Fires and explosions were observed. Other targets were engaged with bombs and machine gun fire."

Six New Divisions Of Army Forming

Washington, July 24.—(U. P.)—Six new divisions of the national army with regulars as nucleus, have been ordered by Chief of Staff March to be formed this month at the following camps:
Devens, Massachusetts; Custer, Michigan; Meade, Maryland; Funston, Kansas; Sheridan, Illinois; and Lewis, Washington.
These will be numbered 9 to 14 and will have two regular infantry regiments each as a nucleus. These regulars are gathered from guard duty about the country, having been replaced quietly during the past two months by home guards. All but these are national army men.

Call Made for Men On Aircraft Board

Washington, July 24.—(U. P.)—Pro- voked Marshal General Crowder today issued a call for 624 limited service men for duty with the aircraft production board. Twenty-four of the men, estimate makers and clerks, were reported here August 2, and 600 at Kelly Field, San Antonio, Texas, for work at various mechanical trades.

The provost marshal general has also accepted the voluntary enlistment of 1753 men for the engineer corps who are skilled in trades. These men will be trained July 29 for Camp Forest, Lytle, Ga.

Chinese Interpreter Placed Under Arrest

Seattle, July 24.—Frank Tape, known throughout the Pacific coast as a Chinese interpreter, was taken into custody today by the police on a charge of having swindled Jim Wong and Wong Fat, Chinese merchants, out of \$7140 in the sale to them of a bottle of liquid which he represented would turn certain base metals into gold. Tape has been connected with John W. Roberts, who until recently conducted a private detective agency.

Bolsheviki Order Troops Mobilized

Amsterdam, July 24.—(U. P.)—General mobilization of all military forces under Bolshevik control in Russia was begun July 17. Moscow dispatch declared today. No reason was assigned for this, although War Minister Trotsky announced some time ago that certain classes of women, soldiers and peasants would be called out to "maintain internal order."

Allies Favorable to Wilson's Food Plans

London, July 24.—(U. P.)—A proposal by President Wilson for unity in food control of the allied nations with headquarters in London is being favorably received by food control boards of all allied nations, now in session here.

Russian Warships To Be Distributed

Rome, July 24.—(U. P.)—Germany has decided to distribute a portion of the Russian Black sea fleet among Turkey, Bulgaria and Austria-Hungary, a Zurich dispatch declared Tuesday. The Russian Black sea merchant vessels will be also shared by the three countries.

Mail Carriers Strike
Ottawa, Ont., July 24.—(U. P.)—Mail carriers today were on strike in many towns and cities of Canada, including Toronto, Peterboro, Winnipeg, Brandon, Calgary and New Westminster. Trouble in Montreal has been avoided through promises of bonuses to strikers.

100,000 Munition Workers May Strike

Conference Between Workers and Government Officials May Settle Differences; War Industry Threatened.

London, July 24.—(U. P.)—G. H. Roberts, minister of labor, intimated in a speech today that if the munition strikers do not return to work at once they will be called into the army.

London, July 24.—(U. P.)—In an effort to reach an amicable agreement with munition workers, who are threatening to strike, conferences will be held tomorrow between representatives of the government and the unions, which have named advisory committees. If these efforts fail, it was declared today, there will be more than 100,000 striking before the end of the week, with a possibility that this number will reach 200,000 next week.

Almost 100,000 have left their work at Coventry and 8000 at Leicester. Today 60,000 men and 5000 women are scheduled to walk out at Birmingham. At Lincoln thousands were scheduled to strike. Manchester workmen are expected to go out tomorrow. There has been no action yet at Glasgow.

Munition workers are urging workmen against haste, pointing out the danger of such a step. The allies, they declare, will suffer greatly if the strike is permitted to be called.

Forest Grove Boy on U. S. S. San Diego

Forest Grove, Or., July 24.—Henry O. Buxton, reported missing from the San Diego, was born and raised on his father's farm, one mile west of this city and was a favorite with all who knew him. He was in this city two weeks ago on a visit with friends and was very optimistic when he left for his ship to resume his duties. His grandfather, the late Henry Buxton, was one of Washington county's most prominent pioneers, and his father, Austin Buxton, was formerly mayor of the State grange. His parents now reside at Molalla, Or.

Count Luxburg Is On His Way Home

Copenhagen, July 24.—(U. P.)—Count Luxburg, former minister to Argentina, who wrote the notorious "spurious venet" notes, has arrived in Gothenburg aboard a Swedish motorship, in which Count Luxburg arrived. He started for Germany immediately after his arrival.

will carry the successful Hispano-Suiza engine and will be of the Spad type. It will be the only single-seated machine manufactured in the United States for use abroad.

Assertion that \$100,000,000 had been lost in the abandonment of the Bristol model were denied today by Chairman Thomas, of the senate investigating committee.

"There was, of course, a considerable loss when the Bristol model was dropped," Thomas said, "but the loss will not approach \$100,000,000."

The Liberty motor, while it has not been found adaptable to machines intended for daylight bombing and combat work such as the Bristol, will not be condemned by the senate committee in its report. It has been found very efficient for use in night bombing planes, which carry heavier bombs than the Bristol and for observation machines. There has been no thought of abandoning the Liberty motor.

The committee probably will recommend centralization of Liberty motor manufacture in the six or seven plants now holding contracts for these engines, and will suggest various methods of increasing the output.

The present progress of the aircraft program is fairly satisfactory, committee members believe.

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LECTURER EXPLAINS ENGLAND'S SIDE IN WORLD CONTROVERSY

Dr. H. H. Powers Shows How Essential to Her Existence Is Mastery of the Seas.

In a stirring address at Lincoln high school auditorium Tuesday night, Dr. Harry Huntington Powers presented the side of England in the series of war lectures in which he is outlining the world situation as it was when the war broke out.

Dr. Powers traced the growth of the British nation from an island people dependent on the sea to a great world empire mastering the sea—yet still dependent on it. "England's position here," he said, "is unspeakably precarious. Those things, I am afraid, go together. The higher men or nations climb the more difficult it is to keep their footing."

At the same time Dr. Powers presented the case of Germany, showing that Germany did have legitimate ambitions, had they remained within bounds, and did have reason to fear the wiping out of her national existence. He showed further that Germany had perfectly sound reasons for believing that she could conquer, for it is literally true that if all ships could be prevented from entering English harbors for one week

England would be starved into submission. Dr. Powers believes that England must maintain control of the sea not only for the preservation of her own national existence, but for the well-being of the world.

Tonight's lecture will take up the Austrian and Italian situation, presenting the problem of the Adriatic. These lectures are under the auspices of the University of Oregon and are open to the public without charge.

Douty Will Attend Employment Meeting

Representing the Chamber of Commerce, the Employers' association and the Metal Trades association of Portland, F. A. Douty of the Multnomah Box & Lumber company left Tuesday night for Denver, Colo., where he goes to attend the meeting called by the United States employment service to organize community boards of the employment bureau.

In a letter to the Portland Chamber of Commerce, the Chamber of Commerce of the United States points out that this meeting is most important, having as its object the organization of community boards on which employers are to have representation. These local boards will administer in their various cities the distribution of labor, standardization of wages and the substitution and training of labor.

The representatives attending the conference are to be instructed how to organize the employers for the selection of their local representatives on the community board and to assist in the work of administration from the employers' side of the question.

Y. M. C. A. DIRECTORS FIND IT NECESSARY TO MEET EVERY WEEK

War work in Portland has become so great that more frequent meetings unavoidable.

War work in the Portland Y. M. C. A. has become such a great activity that it has been found necessary for the board of directors to meet every week to take care of the details. Instead of every month, as has been the custom up to date.

Tuesday afternoon at the regular monthly meeting of the board, H. W. Stone, general secretary of the Portland association, recommended the weekly meeting and the directors promptly took such action.

"The association is doing so many things now," said Mr. Stone, "that it is impossible to cover them all adequately in a single monthly meeting. I wish you would meet every week. I realize that busy business men have a great many calls upon their time, but this is war and we must give it attention."

The decision for adoption of Mr. Stone's recommendation was unanimous. E. C. Foster, international secretary for boys' work, with headquarters in New York, was present and outlined his views on that subject.

"After the association has influenced the boys and made him realize his situation in life, mentally, socially, physically and spiritually, he should be guided into the church of his faith, whatever it is," said Mr. Foster, "and it should be thoroughly understood by him that the church is where he belongs, that it is worth a great deal to him for character building and he should support it and do his share in it."

Mr. Foster also declared that every boy should complete his education whether in high school or college, and that the country will suffer if he does not.

Dr. Equi Gives Bail
Dr. Marie Equi, who is out on a bond of \$10,000 under a grand jury indictment alleging violation of the espionage act, was given 30 days in which to plead when arraigned before Judge Bean of the Federal court today.

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
