War Time Cookery

A Modern Convenience—Refined sugar used to be a great luxury. At the time of Queen Elizabeth it was a novelty. Today some people use it but little while the United States consumes more than any other nation except England. It is our national flavoring, and we have come to regard it as the only material to make many foods more savory.

Now we face a sugar shortage. The first and only solution to many is the elimination of candy. But candy utilizes a comparatively small percentage of the supply, and is one of the easiest subjects for substitution. The important and tremendous use of sugar is for flavoring. Since households are the principal users, they must be the principal savers.

At once the housekeeper encounters a difficulty. On every hand there is the stubborn assertion: "I can't eat it without sugar. There is no advantage in keeping the bowl in the sideboard if the result is that some member of the family declares that the food tastes flat. As a matter of fact, very likely it does. Food must be palatable if the family will eat as it should. But why remind them that the food is prepared with less sugar? The real trick is to find something else for flavoring.

"Combine the more tasteless foods with others. Combine them with sugar containing products. For the refined sugar is only one form of sugar—our favorite because of its convenience. Sorghum, syrups, molasses, honey and maple products may be used to replace sugar. The two latter are inaccessible to people except in restricted localities, because of scarcity and price. Fruits may be used in combination with the syrups. When you make a rice pudding, use no sugar, but add raisins or currants to help out the syrup. With tapioca, put in dried apples or apricots or some other flavoring fruit.

A syrup for breakfast cakes and corn bread can be made by adding some of the sugar to the fruit juice to the prepared syrups.

Sweetness is not the only flavor that we enjoy. We have accustomed ourselves to it but now that there is not enough wherewith to sweeten, we shall have to become used to the real flavor of foods—and often that natural flavor is surprisingly good.

But while we use sugar for the sake of taste, it also serves as food. To replace the food value of the sugar we should eat increasing amounts of other foods rich in starch, as cereals, legumes and potatoes.

Whenever the housewife prepares a meal these days, she must use her ingenuity.

NATIONAL GUARD NOTES

While one regiment of national guard has been authorized in Oregon, it is known that a second regiment will not be refused recognition. If sufficient interest and enlistments are shown the second regiment will follow the recognition of the first. Owing to there having been a Fourth Regiment, O. N. G., some years ago, it may be that the new regiment will be called the Fifth Oregon.

One of the three battalions of the regiment will be in Eastern Oregon cities. Some even hope to see a part of still another regiment made up of separate companies in southern Oregon and persons in the county in which would enable a brigade to be established.

Company C, Oregon State guard, is over the top and ready for mustering in as part of the national guard. It had 116 men on its rolls Friday night. It will accept 20 more because of the expectation that a number will shortly go out on the next selective draft.

Right of Judge to Seek Office Tested

Olympia, Aug. 17.—(U. N. S.)—J. Stanley Webster, who recently resigned from the Washington state supreme court to run for congress from Eastern Washington, must appear before the supreme court on August 23 and show why a temporary order restraining the secretary of state from placing Webster's name on the primary ballot should not be made permanent. George Chandler of Spokane, who obtained the temporary writ, affixes the state constitution to bids a judicial officer running for any office, except judicial, during the term for which he is elected. Webster was elected to the supreme bench in 1916, qualified the following year, and resigned May 11 of this year, although his six-year term has not yet expired.
