Canning Voices Of Our Leaders

The "Voices of the War" will cooperate with the workers of the next Liberty drive, with the work of the Red Cross, the Y. M. C. A., Knights of Columbus and other organizations with all patriotic endeavor which is helping to win the greatest conflict in history.

The "Voices of the War" is the latest movement in the spreading of the country's propaganda. In a word, they are phonograph records of speeches and sayings of our own leaders, statesmen and warriors, both at home and abroad, and messages from the leaders of thought and action among the allies and the commanders on the battlefield.

General Pershing was one of the first to grasp the import of the movement and the first to lend his aid and his voice to it. Representatives of the National Forum of New York were sent to bring him, and from the field of battle General Pershing sent a short message by phonograph to the people of America.

In addition to General Pershing's speech there have already been recorded speeches of Secretaries Lansing, Baker, Daniels and McAdoo, ex-President Taft, Samuel Gompers, Vice Ambassador Sims, Champ Clark, former Ambassador Gerard and many others.

Representatives of the National Forum are now abroad securing records of the voices of Europe's most noted men.

Heights Says It Has Paid for Sewer Once

NEARLY 100 DRAFT MEN APPEAR BEFORE DISTRICT ATTORNEY

Registrants Are Urged to Carry Final Classification Cards to Avoid Being Arrested.

Registrants in all classes of the draft are urged to carry their final classification cards by Assistant United States District Attorney John Veatch.

During the last week nearly 100 alleged "slackers" have appeared before Veatch for failure to carry their final classification cards on their person and a number of them were released from custody after they had secured their cards from their homes.

The carrying of the cards will save the registrants the embarrassment of spending a night in jail and will also save the federal authorities a great deal of time and trouble. Some of those who were picked up last week were of the opinion that they should carry the green card, which was issued to them at the time they registered, but the card to carry is the one which shows the order and serial numbers and number of the class in which the registrant is pledged.

One registrant who was arrested produced his green card when called before Veatch and when asked for his classification card said it was "in a safety deposit box." After the registrant had secured his card he was released.

A majority of those who are unable to produce their final card are detained and their cases investigated by the local boards. Most of these men so held are inducted into service.

ELECTIONS IN CITIES MUST COME THIS FALL

election boards shall serve for both, but that separate ballots and separate ballot boxes shall be provided.

"To my mind," says the attorney general's opinion, "there is absolutely no doubt but what the constitutional amendment requiring the election of city, town and state officers at the same time is self-executing, that it relates to the time of holding such elections."

The law of the state, at the time the constitutional amendment was adopted, authorized and does now authorize county courts of the state to divide their respective counties into convenient election districts and to designate polling places therein. Without additional legislation cities and counties have the right to make their election precincts conforming to the law.

In many counties the boundaries of county voting precincts within an incorporated municipality and the boundaries of said city's voting precincts are the same. In all such cases the city and towns elections can be held at the same time, at the same voting places and by the same election officials.

"It is true," as set forth in the communication from the county clerk, that there is no law directing a city recorder to submit a certified copy of the ballot to the county clerk. It is also true, as asserted by the clerk, that there is no law requiring the clerk to have ballots printed for the city election. All such duties shall remain with the officers of incorporated cities and towns.

The constitutional amendment itself provides that all provisions of charters are and shall be null and void in cities and towns, pertaining to the holding of elections, shall continue in full force and effect, except so far as they relate to time of holding elections. All duties such as the giving of notice of election, printing of ballots, providing of ballot boxes, together with proper records for judges of election to make returns to city officials, shall be performed by city officials. Until further legislation such duties are of no concern to the county clerk.

The tenure of office of Commissioners Dan Kellaker and C. A. Bigelow and Auditor George R. Funk are affected by the decision of Attorney General Brown relative to the time for the holding of state and municipal elections. Deputy City Attorney Hindman has already prepared an opinion affecting the term of office of the auditor and two commissioners. The opinion will be gone over today by City Attorney La Roche.

Status of Mariners Decided by Officers
 Coast Heads of Selective Service System Agree That Sailors, Cooks, Stewards and Firemen Are Entitled to Deferred.

That sailors, stewards, cooks and firemen regularly engaged on sea-going vessels are entitled to deferred classification was the decision reached at a meeting Sunday of the heads of the selective service system in California, Washington and Oregon.

Adjutant General J. J. Borree of California, Captain Irwin Ziegler of Washington, and Captain J. E. Cullison of the Acting Adjutant General John M. Williams were present at the meeting.

Draft officials have been puzzled in defining mariners and as to whether the term "regularly engaged" applied to sailors and cooks on vessels, and the definite conclusion reached by the representatives of the three states will clear up the matter.

Other problems of the selective service were discussed, and a study was made of the Oregon selective service office and its methods used in conducting the administration of the department.

LABOR NOTES

The biggest picnic given by organized labor in years is to take place Sunday at Crystal Lake park. The proceeds of the sale of tickets will swell the Labor Temple fund and the unions are buying them by thousands. Organized labor intends to put up a temple at the southeast corner of Fourth and Jefferson streets, and the demand for such a building is well recognized by the 25 unions meeting in all parts of the city and without a home of their own. The campaign for funds is being made with regard for all Liberty bond and War Savings Stamp campaigns and the building will be constructed without interference with the government demands for workmen.

The Garment Workers cannot take a vacation this year. They are working to the limit, and demands from manufacturers in Portland for skilled workers exceeds the supply. There are about 350 women at work and there is a demand for at least 100 more. Beginners are taken on as fast as possible to increase the force, but cannot be assimilated in large numbers for want of machines to teach them.

The question of cooperative stores is agitating many minds among organized labor. The general sentiment among delegates to the Central Labor Council seems to be that no independent of any business venture should be made along the lines of a cooperative store. The Retail Clerks, Meat Cutters and other trades do not look with favor upon cooperative stores. Several buying clubs are purchasing provisions in wholesale lots in the different shipyards, and there are some indications that the large employers will establish stores for the convenience of their employees.

Port of Portland Dredge Is Damaged

Fire did \$5000 damage to the Port of Portland dredge Portland Sunday night. The fire started near the sawdust conveyor, while the men were eating their lunch and none saw the blaze until it had gained considerable headway. The dredge was anchored in the river near the St. Johns drydock, but an alarm was sent to the fire department and the David Campbell responded.

The steamer State of Washington, which was passing, stopped and turned her nose on the fire and stayed by until the fireboat arrived and put out the blaze. It is not thought that the engines and machinery escaped injury. The dredge was recently repaired and put in first-class condition and was dredging the river in front of the St. Johns municipal landing when the damage was confined to the woodwork. It is thought that repairs can be made soon.

A fire started on the Broadway bridge at 11:15 Sunday morning, due to a smoldering carelessness in throwing a lighted cigarette stub on the bridge. The city council recently passed an ordinance forbidding this practice. Fire Marshal Grenfell has had placards printed, quoting the law, and these will be placed in prominent places on the bridges today. Plain clothes officers will be stationed on the bridges to arrest offenders.

Coming to Organize War Industries Here
 Herbert Witherspoon of Spokane, director of the twentieth zone of the war industries board, will be in Portland Tuesday or Wednesday, to arrange organization of the Portland district, one of the 20 in the zone, which includes the three Northwest states, Oregon, Washington and Idaho.

In each district a committee and director will be named, to look after war industries in that locality. The purpose of the board is to find where materials needed can be obtained most easily and quickly, to coordinate manufacture and to distribute the government contracts so as to encourage industry everywhere.
