

### SPECIAL SEASON FOR PHEASANTS

#### State Game Warden Takes Steps to Protect Umatilla County Crops From Chinese Birds.

Pendleton, Or., Aug. 13.—Chinese pheasants may be killed in Umatilla county by securing a special permit from the state game warden. Permits will be issued wherever licenses are sold and will be effective during the first seven days of September. The limit is five male birds in seven days.

### Chicago Feels Heat Wave Again Today

Chicago, Aug. 13.—(I. N. S.)—Hardly having caught its breath from the heat wave which sometimes at a speed of 10 degrees an hour drove the thermometer Monday to 101, Chicago awoke today to prospects of continued hot weather. At 11 o'clock Monday the thermometer registered 75. At 4 o'clock it was 101, a jump of 26 degrees. Three deaths attributed to heat were reported.

### Monaco Is Believed To Be Under Arrest

A man answering the description of Giovanni Monaco, alleged murderer of Maria Spina, has been arrested at Vancouver, B. C., by the immigration authorities and is being held for identification. According to a telegram received this morning at detective headquarters the man under arrest gave the name of Monaco. The prisoner is being returned to Seattle and Inspector Joe Morak left this afternoon to identify him. Italians advanced the money this morning to pay Morak's expenses.

### Upstate Fire Loss In July \$275,835

Salem, Or., Aug. 13.—Fire losses in the state outside of Portland during the month of July totaled \$275,835, according to figures compiled by State Fire Marshal Wells. These figures include the \$170,000 loss sustained by the big Heppner fire. There were 55 fires in the state, of which nine were caused by defective flues.

### ONLY 62 WEST SIDE HOUSES ARE VACANT, SAY CITY POSTMEN

#### Architects to Urge City to Employ Housing Expert to Look After the Housing Problem.

Employment of an expert to look after the housing problem of Portland will be urged upon the city commissioners at their meeting Wednesday morning, by the Oregon Chapter of the American Institute of Architects. Investigations by the architects show a dearth of residence property and prospect of an influx of 3000 more workmen during the next few months.

According to a survey made by mail carriers under direction of Postmaster Myers, but 62 houses are vacant on the west side, only 23 of which are in good repair. On the east side conditions are slightly better. Apartment houses are reported to be filled to capacity.

The only relief being afforded in the housing situation comes from a few owners of vacant property who are building moderate priced residences for sale or rent. Jaeger Bros. have under construction 21 houses in St. Johns and the J. A. Wickman company has proposed to build 50 homes in Hawthorne and Rose City Park. A few apartment houses are under construction and other building operations on a small scale are under way, but the aggregate housing capacity is insufficient.
