Housewives Are Urged to Save Garbage

FIFTY dollars a day for the Red Cross through the saving of garbage suitable for hog feed is the gift that Portland housewives have within their power. The latest call for conservation, backed by the food administration, is for the conservation of kitchen waste into pork.

By a new city ordinance the Red Cross will benefit directly through all increases in these sales of garbage.

Housewives are urged to save garbage and to keep it separate from harmful and injurious substances. It will be properly collected and cared for by the garbage men. The difficulty is to procure enough to supply the demand. Portland's kitchen waste, if all conserved, would feed 5000 hogs a day, say statisticians. Information concerning the project will be supplied by the Patriotic Conservation League, Main 4170.

All food values must be carefully saved. Egg shells, coffee grounds, broken glass, tin cans, etc., should be kept separate. Rags and waste paper, bags, boxes, newspapers and magazines, should be tied in bundles for collection every 20 days.

War Auxiliaries Meet in Court House

Adjutant General to Recommend Exemption Buttons; Council Not Indorsed.

SEVERAL matters of especial interest came before the weekly meeting Monday afternoon of the war auxiliaries central committee which gathered together representatives of the various army auxiliaries at the courthouse, room 291, to discuss business of general interest to their work for the boys in the service.

A letter was read from the adjutant general's office in Washington, D. C., which thanked the Portland central committee for a suggestion recently made by them that the government furnish an exemption button for all men exempted from the service because of physical disability for the army and navy or honorably discharged from the service due to no fault of their own. He thanked them not only for the suggestion but for the patriotic spirit that prompted them and stated that the matter would be placed before congress by the war department.

An invitation was also read from the War Mothers of America inviting representatives from the Portland auxiliaries to convene with them at Evansville, Ind., in the first War Mothers' council which has been held in America.

Inasmuch as the government has requested people not to travel unnecessarily and as the volume of work laid out by the American Red Cross and other official sources with their individual work for the boys at the front already taxes these organizations to the limit of their time, it was the voice of the women attending the meeting not to recommend to their various auxiliaries that delegates be sent. The invitation will, however, be read before each auxiliary.

Cornmeal Muffins

Cheese Rabbit
One tablespoon butter or butter substitute; 1/2 pound of soft mild cheese; 1/2 teaspoon salt; 1/2 teaspoon mustard; few grains cayenne; 1/2 cup milk; 1 egg. Melt fat, add cheese and seasonings; as cheese melts, add milk gradually while stirring constantly; then egg slightly beaten. Serve on toasted brown bread.
