

8 BILLION MARK GAINED BY MAKERS OF REVENUE BILL

Ways and Means Committee Has Adopted Tentative Measure to Raise Funds to Conduct War.

McADOO'S VIEWS PASSED UP

Question of Excess Profits May Be Reopened if Secretary Decides to Appear Again.

Washington, Aug. 17.—Chairman Kitchin announced at the close of today's session of the ways and means committee that at least the \$8,000,000,000 figure has been reached in the draft of the revenue bill which the committee has tentatively adopted. Of this sum, it is estimated that the 80 per cent tax on war profits will yield \$2,600,000,000 and the excess profits tax \$500,000,000, or a total of \$3,100,000,000 from the profits of corporations and organized business.

The remainder of the total amount of revenue will be raised by the income and inheritance taxes and the special excise taxes on luxuries, beverages and tobacco.

McAdoo's Plan Rejected
Chairman Kitchin's estimate was made, however, in the face of the fact that the committee is still in disagreement with Secretary McAdoo and other officials of the treasury department in the matter of the excess profits rates. The committee stubbornly refuses to yield to Secretary McAdoo's recommendation that the rates on excess profits should not be increased above the figures in the present law. Its calculation of the amount the bill will raise is based upon higher rates of excess profits than will be acceptable to the treasury and which are likely to be modified to accord with Secretary McAdoo's views.

Way Open for Compromise
Mr. Kitchin left the door open for further compromises with the treasury by making it plain today that the rates have not been adopted by the committee. They have been suggested to the treasury as a compromise between the present rates which are demanded by Secretary McAdoo and the 20.50 and 80 per cent formerly agreed to by the committee. The treasury has been asked to give an opinion on them and experts of the department are now at work attempting to find out how the rates would work. Mr. Kitchin stated that he believed the 40 to 60 per cent rates suggested to the treasury by the committee would yield \$1,000,000,000 more than the rates in the existing law and at least \$200,000,000 more than the rates previously adopted by the committee.

Not more than one in 100 corporations assessed under the excess profits rates would have been caught in the 80 per cent class in the rates which the committee previously agreed to," Mr. Kitchin said. "On the other hand, 90 per cent of them will fall in the class making 20 per cent net income on their capitalization, and will, therefore, pay 60 per cent."

McAdoo May Appear Again
"Under these war profits and excess profits which we have recommended to the treasury, if properly enforced, the law should yield no less than \$3,000,000,000," Mr. McCoy, the committee's actuary, estimates that the yield will be nearer \$3,400,000,000.

A report from the treasury on the committee's recommendations is expected next Monday. Secretary McAdoo may find it necessary to appear again before the committee to make plain his reasons for asking to have the excess profits taxes unchanged.

gan: "We, the jury, find Carl Ahl-teen"—they followed the other 99 names—"guilty as charged."

Officers herded the defendants together at once, taking them to the county jail, where they are to remain in custody. One defendant, Albert Prashner, is in a hospital and did not hear the verdict.

Defense Makes No Comment
Frank K. Nebeker was called from Salt Lake City almost one year ago to investigate the I. W. W. Department of justice officials recalled a record established by him years ago in cleaning up a horse thief gang in Utah, and drafted him for what it believed an important work, Nebeker's chief assistant was Claude R. Porter, Des Moines, who also spent almost an entire year in the work.

"I'm satisfied with the verdict," said Nebeker. "It was a long fight, but the government refused us no reasonable sum for prosecuting the case." Beyond stating that Judge Landis' instructions had been eminently fair, attorneys for the defense made no comment.

All Sorts of Men Among Convicted
Together with "Big Bill" Hayward, secretary of the I. W. W., and one of the defendants, they slapped some glum looking defendants on the back. "Back up," they advised the downcast ones, "it'll come out all right."

The defendants had been gleaned from every section of the country. There were lumberjacks, copper miners, harvest field workers, cooks, marine and textile workers and others.

Among the best known was "Big Bill" Hayward, general secretary of the I. W. W., and known for his part in labor controversies heretofore. He was one of the principal witnesses in the prosecution of the defendants. His fencing with prosecuting attorneys occupied two days on the stand.

Oregon Man Among Defendants
Another leading defendant was "Third" Hall, Doran, I. W. W. orator from Tacoma, Wash. His green eyeshade was a spot of color in the defendants' box throughout the trial. Others were Vincent St. John, reputed wealthy miner from Arizona; Forest Edwards, of Minneapolis; Ben Fletcher, Philadelphia; Jack Law, of Pittsburgh; James Rowan, of Spokane; Sam Scarlett, Akron, Ohio; Albert Prashner, Chicago, and Ben Schragner, of Oregon.

Training Camp Gets Taste of Real War

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MARCH INDICATES 150,000 MEN ARE ON WAY TO FRANCE

Tells Committee 1,550,000 Are in American Camps; in Last Report There Were 1,700,000.

1,450,000 NOW IN EUROPE

Situation in Russia Is Very Bad, Is View of Chief of Staff; Expects Defense on Old Line.

Washington, Aug. 17.—General Peyton C. March, chief of staff, at his conference with members of the senate military affairs committee today announced that the United States had 1,450,000 men under arms overseas and 1,550,000 under arms in camps in the United States.

The last official report was that 1,700,000 men were in camp in the United States. The statement today would indicate that 150,000 troops are on their way to France and verifies the statement from a high official quarter that the United States, armed forces in France will amount to 1,600,000 men by September 1. General March also told the senators that there had been little change on the western front since their last conference and that German resistance to the allied and American thrusts appears to have stiffened.

Situation in Russia Very Bad
The situation in Russia as viewed by General March is very bad. It is so mixed up that it is well nigh impossible for observers to get a clear line. From the allied standpoint there is no change in the matter of landing troops or giving assistance to the people of Russia in resisting German encroachments and influence.

General March was able to give the committee encouraging reports on the improvement of the health of the army. The present average yearly death rate is but 2 per cent or 20 in the thousand. Constant improvement is being noted both in camps and field service.

Another encouraging report from General March was that the shipping situation as affecting the movement of troops and military supplies was good and constantly improving. A recent survey showed that the turn-around or round trips of transports and cargo ships was being accomplished in faster time than hitherto achieved.

There are many instances where transports have made the round trip in 15 days and the average round trip of transports is now accomplished in 25 days. Cargo carriers have made the round trip recently in 23 days, but the general average is higher. The speeding up of the troop and cargo ships is due to improved port facilities, both in the United States and France, and the transport of the army will be constantly bettered as the movement of troops progresses.

Old Line Defense Expected
In his subsequent interview with the press General March went into detail about the situation on the western front and drew the conclusion that the Teutonic armies are consolidating their retreat to the old Hindenburg line, where

the allies are meeting strong resistance, and that the next great battle of the allies and Americans against the Kaiser's forces will be an attack along the general alignment that the Huns now seek to establish.

This statement by General March is accepted as the best conjecture of the battlefield of one of the world's greatest conflicts. All the detailed information revealed by the chief of staff points to rest and preparation for the decisive struggle which may be near at hand.

General March renewed his statement made to the senate military affairs committee that there will be at least 80 American divisions or 3,600,000 men of all arms and capacities under a united command on the western front by June 30, 1919. Of actual combatants he said there will be on the firing line, or in touch with it, at least 2,200,000 American troops.

Commenting on cabled press reports about inhuman treatment of American prisoners by the Germans, General March said that "no testimony has been received by us that American prisoners of war have been singled out for any treatment different from that which all the rest get."

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NEW 'TWENTY-ONERS' TO BE REGISTERED ON NEXT SATURDAY

Every Man Who Has Reached Majority Since June 5, Without Exception, Is Included.

Next Saturday is the day on which every young man in the United States, who has attained the age of 21 years since the fifth day of last June, must register for the draft.

Under the proclamation issued by President Wilson last week, citizens as well as non-citizens must register, only those in the military or naval service being exempt.

The purpose of this registration at this time of the men who have passed his twenty-first birthday is to keep class 1 filled until congress can pass the manpower bill now pending.

No excuses will be accepted for failure to register. Those who fail to reg-

ister will be punished by imprisonment up to one year and immediate induction into the service. Sickness is no excuse for failure to register. Those within the limit set down under this call, who are ill, should make arrangements to register with their proper local board. Those who are out of town should proceed at once to the local draft board nearest the place where they may be and receive instructions regarding registration with their proper board by mail.

The local draft boards will be open from 7 o'clock in the morning until 9 o'clock in the evening for the purpose of registering these men. The location of the local boards in Portland and Multnomah county are: Division 1, 315 Morgan building; Division 2, 414 Pittock building; Division 3, 403 Corbett building; Division 4, Stevens building; Division 5, Seeling building; Division 6, Stevens building; Division 7, 501 courthouse; Division 8, 500 courthouse; Division 9, Stevens building; Division 10, St. John, Dr. Gilstrap's; Division 11, 222 courthouse.
