

IMPORTANT STATE FUND EXHAUSTED

No More Indemnities for Livestock Condemned and Killed Can Be Paid to Growers.

Salem, Or., July 30.—Until after the next legislature meets and makes a new appropriation, the state will pay no more indemnities for cattle condemned and killed on account of tuberculosis, nor for horses killed on account of glanders, announced Dr. W. H. Lytle, state veterinarian, who returned Monday from attending a meeting of the state livestock sanitary board at Klamath Falls.

The order for the discontinuance of the payment of indemnities was dated back to July 15, as the fund for this purpose has been exhausted.

The board passed an order requiring that all sheep which have had the scab at any time during the year be held four months before being sold, while another order provided that sheep at all disposal sales in the Willamette valley must be dipped before the sale.

Dr. Julius Sorenson of Hillsboro was appointed deputy state veterinarian to fill the vacancy caused by Dr. C. M. Gardner entering the military service.

Walter K. Taylor of Corvallis was elected president of the board and W. B. Baird of Heppner vice president.

Many Eastern Cities Visited During Trip

Fred A. Rasch Returns After Two Months' Survey of Public Utilities in Most of Important Cities.

Completing a two months' survey of eastern, middle western and western cities as regards their public utilities, Fred A. Rasch, examiner for the Oregon power service commission, returned to Portland Monday afternoon.

Mr. Rasch left Portland May 21 and visited Denver, Omaha, Minneapolis, St. Paul, Milwaukee, Chicago, Toledo, Cleveland, Buffalo, Rochester, Boston, New York, Philadelphia, Baltimore, Norfolk, Washington, Pittsburgh, Cincinnati, Indianapolis, St. Louis, Kansas City, Los Angeles and San Francisco. He looked into the situations in those cities as regards street railways, gas, water and terminal facilities and will have an inclusive report for the Chamber of Commerce and the public service commission. He also conferred with the explosives bureau, products division of the war department, regarding the total product of gas industries.

Portland has as great possibilities as any other city can have," said Mr. Rasch today. "The great land behind her must be developed, however, if the city is to grow; and we must look carefully after our industries and shipping facilities."

McLemore Defeated; Loses Nomination

Dallas, Texas, July 30.—(U. P.)—Representative Jeff McLemore of the Seventh Texas district was defeated for renomination at Saturday's Democratic primaries, fairly complete returns to date indicated. Judge Clayton S. Briggs appeared to be the nominee, with McLemore running third.

Governor William P. Hobby was renominated over former Governor James Ferguson by a large majority.

Carlos Bee and A. P. Barrett were in neck and neck race for the congressional nomination in the Fourteenth district, where Representative Slaydon abandoned his fight for renomination, under White House pressure.

Harry Blake Will Be Sent to Canada

Harry Blake, who posed as a sergeant in the Canadian army and who claimed to have received 40 shrapnel wounds while he was engaged in battling the Huns, will be deported to British Columbia Wednesday. Police Officer Harry Bales and an emergency hospital interne will take Blake to the boundary line, where he will be turned over to the dominion immigration authorities, who will hand Blake over to the Canadian military commander.

Blake has been confined to the city jail ever since his arrest and part of that time he had been seen in the observation of the city physician.

He was denounced as an impostor when Canadian officers recognized him as a camp hanger-on they had seen in a Canadian training camp.

BLACK SEA PORT HAS BEEN TAKEN BY CZECHS

steamer in the Volga river between Rydunskein and Astrachani by the Czech-Slovaks.

The fall of Viarka, an important junction point on the Siberian railway, before the advancing Czech-Slovaks is believed imminent.

The Czech-Slovaks apparently are pressing boats in service to carry supplies up the Volga river toward Viarka from the western base of the forces at Kagan. It is declared that the plan of the Czechs in this region is to reach the Murman coast.

Colonel Hurban of the Czech-Slovak forces in Siberia is expected in Washington in a few days to confer with Dr. T. G. Masaryk, commander-in-chief of the Czechs and chairman of the Czech-Slovak national council. Colonel Hurban started to the United States to make an appeal for transportation facilities to get the troops to France, but it is understood recent changes in Far Eastern conditions will cause him to make other recommendations.

Czechs Add to Victories

Copenhagen, July 30.—(U. P.)—Czech-Slovak forces have captured Orenburg, according to dispatches received here today.

Social-revolutionists have overthrown the Bolsheviks at Tieniesink.

The British government, replying to the provisional Siberian government, according to dispatches from Vladivostok, said:

"It is our aim to restore Russia without internal interference and to expel the enemy. We have no intention of entering upon territory."

Russ Accept All Peace Terms

Washington, July 30.—(U. P.)—Russian-German commissioners, meeting for a consideration of the terms of the Brest-Litovsk treaty, have finally agreed to all its terms, according to Swedish reports reaching the state department today. The reports also stated that the Russians are to disband the Red Guard to organize an army "along the old lines," presumably abandoning the attempt to operate a military establishment along the "liberty, equality and fraternity" lines.

The situation in Moscow, says the Swedish press, is becoming more critical every day as wholesale arrests have been made. Firms are filled, they say, and other buildings are being used to house prisoners.

Have No Agreement

London, July 30.—(U. P.)—Lord Robert Cecil of the British foreign office, announced in the house of commons this afternoon that there is no agreement between the allies and any faction of government in Siberia.

YOUTH PLANS TO ROB, BUT LOSES HIS NERVE AND LANDS IN JAIL

Joe Bliskia's Courage Fails When Chauffeur Refuses to Give Up Money.

Joe Bliskia, a 16-year-old boy, is held by the county authorities on a charge of attempted highway robbery. Bliskia is said to have hired an automobile at Broadway and Washington streets late Monday night from T. B. Smith to go to Scappoose.

A short distance past Linnton Bliskia asked the driver to stop, and when he alighted he is said to have pulled a revolver on the driver and to have demanded his money and a free ride. The driver started his machine and drove away and secured the aid of Deputy Sheriff Lamont and Bedford. They located Bliskia about a mile farther down the road and arrested him. The case will be tried in the juvenile court.

Bliskia is said to have confessed to the sheriff this morning that he had planned the robbery, but lost his nerve when the driver refused to yield up his money.

SHERIFF'S FORCE IS BUSY

Two Coos County Men Arrested for Non-Support.

Sheriff Hurlburt's deputies were more than usually occupied this morning bringing in alleged offenders. The grand jury when Deputy Christofferson arrested John Doe Bascom, wanted at Coquille, Coos county, by Sheriff Gage on a charge of contempt of court in failing to support his family.

Deputies Beckman and Ward arrested John Doe Wilkinson on a like charge for Gage. Gage came to Portland this morning and returned with the two men.

Deputies Christofferson and Beckman arrested Ralph Jackson this morning at a hotel at Sixth and Flanders streets on a charge of forgery. Jackson is wanted by the authorities of San Mateo county, California, and has consented to go to that state without extradition proceedings. Jackson recently married Miss Isabel McCune of Portland and has been living with her at Silverton.

Divorce Suit Filed

Charles F. Baker filed suit for divorce from Wilmer Edith Baker Monday afternoon. They were married April 12, 1910, and have two children. The husband says that his wife deserted him.

On grounds of desertion, Mittle Moore filed suit for divorce Monday afternoon against Charles W. Moore. They were married June 4, 1904. They have a boy and a girl. The complaint asks for \$75 per month for support of the children and \$40 attorney's fees.

J. P. Deegan filed suit for divorce from Grace E. Deegan Monday afternoon. The couple were married May 1, 1890. The grounds claimed for divorce are desertion.

Elsie Matsumoto filed suit for divorce this morning from Joe Matsumoto. They were married April 1, 1913. Desertion is alleged. The Matsumotos are Japanese.

Calvin D. Stone Sentenced

Calvin D. Stone, who was indicted two years ago for alleged perjury in fitting on a homestead in the Lakeview district, pleaded guilty when arraigned before Judge Bean of the federal court today and received a sentence of six months in the county jail. Stone was arrested by a deputy United States marshal in Utah, where he had been living with his son-in-law under an assumed name. At the appeal of filing on a homestead in Lakeview, Stone had already filed on a claim in Idaho.

Sues to Recover Film

The World Film corporation, through its local agent, filed suit late Monday afternoon against John A. Jennings, lessee of the Sunset theatre, alleging that the defendant had possession of seven reels of a motion picture film called "Rasputin, the Black Monk."

ASSOCIATION FILES ANEW

Employers' Association Changes Name and Files New Articles.

The industrial association of Oregon, formerly the Employers' association, filed its new articles of incorporation this morning in the county clerk's office following similar action at Salem. The papers show D. A. Pattullo, R. G. Little, H. D. Kilham, F. A. Douthy and W. O. Fouch to be the incorporators.

The stock is divided into 4000 shares of a par value of \$1 each. This is a reorganization of the Employers' association under a new name and with broader purposes. It is the hope of the association to foster without extending financial assistance, new and old established local industries.

Arrested for Assault

Jim Bietto was arrested by Deputy Sheriff Christofferson and Beckman Monday night on a charge of assault with a deadly weapon. He had been in a fight Sunday night on the Sandy road near Columbia boulevard with several others of his countrymen, who swore out the complaint. His bail was fixed at \$2000.

Gershon Brooke Jacobs, Morton Brooke Jacobs, Sadie Barnett Jacobs and Alfred Gilbert Jacobs, each filed petitions in county court this morning asking that their names be changed from Jacobs to Gilbert. The petition states that the name Jacobs is generally considered as of German origin; that their sole surviving parent is of German nativity and that since the United States declared war on Germany the petitioners had been subjected to unjust criticism because of their German name.

PREPARATION IS MADE FOR SURVEY OF WAR WORK POSSIBILITIES

Herbert Witherspoon, Regional Adviser of Zone Here, Laying His Plans.

Herbert Witherspoon of Spokane, regional adviser in the twentieth zone for the war industries board, arrived in Portland this morning to organize the sixth district in this zone, preparatory to a survey of the district's output and possibilities.

The twentieth zone includes all three Pacific Northwest states, Oregon, Washington and Idaho, and headquarters will be in Seattle. The sixth district of the zone, of which Portland will be headquarters, includes all of Oregon except the counties of Morrow, Umatilla, Baker, Union and Wallawa, and includes the counties of Clatsop, Skamania and Klickitat in Washington.

The district will be organized by the appointment of a committee by the different war industries interests, which will name a chairman. Through this chairman a preliminary survey of the industries of the district will be made, as to its equipment, percentage of war work it is doing, percentage of non-essential production and the total amount it can do. Following up this survey, Mr. Witherspoon plans to return to Portland in about two weeks and make a careful, personal inspection of all plants capable of turning out products that can be utilized by the war industries board. These findings will be taken to Washington, D. C., where arrangement will be made to place more war contracts in the district.

Originally it was found necessary to place big contracts with firms that were equipped for handling them, according to Mr. Witherspoon, but, with the rush past and time for more careful action at hand, it is the government's plan to apportion the work as equally as possible. Each district will be made sufficient unto itself in the production and its surplus will be placed where it is most needed and most easily transported, he said.

Portland, Mr. Witherspoon believes, can handle war contracts of considerable magnitude and he is anxious to get an organization perfected toward that end. The committee and its chairman probably will be named Wednesday.

Portland Citizens Do 'Bit' in Fields

Pendleton, Or., July 30.—Dr. E. A. Madd, former Pendleton dentist, now located in Portland, has enjoyed a patriotic vacation working in the harvest fields of Eastern Oregon, and is here today on his return to Portland.

William McBride of Portland, not because of financial necessity, but because he enjoys the work and has the ambition to do his bit in the harvest fields, is working on a combine harvester for his son-in-law, J. A. Lumsden, near Athena. McBride is a retired farmer, having sold a large wheat farm near here two years ago at what was then the record price of \$200 an acre.
