The first offerings of California markets continue firm, with prices the season arrived on the street during the last 24 hours. Initial shipment came from the Nob Hill Fruit farm of The Dalles to the Sheridan-Beckley company. It consisted of Osage variety, and was of good quality. The stock was packed in standard crates, and the first sales were

quickly made at \$3 per crate. Cantaloupe market in general is somewhat mixed here. Some of the houses still have high priced fruit on hand, and they are holding values up accordingly. On the other hand, those that made purchases through the regular brokerage houses have secured their supplies more cheaply and these are shading values. Flats are generally selling down to \$1 per crate, though some sales are reported up to \$1.25. Greatly increased supplies are shown at California points, according to reports received during the morning.
