SOMETHING in the way of amusement for the soldiers at Vancouver barracks has been arranged by the Knights of Columbus for every day the coming week. Besides the usual "movies" and wrestling and boxing matches each week a musical program under the direction of Miss Frances Hart Parks of Butte, Mont., will be given Wednesday night at the K. of C. hall.
On Thursday night a dance will be held in the open air pavilion. Passes for admission to the dance will be required. On Sunday at 2 and 3 p. m. a minstrel show will be given on a platform erected outside the K. of C. hall. This event will be staged by the soldiers, many of whom have had professional careers. Portland Woman To Leave for France

MRS. ROBERT TREAT PLATT, Northwest chairman of the American Committee for Devastated France, will leave the last of this week for New York and on August 24 she will sail for France to take up work, probably of an organizing and administrative character in one of the devastated sections. Mrs. Platt familiarized herself with the general work of this organization in New

York last year and since her return to Portland she has been tireless in her efforts on behalf of the committee and has sent thousands of garments and thousands of dollars to New York, which have been forwarded directly to Mrs. A. M. Dike and Miss Anne Morgan, two of its most prominent members, who are now doing reconstruction work.

The automobile which was recently disposed of by the Portland division of the Northwest committee, netted \$3663.32. Of this Mrs. Platt immediately sent \$4000 to New York and it has in turn been cabled to Miss Morgan and is being used in the purchase of tractors for farm work. The remainder of the money will be taken east by Mrs. Platt and will be disposed of as the committee sees fit.

Several groups of women and organizations have spent the winter and spring making garments as well as bedding for the refugee French and Belgian

children. For a time these garments had to take their turn with Red Cross shipments, but the committee has had its regular shipping space restored, according to the following paragraph from a letter received Monday by Mrs. Platt from the New York office: "If you want to send us your made up garments in cardboard boxes by parcel post, we will be glad to bale and ship them without waiting for Red Cross shipments." In this letter Mrs. Platt is highly commended for her successful cooperation with the local branch of the Foodieck commission, the National League for Woman's service, the Red Cross and the Daughters of the American Revolution.

The next event of local interest in connection with the committee's work is the visit the last of August of the Countess de Bryas, whose father is Marquis de Bryas, president of the Jockey club, the most exclusive club of Paris, and whose

mother is an American woman, both of whose grandfathers were signers of the Declaration of Independence. The countess was the first woman to go into the devastated parts of France and she brings a message replete with intelligent and reliable information concerning the real condition of the people and the lands laid waste by the Hun. She will speak both at a public meeting and to the shipyard workers.

The auxiliary to Company E, Eighteenth Engineers, railway, American Expeditionary Forces in France, will celebrate the evening of August 2 at 8 o'clock, in the gray parlor, Multnomah hotel. This will be in honor of the Eighteenth Engineers leaving for France one year ago. A splendid musical program will be given by some of Portland's best talent; also a review of the work done by the auxiliary since its organization.

All members and their friends are cordially invited. Members of Company E's auxiliary will be warmly welcomed.
