

THOUSANDS ENJOY RED CROSS AFFAIR

Before Noon 6000 Had Visited
Oaks and Estimated Attendance Is 30,000.

Nearly 6000 persons had visited Oaks park by noon today to take part in the big Red Cross benefit and the attractions had only begun. More than 300 machines were parked at the amusement place. Thirty thousand is the estimated attendance, according to Julius L. Meier, chairman of the Oaks Red Cross day. About 12,000 admission tickets were sold in advance. All the proceeds go to the Red Cross society.

A big dance will be held on the skating floor, which was prepared by hard-worked firms of the city, the music being furnished by the Rotary club.

The Sellwood ferry will operate until midnight and there will be special street car service in care for the crowd. A big squad of police, as well as a squad from the county sheriff's office, are guarding automobiles.

The Portland Caterers' association is prepared to serve 15,000 meals at 50 cents each, with a 25-cent dairy lunch, in a big cafeteria erected in the grounds. The entertainment program includes all the shipyard bands, special numbers in the auditorium and special features along the trail.

Highway Department Has Money on Hand

Salem, Or., Aug. 6.—A financial statement, prepared by the state highway department for submission at a meeting of the state highway commission to be held in Portland Tuesday, shows that the expenditures of the department up to August 1 of the present biennium total \$2,060,975.56. The receipts of the department for the same period have been \$3,433,127.56, so there was a balance on hand the first of the month of \$1,372,151.99.

The receipts are from the following sources: Quarter mill tax and automobile license fund \$992,501.24; \$6,000,000 bonds \$2,049,738.88; Bean-Harrett bonds \$29,831.44; total \$3,433,127.56.

It is estimated that the next allotment from the automobile license fund, which will be made by the secretary of state October 1, will be about \$125,000, which will be added to the funds on hand.

U-Boat Sinks Two Ships Near Halifax

Halifax, N. S., Aug. 6.—(U. P.)—The schooner Gladys J. Holland, bound from Newfoundland to New York, was torpedoed and sunk 15 miles off Ironbound Island Monday. Her crew was landed today at La Have.

Two more boats of the tanker Lux Blanca, torpedoed off this port Monday, were towed ashore today. Several members of the crew were saved.

Artillery Fighting Reported by Italians

Rome, Aug. 6.—Intense artillery fighting and minor infantry actions were reported today by the Italian war office. "On the Asiago plateau, on Mont Grappa and on the lower Piave there was intense reciprocal artillery fighting," the statement said. "We promptly and effectively countered the enemy's bombardment, our fire being directed at important centers and blowing up an ammunition dump on the lower Piave."

"On the Asiago plateau British detachments and our own detachments kept the enemy's trenches in a state of alarm."

"On the Piave islands our patrols gathered a quantity of war material which had been abandoned by the enemy."

Italians Destroy Six Planes
Rome, Aug. 6.—(I. N. S.)—The destruction of six more Austro-German airplanes was reported by the Italian war office today.

SYNAGOGUE TO HAVE 2 RABBIS

Rabbi Arthur S. Montaz, a recent graduate of the American Union college of Cincinnati, will occupy the pulpit of the Congregation Ahavai Shalom in cooperation with Rev. R. Abrahamson, who has been religious instructor for many years.

Rabbi Montaz, though but 28 years old, comes highly recommended as having devoted his entire life here and abroad to theological studies. He is expected here soon.

Rabbi Montaz comes to Portland at a very opportune time, as the Jewish high holidays are close at hand.

Rabbi Abrahamson began his pastorate in Portland in 1881 in the little synagogue at Sixth and Oak streets, the principal worshipping place of the exponents of conservative Judaism.

When he took over the organization had a membership of 35 families and under his guidance it has grown to over 100 families with a fine new synagogue constructed a few years ago. Few men in Portland are so well known or better loved than the venerable minister who has dealt out kindness to all who crossed his path, irrespective of creed.

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HIGHWAY COMMISSION AWARDS CONTRACT TO GRADE TO UNION COURT

Elgin-Minam Road and Union-Telocasset Section of Oregon Trail Projects Involved.

The state highway commission today awarded contracts to the county court of Union county for grading the Elgin-Minam road and the Union-Telocasset section of the old Oregon Trail.

Both roads are post road projects and are to be constructed in cooperation with the federal government. The bid of the county on the Elgin-Minam section was \$37,410. This is slightly under the engineer's estimate, \$41,151. The cost is to be borne equally by the state and the federal government.

On the Union-Telocasset section the bid of the county was \$27,474, also under the estimate of the engineer, \$30,000. The state and federal government have appropriated \$15,000 each for the work.

The highway commission instructed the state highway engineer to make a survey of a proposed road in Crook county up Crooked river for which the county has bonded itself in the sum of \$95,000.

Owing to the growing complaint regarding the absence of sign boards at cross roads the highway commission decided to ask the attorney general for an opinion as to what steps can be taken to enforce the law requiring county courts to mark roads. It is found that there is no method of enforcement new legislation will be sought.

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JEFFERSON CITIZEN WAS WELL KNOWN

Jefferson, Or., Aug. 6.—Frank M. Miller, who was born November 20, 1843, at Millersburg, Mercer county, Illinois, died at Jefferson, Or., July 5 last.

At the age of 7 years he came with his parents across the plains to Oregon, locating in Linn county. The family remained there for many years, con-

verting the wilderness into a fruitful farm.

Mr. Miller was educated in the common schools under primitive conditions. For many years he was engaged in general farming and stock raising.

May 15, 1871, Mr. Miller was married to Nancy E. Bowman. To this union two children were born, Mrs. Nora Holt and Albert A. Miller of this city. There is also a foster daughter, Mrs. Herbert Looney.

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Admiral Capelle Is About to Resign

Paris, Aug. 6.—(I. N. S.)—The resignation of Minister of Marine Admiral von Capelle is believed to be imminent, according to German newspapers. His retirement, as well as the resignation last week of Admiral von Holtzendorff, chief of the admiralty staff, is believed the result of the failure of the German ruthless submarine campaign.

Admiral von Capelle, former under-secretary of marine and the right hand of Grand Admiral von Tirpitz, succeeded his chief when the kaiser retired Tirpitz in the summer of 1916.

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"Look-out Below!" Horse Is Knocked Down by Bottle

A pint milk bottle falling from the sixth floor of the Blake-McFall building Monday afternoon struck a horse on the head and knocked him down. While the janitor, George Stauffman, was washing the windows he accidentally knocked the bottle off the ledge. He shouted to warn pedestrians, but the bottle fell out in the street. The horse is owned by Pete Hirt.

Cloth for 2,000,000 Uniforms Ordered

London, Aug. 6.—(I. N. S.)—The British government has let contracts to Glasgow cloth manufacturers for uniform cloth for 2,000,000 American soldiers, according to a dispatch from Glasgow to the Central News. As a result of these contracts and the vast amount of cloth and work involved, no cloth for civilian use will be made henceforth except under government permit.

Paris, Aug. 6.—The long range bombardment of Paris was resumed today. There were some victims and some material damage.

Men of Draft Age May Enter College

Washington, Aug. 6.—(I. N. S.)—Men of draft age who are eligible for college, may now enter the enlisted reserve corps and transfer to the student army training corps, thus making them eligible for a commission in special work, the committee on education of the war department announced today. The army needs chemists, engineers, doctors, and has taken this method of training men who have the necessary qualifications to enter college and come out with commissions.

Large Wheat Field Destroyed by Fire

Pendleton, Or., Aug. 6.—Fire in a field on the Alex Garney ranch, four miles west of this place, destroyed 40 acres of wheat shortly before noon Monday. It is thought to have started from the overheating of the friction clutch on the header. The Oregon military police made a quick run to the fire, getting there in 15 minutes from the sounding of the alarm, as also did a crowd of Boy Scouts in Dr. McKelvey's car. The grain is said to have been cutting 20 to 25 bushels to the acre.

Traffic Committee Meets
