BRITISH PRIVATE IS
ONE OF BUT FEW TO
HOLD THREE CROSSES

Michael J. O'Rourke, Honored for Distinguished Service, Will Speak at Auditorium.

Private Michael James O'Rourke, who is to speak Monday night at the Auditorium under the auspices of the association of the Fathers of Soldiers and Sailors, is one of the few men alive today who holds all three British war crosses, the Victoria Cross, the Military Medal and the Distinguished Conduct Medal.

The Victoria Cross, fashioned from bronze taken from guns captured in the Crimean war, was awarded to Private O'Rourke for his devotion to duty when, as a stretcher bearer, he worked unceasingly under shell fire for three days and nights bringing the wounded to safety.

He was given the Military Medal for his bravery in repelling, single handed, a German bombing attack. The Distinguished Conduct Medal was awarded to him for his devotion to duty in capturing a German pillbox on No Man's Land and worked incessantly three days and nights rescuing wounded, dressing their wounds and carrying them to the safety of the pillbox.

Private O'Rourke has spoken a number of times in Portland, being first known in connection with the Third Liberty Loan campaign.

Other features of the campaign will be a piano solo by Professor Louis E. Des Volges, the artist pianist of Spokane who escaped from Germany 8 years after war was declared through the assistance of Ambassador Girard.

Lucien Becker will furnish an organ solo and Dr. Stewart McGuire will sing "When the Boys Come Home."

Among the relics possessed by Private O'Rourke is a pocket edition of the New Testament and Psalms, which has been pierced by a bullet. It was the property of Private McDonald of the 72nd Canadian Highlanders, who carried it in his left breast pocket and was the means of his death by preventing the bullet from reaching his heart.

The next day McDonald was killed by shell fire.

The bullet stopped at the verse in Acts 32: "And when they heard of the resurrection of the dead, some mocked, and others said, 'We will hear thee again on this matter.'"

Private O'Rourke's collection will be on display at the Jennings furniture store, Fifth and Washington, until Monday night.

Monday, July 29: "Perugino and His Pupil; Raphael's Peruginian Days." Tuesday, July 30: "Raphael in Rome; the Renaissance in the World Center."

Wednesday, July 31: "The Youth of Michelangelo; Lorenzo and Savonarola." Thursday, August 1: "Michelangelo in Rome; the Great Pope and His Chapel." Friday, August 2: "The Message of the Later Days; Michelangelo, the Culmination of the Renaissance."

The art lectures are at 4:30 every day at the Art Museum.

COLLEGE LADS URGED
TO REMAIN IN SCHOOL
TO COMPLETE COURSE

Secretary Daniels Will Investigate Charges of Recruiting Officers Casting Slurs.

The navy department has joined the war department in support of the campaign to keep the youth in high school and college until such time as they reach draft age or receive sufficient training to make them of the highest possible value in the service.

A telegram received by John K. Kollock, executive secretary of the state council of defense for Oregon, from Secretary Josephus Daniels gives assurance that slurs reported cast by recruiting officers on the youth remaining in college shall be prohibited in the future.

Complaint had been made to Mr. Kollock by parents of young men who wished to obey the desire of the war department and remain in college to pursue special lines of training which would make them more valuable in the service, that recruiting officers of the navy were discouraging lads of 18 and 19 from doing so, contending that any who were physically able and had no dependents were cowards if they remained a single day out of the service.

Secretary Daniels' telegram to Mr. Kollock follows: "I will take the matter up with the recruiting officers and will see that any who have been branding young men attending college as slackers shall not do so in the future. It is indefensible, and I am surprised if any recruiting officer has been guilty of such conduct."
