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RECIPE OF ALL DOCTORS PLANNED

Volunteer Medical Corps to Classify Physicians for Service at Home and Abroad.

Washington, Aug. 19.—(WASHINGTON BUREAU OF THE JOURNAL)—Every reputable doctor in the United States who holds a degree from a legally chartered medical school, women included, may find his or her place under the organization of the volunteer medical service corps, which has been worked out by the Council of National Defense.

The general plan is to obtain a record of all physicians who are not in active service of the government and make a classification which will add in quickly filling any calls that may come, either for service abroad or at home. Until now there has been little difficulty in securing doctors and surgeons as they were needed, but this condition is not expected to last.

In this way it will not only be possible to supply the army, the navy, and the public health service promptly, but to keep a record of the reserve for all sorts of service. The plan is to have a camp, for example, or in some large city, the government would know where to turn without disturbing the balance elsewhere. It is planned to provide insurance, which will be provided by the government, and to insure that doctors not in uniform of their willingness to serve the country.

The ultimate result will be to place in the medical reserve corps those who will be fit for active service and who are needed for it, and to place others, legally qualified as physicians, in the volunteer medical service corps, which probably will consist of two grand divisions: one of reserve and the other of active service. The other composed of those who from age or disability are qualified only for civilian service.
