LOCAL WAR WORK

The Visiting Nurse association of Portland as an associate member of the National Association for the Prevention of Infant Mortality, is planning to enlarge its work in order to include more special pre-natal and infant welfare work. The association has always done this work to a certain extent, but now has pledged itself to cooperate with the national association and with the children's bureau in any infant welfare work they may outline.

Miss Emma E. Grittinger, R. N., superintendent of the Visiting Nurse association and as a member of the national association's committee on nursing and social work, has been notified that the national American nurses' convention in Cleveland decided that one of the most pressing needs was to help supply the demand for infant welfare nurses and that a joint committee of the two great organizations would promote plans to secure the cooperation of hospital superintendents who would arrange for their senior pupil nurses to give two months of their third year to infant welfare or general public health work, half time with each if desired. The same committee will also arrange for a course of lectures on the social aspects of disease.

Miss Otella Henriksen, R. N., of the Visiting Nurse association, is taking the summer course in public health nursing at Berkeley.

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Children to Learn Resources of State

Lectures in schools and colleges of Oregon are being planned by the extension division of the University of Oregon to educate the children and youth of the state as to the resources and products, the transportation facilities, scenic grandeur and other assets of the state.

To this end Guy Edward Dyer of the extension division of the university has asked the Chamber of Commerce to supply slides to be used in connection with these lectures.

The lumber industry, horticulture and agriculture, stock raising and other industry pertaining to the natural resources of Oregon are to be depicted, accompanied by illustrations showing actual conditions, in these lectures. A point of emphasis to be made in the lectures is the transportation facilities of Portland as a port, in the lumber and grain industry.

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
