REV. JAMES WALTER, A RETIRED MINISTER, IS CALLED BY DEATH

Former Pastor of Centenary M. E. Church Dies at Home on Haight Street, Aged 72.

Rev. James J. Walter, a retired Methodist minister, died this morning at his home, 830 Haight street at the age of 72. He was a native of Pennsylvania and had resided in Oregon for 35 years. Mr. Walter is survived by his widow and two sons, W. and Fred Walter. Funeral services will be held at the R. T. Byrnes parlors, Friday morning at 10 a. m. and interment will be in Rose City cemetery.

Maria Spina Funeral
The funeral of Maria Spina, murdered Italian girl, was held at 2 o'clock this afternoon from St. Philip Neri Catholic church at East Fifth and Hickory streets. Father W. J. Cartwright officiated. Interment was at Riverside cemetery under the direction of J. P. Finley & Son, funeral directors. The police have so far been unable to get any trace of the murderer. Captain Circle has sent telegrams broadcasted and has assigned all his men to the case in an effort to locate Giovanni Monaco, who is the alleged murderer.

One Killed, Seven Hurt in Accidents

Six Accidents Reported to Police Headquarters in One Day Result in Death and Injuries; Four Autos Damaged.

In six traffic accidents reported Tuesday to the police, one person was killed, seven were injured and four automobiles were damaged. August Renilla, was killed at Twenty-third and Woodward streets when he was run over by his own horse and wagon.

Mrs. Anna Kennedy of 266 East Fortieth street was injured when she was knocked down by an automobile at Second and Morrison streets. Joe Wayda of 1070 Union avenue north, riding a bicycle, received injuries about the head when he collided with the automobile of Pauline McKinley at Union avenue and Mason street.

Five persons were reported slightly injured in an accident at East Fifteenth and Schuyler streets when the auto of Stiller Leonard of 1015 East Twenty-ninth street hit a Fernwood dairy milk truck. The automobile of C. M. Hoy, 114 East Twenty-eighth street, was thrown into the electric company's ditch at Fifth and Morrison streets when it was struck by a streetcar.

The automobile of A. F. Fox was slightly damaged in a collision with a Twenty-third streetcar at Sixth and Washington streets.

Foundation Company Gets New Contract
French Government Exercises Its Option for Construction of 20 More Vessels and Work Will Start Soon.

Word was received today by the Foundation company officials here that the French government has exercised its option for the construction of 20 more vessels in the Portland yards and that the contracts will be signed in New York this week.

At present there is one idle way at the Foundation plant here, but a keel will be laid within a few days. Work will be kept up at the same pace as heretofore.

The General Baratter, launched July 24, was the last ship to take the water at the Foundation plant, and no keel has been laid to take her place on the ways.

However, with the signing of the contracts, as advised in today's telegram from New York, work will be rushed without delay.

Refuses to Drill, Is Given 15-Year Term
Camp Lewis, Wash., Aug. 7.—(L. N. S.)—For refusal to drill, Private Edward F. Hollingsworth of the 30th company, 166th depot brigade, was found guilty by courtmartial today and sentenced to 15 years on Alcatraz island. He will forfeit all pay and be dishonorably discharged from the army.

Hollingsworth, in his defense, said he did not know a drafted man was obliged to obey orders until he was sworn in. He had served one enlistment in the navy and wanted to be transferred to that branch of the service. By refusing service, Hollingsworth said he thought the change to the navy would follow.

Men Over 35 Seek to Enlist in Navy
More than a dozen men between 35 and 40 years have sought enlistment in the last two days with the United States navy at the Dekum building station. Included were several members of the Portland police force.

Only recently have men above 35 been permitted to enlist in the navy, and those who have been prevented because of their age, are getting in before the extension of the draft age.

RED CROSS REALIZES MORE THAN \$9000 AS RESULT OF BIG PICNIC

More Than 16,000 Attend Affair at Oaks; 2100 Meal Tickets Sold by Women.

More than \$9000 was realized by the Portland branch of the American Red Cross from Tuesday's big picnic celebration at the Oaks, according to incomplete reports available today. The turnstiles showed about 16,000 people within the grounds, while 2100 meal tickets were sold by the National League for Women's Service.

The cigar stand realized \$400, the "gambling den" \$500, the dance hall \$400, and several thousand dollars came from the different concessions. The employees of the park made an expensive pair of silk pajamas, which finally came into the possession of George Fye of the Multnomah hotel, a drafted man, who was forced to hasten away to catch a train for the cantonment.

All the old gamblers of Portland were on hand with their fan-tan, keno and other devices for extorting money for the Red Cross. Four jazz bands furnished music at the pavilion in relays. The Foundation band won in the popularity contest. Other bands were the Grant Smith-Porter, the Albina, Supple-Bullin, and Columbia River Shipbuilding company. Miss Dorothy Lewis sang several selections.

The auditorium feature acts were given from the current bills at local theatres.

Julius L. Meier, chairman of the committee, expressed himself as pleased with the results.

"We wish to thank the members of the committee, the workers, members of the bands and all others who have helped to make the day a success," he said.

Will Is First to Be Written in Chinese

One of the shortest wills ever made and written in Chinese was filed for probate in County Judge Tawell's court this morning. The will was dated July 22. Translation appended to the document reads as follows:

"I, Lew Kwong, make this will. At present I am sick in bed and feel that I am not going to live very long and I have \$1000 insurance in the New York Life Insurance company.

Deputy County Clerk McGrew of the probate department said the will was the only one written in Chinese ever filed within his knowledge, in Multnomah county.

Captain Maginnis at Imperial Monday

Oregon Agricultural College, Corvallis, Aug. 7.—So great has been the interest in the new central officers' training schools in Portland that Captain T. F. Maginnis, professor of military science and tactics in the college, who has been especially designated as a representative of the government to receive applications and who recently took 65 applications in Portland, has decided to meet applicants at the Imperial hotel next Monday evening beginning at 5 o'clock.

Recommends Journalism
Oregon Agricultural College, Corvallis, Aug. 7.—That entomologists should take a course in journalism in order to fit themselves for getting valuable scientific information to the farmers through the newspapers, is the opinion of A. L. Lovett, entomologist in the Oregon Agricultural college, who spoke before the entomology of the Northwest now in conference.

The sessions will continue until Wednesday evening. The closing feature will be a banquet at 6:30 Wednesday.

300 Radio Men to Train
Oregon Agricultural College, Corvallis, Aug. 6.—Radio instruction will be given on a large scale at the Oregon Agricultural college, 300 men, instead of 200 as previously announced, receiving training as radio electricians to serve as non-commissioned officers in the United States signal corps. A 13 week course of instruction will be given, 100 men reporting each month. These men are expected to come from all parts of the country and will be selected because of previous experience and education.

District Attorney May Be Prosecuted

Attorney General Rules Court Can Name Prosecutor; Assault Case in Columbia County Brings Opinion.

Salem, Aug. 7.—Attorney General Brown today advised Governor Withycombe, in a written opinion, that when a district attorney is charged with a crime the circuit court has authority to appoint an attorney to prosecute the case against him.

The opinion applies to the situation in Columbia county, where District Attorney Glen R. Metesker, it is alleged, assaulted Ham. Kauffman, 70 years old, editor of the Columbia County Herald, published at Houlton.

In an article in his paper Kauffman gives an account of the attack and says he was brutally assaulted by the district attorney because of a statement made in his paper to the effect that the government was to render a good service to itself and the community if it would draft useless attorneys, including the district attorney for Columbia county.

As the result of the opinion of the attorney general, it is expected that the prosecution of Metesker will follow.
