NAVY AND MARINES STILL TROUBLED BY LOCAL DRAFT BOARDS

Recruiting Officers Say Draft Officials Still Misunderstand Meaning of Order.

Difficulty with local boards in securing releases for registrants desiring to enlist in the navy or marines cropped out Monday at Eugene, when Chief Electrician J. M. Donnell and C. W. T. Quinn of the Portland navy recruiting station attempted to enlist a few lads, while on a recruiting tour.

Out of 17 boys who wished to join the navy, 15 were denied, because the local board refused to grant releases, saying it had received an order from the adjutant general's office Saturday afternoon to grant no more releases whatever, to any registrant.

The marine recruiting officers had trouble recently with the Eugene board for failure to release a registrant, and it was only after taking the matter up with Captain Cullison and a determination to wire Washington that Lieutenant H. E. Potter received the release.

The instructions to local boards over the state to refuse all releases comes from a misconstruction of an order from Provost Marshal General Crowder to refuse releases to men in Class No. 1 until all quotas up to August 31 have been filled, officials of the navy and marines say.

"It simply means a delay in getting out," said Donnell. "The matter will be taken up in Washington again and the 15 recruits will have to wait until instructions come from headquarters before they will be able to get released."

Will Entertain Soldiers—Upon invitation from the Y. M. C. A. war secretary at Vancouver, 100 young women from the Portland Epworth League plan to visit the local board tonight and provide entertainment for the men in the army. Each young woman has been asked to bring a cake. Several of the ladies plan to bring a cake and provide entertainment. Miss Mildred Bartholomew, war secretary of the district, is in charge of the arrangements and Miss Helen Whiting of the Sunny-side chapter was asked to arrange for the 100 cakes.

Youth Is Sentenced—Andrew Anderson, 19, was given a suspended sentence of six months in jail by Judge Rossmann on Tuesday afternoon on a charge of larceny of an automobile. The complaining witness did not wish to see the boy in jail, so the judge suspended the sentence. It is said that the boy was stealing a Hudson super-six car about a year ago, which has not been recovered. The officers received information that the machine had been hidden near Forest Grove and they are endeavoring to find it.

Excursion for Shriners—The Arab Patrol of Al Kader Temple, Mystic Shriners, will take possession of the barge "Swan" Saturday night and the "Charters" will furnish music. Dancing and music will be the order of the evening for a river excursion. Proceeds will go to help out the Al Kader ward maintained at the base hospital at Camp Lewis.

In discussing the plans of the Loyal Legion, Colonel Disque said delegates will be sent to the meeting in Portland August 5 to confer with logging operators with a view to establishing permanent councils for the regulation of labor problems.

STOCK IN NORTHWEST GREATLY IMPROVED IN GRADE, SAYS WREN

Head of National Livestock Association Is Visitor in Portland; Big Show at Lewiston.

Marked improvement in the grade of cattle, sheep and hogs, a condition which means much for the future of the industry, is noted in the states of Oregon, Washington, Idaho and Montana, by Thomas W. Wren, president of the Northwest Livestock association, who is a guest at the Multnomah hotel.

He said: "Stockmen are beginning to realize the necessity of keeping up the character of their herds and while many sacrifices of the less desirable grades have been made because of economic necessity, the ranchers and farmers are keeping and adding to their pure bloods. In my travels throughout the Northwest I have observed a general tendency of stockmen to do all in their power to help increase production. In this they are cooperating with the federal government authorities in a laudable manner."

Must Keep Up Ranges—"The great object of today is to show the stockmen and the small farmer the need of keeping up their ranges. In many instances I have found owners with large holdings who were about to sell out their ranges and retire from business. They are tempted to do this largely because of high costs of keeping up the stock and the attractive prices offered. I have invariably told this class of stockmen to remain in the business, because I have argued these independent ranchers to remain in business."

"I am also endeavoring to have each rancher procure a limited number of pure blooded animals. A multiplicity of small farmers, each with his quota of first-class stock, would in the aggregate mean more to the stock industry than a few men with large holdings."

Big Show at Lewiston—"Grain men who require the banks to carry them through until they can realize upon their crops ought also to have enough stock on hand to furnish them ready money."

Attempt to Escape Fire Ends Fatally

Jack O'Brien, Shipworker, Falls From Window During Early Morning Blaze; Ten Others in House Reach Safety.

In falling from a window when he attempted to climb out to avoid getting burned to death in an early morning fire, Jack O'Brien, 24 years of age, fractured his skull and sustained internal injuries that resulted in his death at St. Vincent's hospital about two hours later. The fire was in a store building with housekeeping rooms upstairs at 464 1/2 Union avenue north. The first alarm was turned in by Miss Irene Ross of 471 Union avenue north at 3:51 a. m.

O'Brien roomed on the second floor and, when he awakened and found that he was in the midst of a fire he ran to the window. His roommate, Steve Wright, said he was seized with an attack of the heart, to which he was subject, and fell. Both men were shipworkers. The Ambulance Service company rushed him to the hospital. He is said to have parents residing at Mount Pleasant, Mich.

There were 11 people in the house, the landlady, Mrs. May Inckley, her two daughters and eight roomers, mostly shipworkers. A roomer, W. P. Weinbaum, fired two shots from his revolver and awakened everybody. There are four exits in the house and O'Brien could have escaped down a stairway if he had taken the time.

The damage by fire is estimated at \$1500. The fire was confined to the rear of the building, which is owned by H. Zinke of 18 East Third street. Engines 8 and 13 and truck 4 responded. The coroner has taken charge of the body.

Navy Refuses Men Convicted of Crime
 Local Recruiting Office Objects to Making Reform School Out of Navy to Save Boys From Serving Terms.
 "The United States navy is not a reform school, nor does it enlist boys to reform them," declared J. M. Donnell, chief electrician of the local recruiting office in the Dekum building after an attempt had been made to secure the enlistment of a boy should be released from the juvenile court.

There have been many instances, according to Mr. Donnell, when judges have tried to release a young man from a charge, on the condition that he enlist in the navy, but the navy will not take them if it is known a charge has been hanging over them.

"We have too many good men in the navy," said Mr. Donnell, "to fill it up with reform school candidates."
