AFTER an active season of participation in war work activities, the Portland Alumni chapter of Gamma Phi Beta sorority will take its summer recess.

One branch of the work, under the able direction of Mrs. F. J. Whittlesy, was the making of infants' garments to send to devastated France and Belgium. One half a hundred garments have been completed and dispatched since this branch was added to the other sorority activities the middle of January. Each garment, made of durable flannel, donated by the members, was hand finished and conformed to a rigid standard of perfection. Even the scraps were utilized in making pillows for use in military base hospitals.

Mrs. Elmer Stipe of Beaverton assumed the management of the garage operated by her husband up to the time of his going to war, and is making a fine success of her business venture. She sells gasoline, keeps books, arranges for bus drives customers on trips and sells cars in such an efficient and capable manner that she has made an enviable reputation for herself in her business. Boches Destroy
Castle, Murder
Servants.

Dr. A. d'Artagnan, Wounded,
Gassed and Wearing Honor
Medals, Visits America.

SEEING her castle destroyed and her servants murdered by the Huns was the ordeal experienced by Dr. Antoinette d'Artagnan, a French woman doctor, now in the United States. Interviewed at a clinic in New York, where she is stopping, the last of that famous name said that if American women could but see one of the battlefields of war torn Europe, they would cease grumbling about high prices and food conservation.

Dr. d'Artagnan has been wounded and gassed and has received medals from King Albert of Belgium. One bore the inscription, "Honneur et faire le signe de la croix," another, presented her by General Petain, was awarded her for bravery, a third, marked "Anagnation," for efficiency in saving life, and a fourth was presented her in recognition of her work with the ambulance corps at Armentieres.

Her chateau was within three miles of the Belgian border when the Huns came and destroyed everything within reach. Nothing remains now but the ruins of what once was recognized as the most luxurious chateau in the section. Dr. d'Artagnan remarked that she felt no grief at her loss, merely remarking: "Why should I grieve that a thought when there is so much suffering? Why waste time worrying over material things, for this war makes one forget himself, and individual troubles seem so small in comparison, when all the world around us is being destroyed?" She hopes to restore her health here, far from the scenes of horror that she witnessed and then intends returning to help the American women doctors in France.
