The government cannot well be left without substantial assurance that anything lacking in local port facilities will be immediately supplied.

There are certain essentials we know

we have-a 40-foot harbor entrance, a wide estuary and a ship channel of adequate depth; it is the only fresh water harbor on the coast, barnacles drop off vessels while in this port and the ship will sail 10 to 15 per cent faster leaving the port than when it arrived, according to nautical authorities. The people of Portland have appropriated \$5,500,000 for docks, freight and grain terminals; the people of this district have never been called upon in vain for anything necessary to equip this port. Tracks already laid constitute a harbor belt line railroad, the unification of which under government administration is merely a matter of detail.
