Churches of Nearly Every Denomination Plan Special Programs to Honor Heroes of '61.

PASTORS TO LIST ROOMS

Preachers Asked by Committee to Urge People Provide Quarters for Aged Veterans Next Week.

MEMBERS of the Grand Army of the Republic and their wives are to play a prominent part in this Sunday's church services in Portland. Churches in nearly every denomination have planned special programs in honor of the "grand old men" who are veterans in our city.

At the urgent request of your civic bodies Portland was awarded the G. A. R. convention for 1918, and it is expected that at least 25,000 people will be our guests during the week of August 18. They are here at your request and the door of your home must be thrown open to them and every citizen should give rooms to as many as possible in order that we will not have raised thousands of dollars to send people away from our city knocking and criticizing us.

HEBREWS TO HEAR FOREMOST CANTOR

Rev. Herman Marchbein of New York Has Been Engaged by Congregation Ohav Torah.

THE Hebrews living in Portland, who plan to attend the services at the First Street congregation Ohav Torah during the coming holidays, will have the opportunity of hearing Rev. Herman Marchbein, one of the foremost cantors of this country. He has been engaged by the congregation and is expected to arrive in Portland Thursday night, but he will not be heard before August 31. Meanwhile he will devote his time making the necessary rehearsals with the choir.

Rev. Mr. Marchbein studied in conservatories abroad to become an opera singer and was to make his first appearance when his parents dissuaded him. He then came to America with a hope that he would be able to appear in the opera here, but his parents followed him, and he found it necessary to vow that he would never appear on the stage. His father is Rev. Lazar Marchbein of Wilkesbarre, and his grandfather is known as the great cantor composer of Poland. His uncle is Rabbi Rosen of the Roumanian synagogue of New York. It is possible that the cantor will sing in concert here before he leaves.

C. E. Conferences Furnish Program Of Much Interest

SCIENTISTS LINK HOME AND CAMP IN WAR EFFORTS

Extending Assistance to All Men in Ways Not Otherwise Available, One of Missions.

CHRISTIAN SCIENCE camp welfare work is being carried on in 45 camps in the United States under direction of the Christian Science war relief and camp welfare committee of The First Church of Christ, Scientists in Boston. There are about 70 men and 15 women engaged in this work, the women serving mainly as welfare room attendants.

Conducted at first independently, the camp work has been merged with the war relief work which Christian Scientists were doing in foreign countries before the United States entered the war. For both these purposes about one million dollars have been raised.

Christian Science camp workers aim to be helpful to all the men in the camps, and particularly to give assistance which may not be available through any other or better welfare agency. A feature of this phase of the work is an arrangement for keeping soldiers and sailors in close touch with their relatives.

Cooperating with the committee in Boston, there is a camp welfare committee in each state. The committee in the home state of a soldier or sailor cooperates with the committee of the state in which he is camped to form a link between the soldier or sailor and his relatives. This linking of home and camp combined with the personal attention of the Christian Science workers, has frequently been the means of changing a soldier's outlook from gloom to joy, and has relieved relatives of financial embarrassment, the committee in the home state making loans for use by relatives until their boy in camp should be prepared to forward money to them.

In numerous camps, the committees have erected buildings, with quiet places for reading and rest, and a recreation is included in the equipment of the workers at each camp.

Dr. Brougner Will Preach to Veterans

Dr. J. Whitcomb Brougner has promised a "soul-thrilling" service for Sunday evening, when he was to deliver his famous address on "The United States versus Kaiser Bill," or "American Ideals in Iron Clothes." This will be an intensely patriotic service, to which all members of the G. A. R. are invited. This is considered one of the finest sermons ever delivered by Dr. Brougner.

The Grand Army people and their friends are also invited to attend the services at the First American church Sunday evening. Dr. J. Alexander Jenkins of Chicago is to speak on "The Crucial Service of the Grand Army of the Republic."

Miss Ethel Shea, who was a member of the Temple quartet when Dr. Brougner was pastor, will sing at both services. In the morning she will sing "Paxa Face" and in the evening "When the Boys Come Home" and "Shadows."

Mrs. Ketter having also preached in England.

Believing that it is the duty of the clergy to help as much as possible during the war, Rev. Mr. Ketter has accepted a position as floor manager in one of the Portland department stores so as to release some younger man for war work. Rev. Mrs. Ketter will attend to the pastoral duties during the week and preach Sunday evenings. Mr. Ketter is to preach Sunday mornings.

CENTENARY TEAM WILL SPEAK HERE ON AUGUST 30TH

"World Wide Plans for World Wide Methodism," Slogan Giving View of Responsibility.

BIG AMOUNT TO BE PLEDGED

Effort Will Be Made to Instill Highest Degree of Efficiency in Home and Foreign Missions.

A TEAM of Centenary speakers, headed by Harry Farmer, returned missionary from the Philippines, and assistant secretary of the board of foreign missions, will present at Portland August 30, the Methodist school of theology in Manila. For its purpose the conservation of the results of the war. Mr. Farmer was formerly president of the Florence B. Nichols school of theology in Manila. Rev. J. M. Canse, district superintendent of the Bellingham, Wash. district, and Rev. J. E. Crowther, pastor of the Methodist church in Seattle, will also speak.

"World wide plans for world wide Methodism" is the slogan of the centenary program which will present to the Methodist church of America a bird's-eye view of the spreading responsibilities of Methodism for the next 100 years. A nation wide campaign is on foot to rouse the Methodist program which has for its most prominent mission a consciousness of what their church is doing in the missions field.

Roused by the world's need for a constructive program to counterbalance the waste and destruction of the war, the Methodist Episcopal church South and the Methodist Episcopal church will hold common celebration for the first time since their separation in 1847.
