

NABS THOMPSON WHILE TAKING A DRINK OF WATER

Deputy Sheriff Jas. Jessee Takes Escaped Convict as Criminal Drinks From Columbia.

NO RESISTANCE IS OFFERED

Murderer Claims He Was on Way to Canada to Join Army and Escape Capture.

Bennett Thompson, the murderer, who escaped from the Oregon penitentiary at Salem July 30, was captured Monday afternoon at Italer, Or., by Deputy Sheriff James Jessee of Columbia county, who is also chief of police at Rainier.

Thompson was serving a life sentence for the murder of Helen Jennings and Fred Ristman. He killed the woman by smashing her head with an axe and then shot Ristman with a revolver. Helen Jennings lived on a farm near Tualatin, and Ristman was a Portland jitney driver who had been hired by Thompson before the murder was committed.

The capture was made at 1 o'clock in the afternoon as Thompson was stopping over and drinking from the Columbia river from the banks at Rainier. Jessee stood behind the man until he had finished quenching his thirst and then Thompson turned around to face the large revolver. He immediately surrendered and admitted his identity a little later.

Thompson Taken to Salem Jessee took his captive to St. Helens, arriving at 5 o'clock. Warden Murphy of the state penitentiary had been notified meanwhile and was at St. Helens to meet the convict. Guard Murbuck and Deputy Sheriff H. F. Leabo and Clarence Beckner of Portland accompanied Murphy in an automobile to escort Thompson back to Salem. The machine arrived an hour later in Portland and stopped for a moment at the courthouse to change guards for the prisoner and then sped to Salem, where the criminal was placed in a safe, solitary cell.

"If I had my gun just five minutes more before I was captured," remarked Thompson on the way to the penitentiary, "I would have boarded the boat across the river and then would have taken to the waters of the Columbia. I would have made it to Seattle or I could easily beat my way on north into Canada. And I'll bet you can't guess what I would have done after I got to Canada. I would join the Canadian forces and then I would like to see you fellows try to get me back. You sure would have some time trying it, believe me."

Boat Obtained in St. Johns When asked how he made it all the way to Rainier, Thompson replied: "Well, Thurber and I escaped together by swimming through the hole in the bars under the water's surface in the flume. We then hiked to Malloy along the Oregon Electric line and then walked to Oswego, where we waited for a short time. Then we hiked to the hills for Milwaukee and finally separated at Lent's Thurber got caught. I know, but I got to St. Johns in Portland and obtained a rowboat which took me to Linton. I have been hitting the trail since the hills and through the woods ever since all the way to Rainier."

"There was one thing that I told Thurber not to do," Thompson went on, "I told him never under any consideration to travel in the day time. I did just the opposite and never traveled at night. You can surely say my reason for this, because I was afraid that he couldn't make his getaway."

Thompson had in his possession some sugar, oatmeal and several biscuits. He was dressed in khaki shorts, tan shoes and wore a blue sweater under a gray overcoat. He was wearing a light tan slouch hat. Two prison-made keys were found in his pockets.

Suffragettes Again Put Under Arrest

Washington, Aug. 13.—(I. N. S.)—Militant suffragettes, attempting to continue the demonstration of protest which has been in progress since the arrest of 48 of their number, struck a similar snag this afternoon when the police swooped down upon them at their meeting place in Lafayette park, opposite the White House. Forty among whom many were arrested last week, and were out on bail awaiting a hearing Tuesday, were taken to police headquarters for arraignment.

Felons Are Barred From Army Service

Washington, Aug. 13.—(I. N. S.)—The war department under no circumstances will take men from penitentiaries and prisons for service in the army. Secretary Baker announced this afternoon. The suggestion that convicts of lesser crimes might be better off in the army has been under consideration, the secretary admitted, but there will be no change in the policy of the department.

Mrs. Balabo Dies From Poison Effects

Mrs. F. Balabo, 309 Russell street, who attempted suicide about a week ago by swallowing bichloride of mercury tablets, died Monday at the Good Samaritan hospital. It is said that her husband is at Camp Lewis. She has no relatives in Portland. She was 18 years of age.

Council of Defense Extensions Urged

Washington, Aug. 12.—(I. N. S.)—Immediate extension of state council of defense organizations, so as to reach the smallest communities in the country, and further state and federal aid, were urged by President Wilson in a letter to Secretary Baker.

ANNA HELD, famous French actress, who died Monday in New York city after long illness.



Popular Comedienne Loses in Brave Fight Against Giving Up Life.

New York, Aug. 13.—Anna Held, the noted actress, died Monday in her apartment at the Hotel Savoy.

The popular little French actress had made a gallant fight against death for nearly six months. She suffered from a rare bone disease, but finally succumbed to pneumonia, contracted 10 days ago. Many times during her illness hope was almost abandoned, but her strong vitality and continual cheerfulness in the face of great suffering brightened the days. Until she was stricken with pneumonia, she was expected to be one of the few recorded cases of recovery from the malady from which she suffered.

Mrs. Lillian Russell Moore of Pittsburg is directed to make the funeral arrangements and to decide upon the plot where the body of Anna Held will be buried, according to the will of the late actress. This information came today in a telegram from Charles F. Hanlon of San Francisco, executor of Miss Held's estate. Mrs. Moore, who is on a vacation tour in the Blue Ridge mountains, has been notified.

Mrs. Held's estate is of an estimated value of \$200,000. Her daughter, Liane Carrera, an actress, is the sole legatee. Bay Shore, N. Y., Aug. 13.—Harry Gifford, noted comedian, whose real name was Frank B. Graff, is dead at his home here, aged 53. Mr. Graff had appeared infrequently on the stage in recent years. He was born in Washington, D. C.

President Unable To Come to Pacific

Washington, Aug. 13.—(WASHINGTON BUREAU OF THE JOURNAL)—President Wilson in a letter to Senator Jones of Washington said he will be unable to accept any of the numerous invitations to visit the Pacific coast this year. He said that he would do so was inspired by a recent letter to Representative Randall, telling of his desire to make the Western trip. The president intended to forego any vacation and will remain in Washington.

Aviator Locates Negro Murderer

Tulsa, Okla., Aug. 13.—(I. N. S.)—The chief of police at Dewey was killed Monday by a negro whom he was trying to arrest. The city clerk was injured. A mob formed and an airplane from Dewey rose and located the fleeing negro, who was arrested. Later the entire negro settlement at Dewey was given the torch. The negro was removed for safekeeping.

KLAMATH COUNTY SAWMILL BURNS

Robins Plant at Swan Lake Total Loss, but Is Partially Covered by Insurance; Two Hurt.

Klamath Falls, Aug. 13.—A sawmill owned and operated by John M. Robins at Swan Lake, about 20 miles east of this city, was destroyed by fire Thursday, with a loss of about \$10,000, partially insured. The blaze is believed to have started from a spark, which lodged in the roof of the mill building. The mill, surrounding lumber and tramways were burned to the ground. Robins himself was slightly burned and his son was severely burned on the arm while fighting the blaze. The mill had a daily capacity of about 30,000 feet. It had been engaged this season in getting out lumber for the Big Lakes Box company of this city.

New Flour Mill to Be Built Klamath Falls, Aug. 13.—The Malin Milling company has been organized by local parties, who are planning to erect a 50-barrel flour mill at Malin, a Bohemian settlement 20 miles south of this city, this fall. They have arranged to incorporate the new company for \$25,000 and are now putting material on the ground for the new foundation. Officers of the new organization are: A. Kalina, president; John Cacka, vice-president; Anton Petrask, manager; V. J. Spolek, treasurer; and M. M. Stansky, secretary. The contract has been let for the erection of the building and the grain bins, which will consume in the neighborhood of 200,000 feet of lumber in their construction.

Fountain Drinks and "Pop" May Be Taxed

Washington, Aug. 13.—The house ways and means committee Monday voted to tax ice cream soda, sodas and other delicacies at a soda fountain at the rate of 2 cents for each 10 cents or fraction thereof. In addition to this the committee adopted a 10 per cent tax on bottled soft drinks to be paid by the manufacturers. Under this system bottled soft drinks will have to bear both the manufacturer's tax and the retail sales tax of 10 cents or more.

One Dying Result Of Six-Cent Fare Riots

Detroit, Mich., Aug. 13.—(I. N. S.)—One policeman is dying and many other persons are suffering from wounds inflicted in riots Saturday, Sunday and Monday growing out of the differences between the city and the Detroit United Railways company over an advance to 6 cents for street car fares. The company ordered its car crews to halt all cars when any passenger refused to pay the additional cent and traffic has been practically suspended for 36 hours.

Big Reconstruction Hospital Completed

St. Louis, Aug. 13.—(I. N. S.)—A great reconstruction hospital—the first to be established west of Washington—has just been completed at Jefferson Barracks. Fresh from the battlefields of France, the first contingent of wounded American soldiers shortly will be received at the new institution. Soon there will be from 1200 to 1500 under treatment at the hospital.

Government Ration Of Germany Deadly

Zurich, via Paris, Aug. 13.—The German Socialist organ, Vorwaerts, commenting on the food shortage, says: "Those who must content themselves with the official rations are doomed to a certain and early death."

Naval Recruit Is Drowned

Seattle, Aug. 13.—(I. N. S.)—Joseph F. Powers, Company 4, naval training station, who enlisted in Chicago, was drowned from a canoe in which he was riding on Lake Washington Sunday, according to a statement of Sheriff Stringer here today.
