**WEATHER CONDITIONS**

The weather is much cooler in parts of Idaho, Nevada and Utah, and much warmer in parts of British Columbia. The temperature is generally above normal in the Central and Middle Western states and below normal in other sections.

**Mysterious Man in Sought**—An urgent call came into the police station late Thursday night stating that there was a prowler around the residence at 400 North Twenty-fifth street who had been making strange pencil marks on the front doors of the houses in that neighborhood. The prowler was nowhere to be seen when Officers Norene and Foster arrived at the scene in the patrol auto but people in the vicinity described him as being a man of very large build.

**Hawker is Arrested**—Crying out his wares from the street, when he only had a license to peddle from house to house, cost William Maher a \$25 fine in the municipal court Thursday. Maher was arrested when Commissioner Kellaher saw him calling out to the residents of Adams and Nicolai streets. The peddling license is \$15 and the hawkers' license \$30.

Annual Saving of Large Sum Made by Federal Control

Washington, Aug. 16.—(I. N. S.)—

Savings through efficient management and consolidation of railroads under federal control in the Northwestern United States computed on an annual basis, have amounted to \$25,229,352.45, the railroad administration announced today.

Of this \$21,155,954 was saved through elimination of duplicating services in freight trains, and \$1,338,726 in freight exchanges at Kansas City alone saved \$12,948, the announcement states, and the joint switching in the Lake Superior region saved \$489,618, while re-routing in this region of war shipments saved \$660,000. Joint uses of terminals Omaha saved \$212,970 at Duluth \$126,376 and St. Louis \$437,466.
