

PORTLAND MAKES READY TO RECEIVE G. A. R. DELEGATES

Flags, Bunting and Window
Cards Welcoming Veterans to
Be Displayed Throughout City.

AUTOS AND ROOMS NEEDED

Few Visitors Are Already Here,
But Majority Are Expected to
Come Saturday and Sunday.

Liberty Temple is taking on a gala appearance with flags and bunting, preparatory to the National G. A. R. encampment which opens next week. The executive committee is decorating the streets, Liberty Temple and G. A. R. headquarters, and the people of Portland are expected to put out their flags and bunting to add to the general effect. A window card has been furnished to the merchants to be displayed in their windows, welcoming the delegates to Portland.

The official train, carrying the head officers of the G. A. R., the Ladies of the G. A. R., Women's Relief Corps, and Daughters of Veterans, will arrive tonight over the Northern Pacific, and will be welcomed to the city by General Charles F. Beebe, chairman of the reception committee. On Friday official headquarters will open at the various hotels where the different units are stationed.

Automobiles Are Sought

A few delegates are already beginning to arrive, but the greater part of them are expected Saturday and Sunday. The Kansas delegation will arrive in Portland on a special train Saturday afternoon at 2:45 o'clock. A party of 30 from Columbus, Ohio, will arrive at 3:30 p. m. Sunday, and special cars from Boise, Salt Lake and St. Paul have been reported to Frank McCrellis, secretary of the executive committee, by the Union Pacific system as being on the way. W. J. Roope, who has been in charge of automobiles during the different drives of the city, has been made director of autos and will have charge of transportation and meeting the trains. Automobiles are needed badly, and women of Portland who drive automobiles are asked by Mr. Roope to telephone the transportation department, 313 A. R. headquarters, Main 313, offering every possible car for use, as much of the time during encampment as they are willing.

5000 Rooms Are Needed

Nearly 4500 rooms were listed Tuesday, which brings the number to 5000, but nearly 10,000 more will be needed to care for the visitors.

Plenty of martial music will be one of the features of encampment week. A massed band concert of 200 pieces at Laurelhurst park Sunday afternoon at 3 o'clock in honor of the commander in chief and grand officers, will be the first official event of the week.

The First regiment, spruce division, band; the Second regiment, spruce division, band, and the Multnomah Guard band will furnish the music, and all Portland is invited. These three bands will also play in the big parade Tuesday, with other musicians in the city who have volunteered their services. The Veterans' Rifle and Drum corps, a survival of the Civil war, will come from the four corners of the country to feature in the parade.

Big Grandstand Planned

The grandstand for seating the Grand Army veterans to witness the big parade on Tuesday, will be erected Sunday on the postoffice grounds, facing Morrison and Fifth streets. It will seat 2500 persons and none but G. A. R. veterans will be given seats. Colonel George A. Hosley, Chester, N. H., chief of staff, will have charge of the parade. He will arrive Friday night.

General orders have been issued by the executive committee, asking for the presence of at least one member of each committee from now until after the encampment is over, at the headquarters of Liberty temple.

The Iowa society headquarters will be at the Imperial hotel, where Iowa visitors may obtain information and addresses of friends who live in Oregon, as well as information concerning the Iowa picnic at Oaks park Tuesday.

Members of the Multnomah Bar association, at a meeting Tuesday night, volunteered the use of 50 automobiles during the encampment and pledged cooperation in securing rooms for the visitors.

Members of the Missouri society and all other persons hailing from Missouri are requested to meet in the blue room of the Portland hotel Friday at 8 p. m. The purpose of the meeting is to discuss plans for cooperation with other state societies in entertaining the G. A. R. visitors at the picnic to be held at the Oaks on August 26. All the state societies in Portland will participate.

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Loser at Gambling Draws Gun, Taking Winner's \$400 Roll

Revolvers, gambling, hand-to-hand fighting and a racing automobile formed the plot of an exciting episode in which several colored men figured Monday afternoon.

The row is said to have started in a club at Ninth and Gilman streets after a man had lost a considerable sum gambling. One of the men was accused of taking the money dishonestly and the loser whipped out a revolver, took the winner's entire roll of about 400 and ran into the street. A wild dash was made and the man with the money fired a shot at one of his pursuers, the bullet missing him and lodging in the wall of John Fletcher's restaurant. One of the proprietors of the "club" chased the thief in his automobile but was unable to catch him. The party was broken up so suddenly that no arrests could be made and the identity of the fugitive is a mystery to the police.

Monaco Is Still Held In Vancouver, B. C.

A telephone call from Inspector Joe Morak at Seattle this morning stated that the immigration officials at Vancouver, B. C. refused to return Giovanni Monaco to Seattle for identification, so Morak will proceed to Vancouver. Upon additional information the police are firmer in their belief that the immigration officials have caught the slayer of Maria Spina.

British Bring Down 37 German Machines

London, Aug. 14.—Thirty-seven German machines were brought down by the British Monday, the war office announced tonight. Forty-five tons of bombs were dropped on various German targets. Twelve British machines are missing.

Bend Editor in City

R. W. Sawyer, wife and little daughter of Bend are guests at the Portland. Mr. Sawyer is editor of the Bend Bulletin and also head of War Savings and other war activities in his county. He leaves for home tonight. Mrs. Sawyer remains with her little daughter, who goes today to St. Vincent's hospital for an operation on her throat.

OCCUPATIONS ARE FACING WAR TAX

Businesses and Professions Earning More Than \$2000 Hit in New Revenue Bill.

Washington, Aug. 14.—An occupation tax of \$10 a year on every business, occupation and profession earning \$2000 or more a year was adopted by the ways and means committee as a new section of the revenue bill. On wholesale concerns doing a business of \$200,000 or more a year the tax will be \$25.

The only exceptions from payment of the occupational tax are employees, farmers, clergymen and school teachers. It will include lawyers, dentists, authors, engineers and artists.

No estimate has been received by the committee from the treasury department as to the amount of money the tax will produce.

After Secretary McAdoo has completed his statement, the committee hopes to be able to reach an agreement upon the war profits and excess profits section, so that the bill will be ready for introduction in the house next Monday. All of the other sections of the bill have been practically completed, and the estimates from the various sources of taxation imposed are within \$500,000,000 of the desired total of \$2,000,000,000.

The luxury tax section has been revised and definitely agreed upon by the committee. It is one of the most interesting sections of the bill, affecting as it does a larger proportion of the population than any other schedule in the measure. Here is the full text of the luxury section as it will appear in the final draft of the bill:

Many Articles Hit

"From and after November 1, 1918, there shall be levied, assessed and collected on the consumption and use of the following enumerated articles a tax equal to 20 per cent of the amount paid in excess of the amount specified:

1. Fiber carpets and rugs in excess of \$5 per square yard.
2. Picture frames, \$10 each.
3. Trunks, \$50 each.
4. Valises, traveling bags, suitcases, hat boxes used by travelers and filled toilet cases, \$25 each.
5. Purse, pocketbooks, shopping and handbags, \$7.50 each.
6. Umbrellas, parasols and sunshades, \$4 each.
7. Fans, \$1.
8. House or smoking jackets, or coats, and bath or lounging robes, \$10.

Boys and Girls of City Asked to Aid Distributing Cards

E. D. Timms, chairman of the decorations committee for the G. A. R. encampment, has issued an appeal for boys and girls to assist the committee in placing the official welcome and souvenir cards in windows throughout the city, in every business and residence district.

Mr. Timms invites all children, especially grandsons and grand-daughters of Civil war soldiers, to contribute this help by reporting at Liberty Temple after 8 o'clock Thursday morning. He announces that carfare will be paid by the committee.

The cards show the official G. A. R. insignia, in colors, with the words "Portland Welcomes You" in large letters.

- Men's and boys' suits and overcoats, not including uniforms for the army and navy, \$50.
- Women's and misses' suits, cloaks and coats, \$40; if made up, by a tailor or seamstress, \$50.
- Women's and misses' dresses, if bought ready made, \$40; if made up by seamstress, \$50.
- Women's and misses' hats, bonnets and hoods, \$25.
- Men's and boys' hats, \$5.
- Men's and boys' shoes, \$2.
- Men's, women's, misses' and boys' boots, shoes, pumps and slippers, \$10.
- Men's and boys' neckwear and neckties, \$2.
- Men's and boys' silk stockings or hose, \$2.
- Women's and misses' silk stockings or hose, \$2.
- Men's shirts, \$3.
- Pajamas and nightgowns, \$3.

Other Articles Enumerated

"There shall also be levied, assessed and collected a tax equal to 1 cent for each 10 cents or fraction thereof paid for the following enumerated articles:

- "On all perfumes, essences, extracts, toilet water, cosmetics, petroleum jellies, pomades, hair dressings, hair restoratives, hair dyes, tooth and mouth washes, dentifrices, pastes, aromatic cachou, toilet soaps and powders, or any similar substance, and a 10 per cent tax on the amount paid for pills, tablets, powders and other proprietary medicines, lotions and the like."
- The taxes on cosmetics and proprietary articles will be collected as stamp taxes from the consumers.
- The committee has under consideration a proposal to make some allowance for the depletion of oil and gas wells and a proposed amendment by Representative Helvering of Kansas to increase the super taxes on all incomes above \$75,000.

ITALIAN BLOW IN ALPS IS EXPECTED

Twenty-five Mile Front in Mountains Near Swiss Border May See First Battles of War.

Washington, Aug. 14.—(U. P.)—An Italian offensive in the Alps appears imminent, according to General Emilio Gugliemotti, military attache of the Italian embassy, from the general headquarters of the Italian supreme command.

The Italians are reported to have opened an intense artillery fire in the mountainous zone near the Swiss border along a front of approximately 25 miles. The sector is the highest of the entire battle line and has been practically free from fighting since the beginning of the war.

The Austro-Germans recently concentrated heavy infantry and artillery forces in the Trentino regions. The Alps are protecting the west flank of these forces. Military authorities here point out that a successful Italian thrust through the mountains would endanger the Trentino positions of the enemy and disrupt the plans for an Austrian mountain offensive.

The Italian attacks center against the enemy positions in the zone of Valtellina, on the Tonale and at the head waters of the Val Di Genova.

Alpine storm troops have taken Mount Montello and were reported as being advancing up Mount Albiolo and in the regions of the headwaters of the Val Di Genova. The battle line extends along the Austro-Italian frontier and stretches across several glaciers.

Austrians Retire in Albania

Rome, Aug. 14.—(U. P.)—Austrian forces on Tuesday evacuated all occupied points south of the Semeri river in Albania. It was announced here today, Italian and French troops cleared practically the entire region south of the Semeri in their recent offensive.

First Housing Annex Started

Vallejo, Cal., Aug. 14.—(U. P.)—Commandant Harry George, of the Mare island navy yards, addressed a huge crowd today at the ground breaking ceremonies for the new government housing annex to Vallejo. The first unit of the government's annex will cost \$1,125,000 and will house 1000 Mare island employees and families, the commandant says.
