

CAMPAIGN TO INDUCE DAIRYMEN TO REMAIN IN BUSINESS IS ON

Meeting of Producers, Dealers and Consumers Friday to Consider Big Problem.

Effort to induce dairymen to keep their cows and stay in business in spite of the high cost of feed, labor and the shortage of pasture caused by drought, and to induce consumers to pay enough for the milk product at least to permit the dairymen to break even, will be taken by an executive committee representing all classes of producers and consumers. The committee will hold its first meeting Friday afternoon at 1:30 o'clock. The personnel has just been announced by Director O. D. Center of the extension division of the Oregon Agricultural college, who was made general chairman at the preliminary meeting of producers, consumers and state and city officials on July 30.

The committee is as follows: State Dairy and Food Commissioner J. D. Mickle; Oregon Agricultural college, Professor P. M. Brandt and Director O. D. Center; Portland health bureau, Dr. D. W. Mack; consumers and child welfare, Mrs. Sadie Orr Dunbar, Walter S. Asher; business men, Robert Lincoln Sabin; milk shippers, Thomas Carmichael of Hillsboro; cream shippers, William Schellmerick of Gaston; producers-distributors, W. K. Taylor of Corvallis and H. M. Selvert of Portland; milk distributors, W. D. Wheelwright and Pat O'Donnell, both of Portland; butter and cheese manufacturers, A. Jensen and O. G. Simpson, both of Portland; ice cream manufacturers, J. E. Dunne of Portland; condensed milk manufacturers, Carl Schalling of Portland. "Some of the startling facts already revealed," says E. C. Calloway, secretary of the committee and city milk chemist, in announcing Friday's meeting, "are that there are many children in our cities and small towns that are getting no milk at all in their diet. Even now there are some sections of the city of Portland where it is hard to get any kind of milk delivered. Good dairy cows are being sold for meat and the promise is that in another year or so even if the war ends, we will have a serious milk famine."

Horse Meat Market May Decide Status

Camp Lewis, Wash., Aug. 8.—What is the future of a horse meat market? That is the question which the camp exemption board here has to decide. A soldier drafted from one of the eight states which contribute troops to the national army here has made a claim in which he asks that he be discharged to support his mother. In the affidavit supporting his claim he says his brother owns and operates a horse meat market and that the profits from it at present are not sufficient to support their mother who is dependent on them. Now the board has to consider whether or not the public will take to the idea of eating horse meat to such an extent that the market will be operated at a profit and enable the civilian brother to care for his mother.

Steamer Is Sunk by U-Boat Off Hatteras

Washington, Aug. 8.—(U. P.)—The American steamer Merak was shelled, torpedoed and sunk by a submarine at 1:50 p. m. August 6, 15 miles northeast of Diamond Shoals light ship, off Cape Hatteras, the navy department announced today.

The Merak was a vessel of 2023 gross tons.

Hunting Season May Be Postponed Again

Salem, Or., Aug. 8.—When the state board of forestry meets in Portland Friday it will take up the question of whether a request shall be made for postponing the opening of the hunting season as a precaution against forest fires. State Forester Elliott stated today, however, that if cool weather continues he does not believe it will be necessary to postpone the opening.

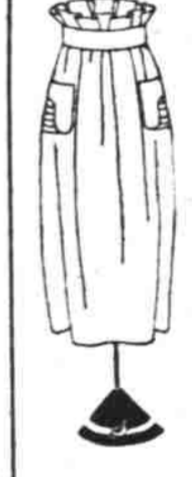
