Hygiene Classes Are Organized In Klamath

Care of Sick Also to Be Taught and Course of Study of Red Cross Explained.

A NEWLY organized class in elementary hygiene and care of the sick was instituted by the Red Cross chapter at Klamath Falls Wednesday at the domestic science rooms of the public school. Arrangements for the course of study to be taken up by mothers with young and growing children, and other married women were made.

The second class arranged for girls from the age of 15 will meet Wednesday evening to organize classes. The course of study adopted by the Red Cross chapter will be fully explained at that time. Mrs. Cecia M. Beardsley is in charge of the registrations.

Under the auspices of the woman's committee of the Council of Defense, a highly successful community sing was held in the Klamath Falls, Or., last Sunday. It was the first affair of the kind to be held in the town. The City park was the scene of the patriotic event, beginning at 7 o'clock Sunday evening. Local citizens entered into the sing with a splendid spirit that made it a decided success. The "Star Spangled Banner" was the opening number. This was followed by the salute to the flag, the emblem used being the beautiful banner which belongs to the daughters of the American Revolution. Roderick Crosby, Boy Scout, carried the flag into the park, followed by 12 nurses of the Dalles hospital in uniform. The fact that it was Sunday didn't restrain the crowd from loudly applauding. Mrs. Carlton P. Williams ably directed the singing, with the assistance of William Hargrave, violinist, and Miss Prudence Patterson, pianist. Mrs. C. J. Crandall, chairman of the woman's committee, announced that the particular mission of the committee at the present time is to recruit for the nurses' reserve. She stated that community sings will hereafter be held at the depot when men of the draft leave for camp. A delegation of Dalletsites went to Dufur to conduct a community sing at the City park there Monday evening, and work for the nurses' reserve.

Mrs. Robert D. Inman, who has charge of the Dallets League fund, has contracted with members of the colored Women's Council to cook, serve and wash dishes for future patriotic entertainments. The money earned by this method is to be used by the council for charitable purposes. Mrs. Inman says that in her opinion colored cooks are the best, and beginning with last Friday's affair at the auditorium, she gave the colored women a chance to prove their efficiency along this line.

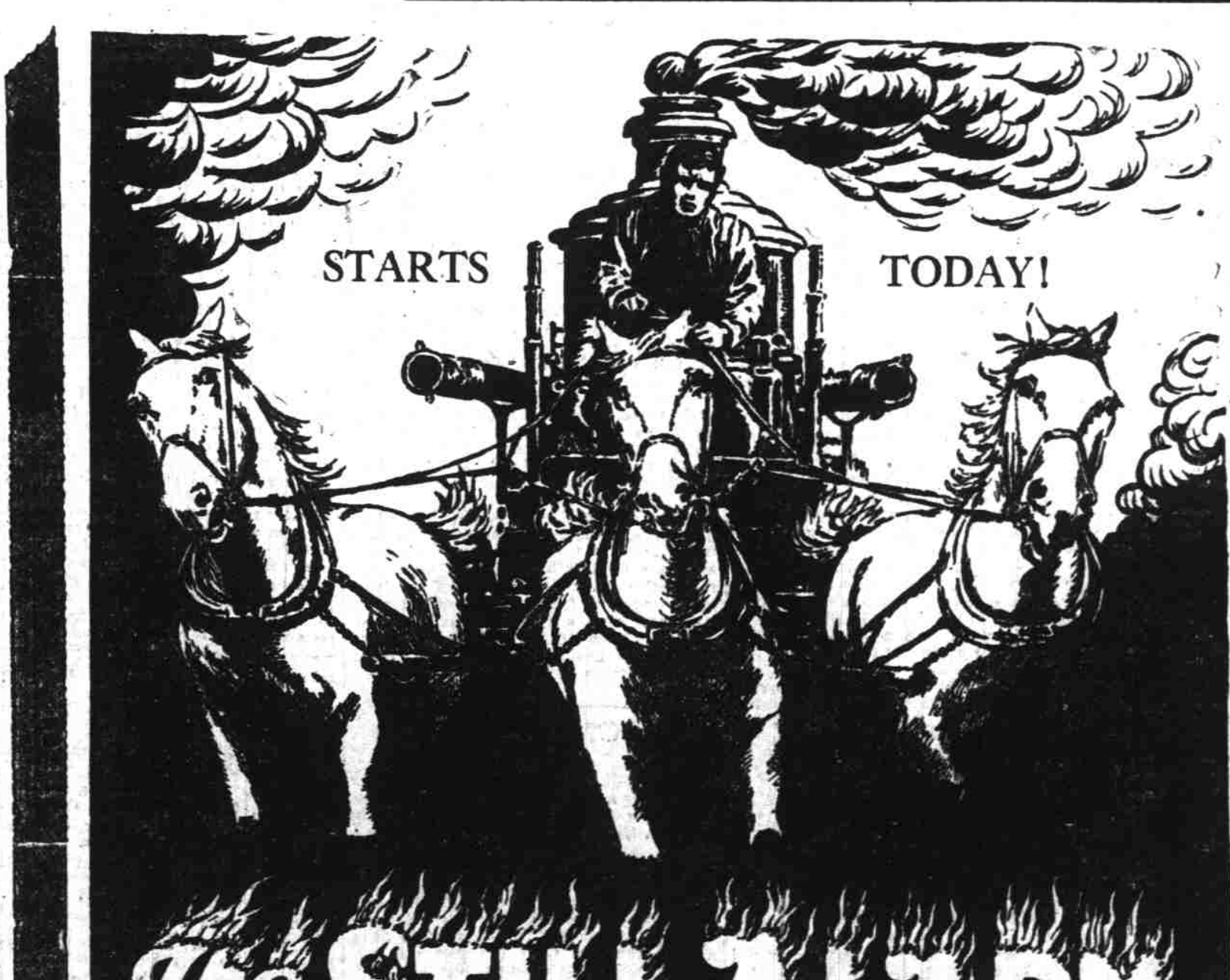
