INTENTION GREAT SURPRISE

Centenary Is Celebration of Hundredth Anniversary of Establishment of Missionary Society

CENTENARY office of the Methodist Episcopal church will soon be opened in Portland, according to an announcement received from Tyler Dennet of the joint committee in New York. This announcement has come as a great surprise to Portlanders, who say they never thought such an honor would be conferred upon this city. When told by The Journal that such was the announcement of the committee, the leaders of the church in the city expressed surprise and at once inquired into the further plans of the centenary committee The announcement reads: "In prep-

aration for the financial and educational drives of the centenary world program, the joint committee of the Methodis church has decided to open 19 additional centenary offices in the United States. These Episcopal area offices will be in the following places: Philadelphia, Pittsburg, Buffalo, Malden, Mass., Washington, Chattanooga, Tenn., Atlanta, Ga, Cincinnati, Ohio, Chicago, St. Louis, Wichita, Kan., Omaha, New Orleans, St. Paul, Detroit, Denver, Helena, Mont. Portland, Or., and San Francisco." C. S. Ward, who has been in charge of

the recent financial drives for the Red Cross and the Y. M. C. A., and who was connected with the Liberty loan campaign, will have charge of the centenary financial campaign. The date of this campaign has not been announced. Mr. Ward is declared a "financial wizard" and the Methodist church considers itself fortunate in securing his services to aid it in this drive.
