APPEAL IS MADE TO PORTLAND TO RECEIVE VETERANS

National Encampment of G. A. R. Will Bring More Than 10,000 Boys of '61 August 19-23.

10,000 ROOMS NECESSARY

Public Is Asked to Be Host, Open Homes and Give Flowers for Honored Guests.

Two weeks from next Monday there will be between 10,000 and 20,000 old soldiers in Portland. They are coming to attend the national encampment of the Grand Army of the Republic.

The hotels can take only 10,000. Two weeks from next Tuesday those veterans of the Civil war will parade through the streets, and probably 50,000 citizens from near-by districts will be here to watch them.

Yet but 1000 residents of Portland have agreed to open their private homes to furnish sleeping quarters for the veterans who are willing to pay for what they get.

Two weeks from Friday all the old soldiers in the city will expect a free trip over the Columbia River highway by automobile. The local committee is trying to hold down and confine that feature to delegates to the encampment, but already the knowledge of what the old boys in blue will expect is beginning to crop out.

So the entertainment of the Grand Army seems to have become bigger than a committee matter and to involve every person living in Portland, declares the committee in charge.

Private homes must be opened—those in South Portland, in Suggs, in Laurelhurst, in St. Johns—in every section, continues the committee's appeal.

Ten Thousand Rooms Wanted

"If the citizens of Portland do not rally to the support of the various committees, the soldiers will say this is the only place in America where a failure was scored, where the people failed in appreciation of their sacrifices for the Union, and where we were too busy taking profits to display the courtesies they have a right to expect as invited guests of the city."

"The housing committee wants at least 10,000 rooms in private homes to be registered with their headquarters. It should be done immediately."

The general committee wants, at the office of Frank McCallister, Henry building, a list of 1000 volunteers who will accept assignments as aids in various activities connected with the entertainment of the G. A. R.

Every Person a Host
It wants 1000 automobiles listed with Charles J. Schmalz in the Chamber of Commerce building.

It wants every Portland resident to regard himself as a special host during the week of the national encampment and to seek the chance to make it pleasant for the G. A. R.

It wants every Portlander to wear a smile all of G. A. R. week.

It wants every Portlander to shake hands with as many visitors as he can reach.

It wants every Portlander to get into the game.

The housing committee for the G. A. R. will designate men to go out on the railroads to meet the special trains that are coming. The committee will be assigned to rooms before they reach the city, and those who come on the regular trains will be escorted from the Union station to Liberty temple for registration and assignment to rooms. Then the boys of '61 will be sent out to their domiciles by automobile or by streetcar.

Counters are to be placed in the temple to accommodate the committee, and it is probable a huge booth will be arranged at the Union station.

Flowers for Parade
General Charles P. Beebe, chairman of the Portland committee on entertainment, yesterday expressed the hope that everybody would conserve their roses, sweet peas and other blooms for the parade of Tuesday veterans with flowers.

It will be the last time that people of this city or on the Pacific Coast will ever see the remnants of the armies of Grant and Sherman, Lincoln's army in blue, pass through the streets, and General Beebe wants to see Portland citizens show the flower spirit.

"I would like to suggest that we cover the pavement with flowers," said the chairman. "It will be our farewell to one of the grandest armies that God ever smiled upon, and if they walk knee-deep in roses it will be all the better."

"I should like to see the little girls of the city stand shoulder to shoulder along the curbs, white dressed, and bombard the passing veterans with flowers."

"There need be no organization to look after the arrangements for such a demonstration. Let it come direct from the hearts of the people."

State Societies to Entertain Veterans

Picnic at Oaks Is Planned for August 20; All Citizens Invited to Take Part Whether Members or Not.

The executive committee for the federated state societies has completed its arrangement for the state picnic during the G. A. R. encampment Wednesday August 21, at the Oaks. State societies are holding special meetings and arranging the details to feed and entertain the veterans and G. A. R. auxiliary bodies.

Those societies not having completed their special arrangements will soon meet to do so. Citizens not identified with any state society, are invited to join in making this feature most enjoyable for themselves and the veterans, demonstrating Portland's hospitality.

The park management will admit free of charge all Civil war veterans wearing the G. A. R. uniform, and those of the auxiliary bodies wearing their official badge.

A special musical and entertainment program will be provided by the park management.

Soldiers Are to Have Swimming Lessons

To improve this condition and begin next week squads of soldiers from the various companies will journey to American Lake, a short distance away, and receive expert instruction in swimming.

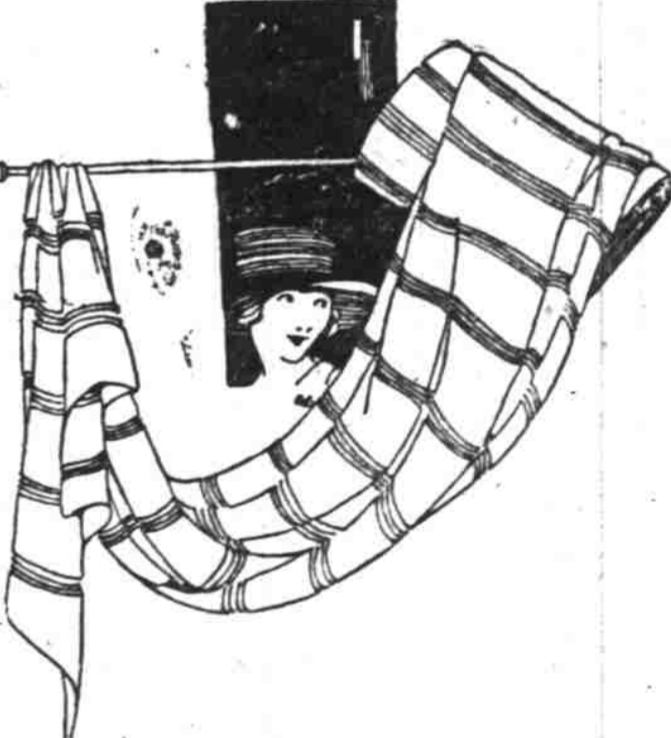
