FOR two of the boats constructed in Portland shipyards, which are soon to make their maiden voyages, the National League of Women's Service is sending out an S. O. S. for two phonographs. Any patriotic citizen who wishes to contribute to the entertainment of the men of these ships is asked to communicate with the National league headquarters at the Meier & Frank Store.

The Kanning Kitchen of the National league, which has done valiant work preparing canned foods for the army hospitals, is running low on materials and an urgent request has been sent out for all fruits, berries and vegetables. The league will furnish pickers and transportation on all small quantities available.

The second class in motor mechanics, to be opened under the auspices of the National League for Woman's Service, will begin August 12. The class can accommodate 21 girls and eight vacancies exist. All girls of the city who are interested in this course are asked to communicate immediately with the league headquarters.

The league members were on hand in force at the Oaks Tuesday afternoon and evening to assist at the Red Cross benefit, and among their contributions the sale of 5000 supper tickets, given them for disposal by Mr. Kent, secretary of the Caterers' association, who had the serving of the meals in his charge. Mrs. B. Simonds, who, with Mrs. J. D. Farrell, is in charge of the social welfare branch of the league, was chairman of the sale committee.

WAR TIME COOKERY

Homemade sauces from home-grown fruits and vegetables are first aids in serving cold meats or stretching the roasts. Every well stored pantry should have its shelf of relishes; chutney to serve with chicken, corn relish with fish, cucumber relish with steak, spiced grapes or currants with cold meats.

Apple catsup—1 quart apple sauce, 1 teaspoon ginger, 1 teaspoon cinnamon, 1 teaspoon cloves, 1 pint vinegar, 1 teaspoon pepper, 1 teaspoon mustard, 1 spoon onion extract, 2 teaspoons salt. Simmer slowly until thick, bottle and seal.

A similar catsup can be made from plums or grapes and spiced to taste. Sorghum or molasses may be added if a sweet sauce is liked.

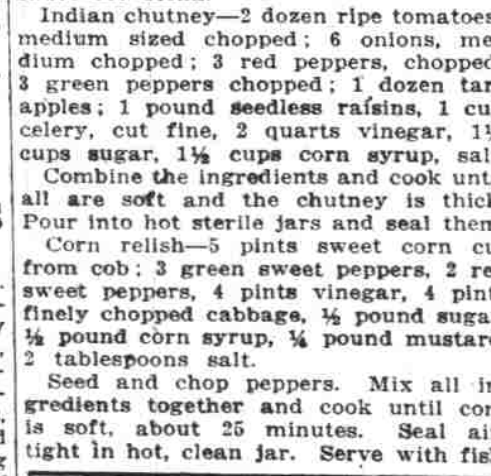
Cucumber catsup—1 dozen large cucumbers, 1 quart vinegar, 1 tablespoon salt, 1/4 teaspoon cayenne.

Gather cucumbers before sun strikes them and cut in a cool place until used. Peel and grate the cucumbers and drain off the water. Heat vinegar and spices to boiling point; pour at once over the grated cucumbers, bottle and seal. Cucumbers bottled in this way retain their freshness and make a particularly good sauce for steak.

Indian chutney—2 dozen ripe tomatoes, medium sized chopped; 6 onions, medium chopped; 3 red peppers, chopped; 3 green peppers chopped; 1 dozen tart apples; 1 pound seedless raisins, 1 cup celery, cut fine, 2 quarts vinegar, 1 1/2 cups sugar, 1 1/2 cups corn syrup, salt. Combine the ingredients and cook until all are soft and the chutney is thick. Pour into hot sterile jars and seal them.

Corn relish—5 pints sweet corn cut from cob; 3 green sweet peppers, 2 red sweet peppers, 4 pints vinegar, 4 pints finely chopped cabbage, 1/2 pound sugar, 1/4 pound corn syrup, 1/4 pound mustard, 2 tablespoons salt.

Seed and chop peppers. Mix all ingredients together and cook until corn is soft, about 25 minutes. Seal airtight in hot, clean jar. Serve with fish.

To Weigh Babies Of Glencoe District

Parent-Teacher Circle Will Measure Children in Response to Red Cross Request.

MRS. W. H. Buxton, president of the Parent-Teacher circle of Glencoe school, will have charge of the weighing and measuring of all children of the district between the ages of three months and six years on Thursday, August 8 from 10 a. m. to 1 p. m. All parents are required to bring their children as it is a government request to the Red Cross which must be attended to.

The Red Cross unit of which Mrs. Charles Hill is in charge will meet in Room 12 of the school building on the same day. There will also be Thrift Stamps for sale.

Friday evening at the Central library hall a meeting is called for all the presidents of the boys' and girls' club of rabbit, poultry, canning, home vegetable raising organization, which includes some 540 children in Portland with 125 separate clubs. This practical organization for the school children of the city is under the supervision of the Oregon Agricultural college with Miss Alice Joyce as the director or assistant club leader. There is a parent adviser over each of the clubs and these are also asked to meet with the children Friday evening at 7 o'clock. A program with practical talks and instructions along the lines of the club interests will be given and musical numbers will add an enjoyable feature. Many beneficial hints will be given the children along the lines in which they are working to help win the war.

The Sunnyside W. C. T. U. will hold a basket picnic in Laurelhurst park August 8 at 11 o'clock. At 2 o'clock the regular August meeting will be held in the park. All cordially invited.

HOUSEHOLD HINTS

If any woman reading this column tonight is one of the great army of those who are prevented from living happy, normal lives because of nerves or complaints on which no doctor can lay his hand, I wish you could go straight to her this very minute and ask her to take up some form of war work. This is not experimental advice. Over from England comes the word that nervous diseases in women have decreased 50 per cent since the outbreak of the war. This is attributed to nothing else but the fact that virtually every woman in England has a real job. By this is meant work that takes the mind entirely away from its own troubles.

That is the secret of war work as a curative agent. It does make you forget yourself. No only this—but it carries the assurance that what you are doing is vitally necessary; that you have been handed a noble life occupation to take your mind off things.

If you are nervous, if you have looked for happiness and health for a long, bitterly disappointing time, try war work. Peach kernels or the meat of peach stones can be used to flavor custard by boiling them in the milk that is to be used for the custard. Six of the kernels should be used to a quart of milk.

A beet relish can be made by mixing thoroughly one cupful of chopped cold cooked beets, two tablespoonfuls of lemon juice, two tablespoonfuls of powdered sugar, three tablespoonfuls of grated horseradish and one tablespoonful of salt.
