Four-Year-Old Boy Loses Life
When He Falls Into Swiftly
Running Water at Home.

Pendleton, Or., Aug. 20.—News has been received here of an accident at Milton, Saturday afternoon, when the 4-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Peller was drowned in an irrigation ditch. The ditch runs through the yard of the Milton home, and it is presumed the boy fell into the water, which is swift while playing. His body was found a half mile below the home during the afternoon.

Bunch then sped up, and as a result his car hit a light spot in the macadam road and turned completely over, pinning the two occupants beneath it. Mrs. Armstrong, aside from a few bruises, was unhurt.

STARVING AUSTRIANS EAT WEEDS

LONDON, Aug. 20.—Turnips, sick dog costing \$25 form the chief food for the great bulk of Austria-Hungary's population, according to a comprehensive review of the economic situation in the dual monarchy by a frontier correspondent of the Daily Express. Thousands of deaths occur weekly as a result of underfeeding or actual starvation. The economic situation in Germany is described as almost equally bad.

A few ounces of indigestible bread, weeds and nettles, called "pinhead substitute," constitute the daily diet for which tens of thousands of men, women and children are scrambling. Factories are idle. The workers are not the strength to work.

Mail trains are besieged by mobs of half-starved villagers begging and fighting for a few crumbs from the tables of the dining cars. The daily press print many columns of advertisements inserted by starving citizens. A feather bolster is offered for 10 pounds of flour; baby clothes and table linen for drippings, a winter jacket for a couple of eggs.

Brazil Will Have Fleet of Airplanes

Washington, Aug. 20.—(U. P.)—Brazil has ordered large numbers of airplanes including many heavy bombing hydroplanes, from Italian aircraft plants, it was announced Monday. The opinion here is that the republic is laying plans for protection from submarines off her Atlantic coast. Some of the hydroplanes evidently are to be used in the Mediterranean in conjunction with the operations of Brazilian battleships.

Karl Can't Be Polish King, Disappointed

Paris, Aug. 20.—(I. N. S.)—Emperor Charles returned to Vienna from the "two-kaiser" conference in Germany in very ill humor because of his failure to make himself king of Poland, according to advice received here. Young Charles is said, had hoped to persuade the German kaiser to this scheme in order to dazzle the Austrian people with an apparent quasi war success.

Call Out for 5709 Army Specialists

Washington, Aug. 20.—(I. N. S.)—Provost Marshal General Crowder today issued a call for 5709 selective service men for general service as mechanics, automobile drivers and other specialists to enlist September 1. The men will be allowed to volunteer after August 26. Nineteen states are called upon to furnish the men.

Woodburn Crusader Is Slain in France

Woodburn, Or., Aug. 20.—Word today reached Mr. J. H. Zimmerle of this vicinity of the death of their son, Private George Zimmerle, in France on July 19. He left here as a member of Company I and later was transferred to this class of men drawn in the draft, sent to the front, where he was killed in battle. He was a native of Woodburn.

Objectors to War To Work on Farms

Tacoma, Aug. 20.—(U. P.)—Twenty-one conscientious objectors, the first to leave Camp Lewis on agricultural furloughs, ordered by the war department for this class of men drawn in the draft, were ordered to report to three Seattle farms today. The employers will pay \$5 a month and board for each man.

**Scottish Union Asks
New Mooney Trial**
Sacramento, Cal., Aug. 20.—(U. P.)—Governor William D. Stephens received a c-blegram today from the conference of the National Union of Scottish Mine Workers in Edinburgh, Scotland, protesting against the sentence of death imposed on Thomas J. Mooney and requesting that Mooney have a new trial immediately.

Two Collisions in Few Hours Occur In Dallas Yards

Dallas, Or., Aug. 20.—Two collisions of trains in the local yards of the Southern Pacific occurred within a few hours Saturday, resulting in the demolishing of several cars and delay of traffic, but injuring no one. The motor car from Falls City collided with a locomotive of logging train, and the local freight train, entering the yards on a down grade, ran into some empty cars of a logging train from Black Rock.

Empey Explains Loss Of Army Commission

New York, Aug. 20.—(I. N. S.)—The revocation of his commission as a captain in the United States army was explained here Monday by Arthur J. Empey, author of "Over the Top," when he made public a letter received from Joseph Tumulty, secretary to the president. The letter said the commission was withdrawn when orders were issued against enlistments. It added that the action of the war department was in no way a reflection against Empey, and stated that there was no reason why he might not receive a captaincy should he enter the army by ordinary process and by his work commend himself for promotion.

California Sugar Allotment Shrinks

San Francisco, Aug. 20.—California's sugar allotment for September shows a large shrinkage from the quantities allowed commercial users and for household consumption during August, but an additional 2,500,000 pounds is allowed for home canning and preserving. On the basis of two pounds to a person the September allotment barely will cover the state's needs, and rigid conservation will be necessary to stretch the available supplies to cover the period up to October.

U. S. Red Cross Gives \$200,000 to Belgium

Paris, Aug. 20.—(I. N. S.)—The American Red Cross today gave to the queen of Belgium \$200,000 for use of the Belgian Red Cross. Colonel E. P. Bicknell, Red Cross commissioner for Belgium, acted for the American Red Cross in making the gift. A number of notable officials were present.

Los Angeles, Aug. 20.—(U. P.)—Warrants charging several employees of the Union Oil company with conspiring to defraud the company out of \$75,000 worth of oil in the last three years were issued here Monday.

TRENCH IN OPEN IS DUG DIRECTLY UNDER HERR HEINIE'S NOSE

American Sergeant Overcomes
Obstacles and Point Is Won;
Lieutenant Is Promoted.

With the American Armies in France,
July 14.—(By Mail.)—A certain American general wanted a support trench dug across a flat spot in an American sector. The trench would be two miles long.

Ordinarily it would have been easy to dig. This time it wasn't. German guns dominated the place and the first night's work would be followed by a heavy enemy barrage which would cost American lives. The general and his staff officers were discussing the problem. An engineering sergeant was with the group as a guide. He could hardly control his interest in the work. Finally he had to cut loose.

"I beg your pardon, sir," he said, "it's not military for me to speak, but if I'd have that two miles of trench in the morning before the Heines know it."

The general smiled and asked the sergeant how he would do it. The sergeant was ready with an explanation. That night a sergeant was in charge of a thousand men, or rather, his plans were being followed. The thousand doughboys went out after dark.

When the sun rose the German look-outs from the hills and observation balloons opposite, looked down on a band of new trench stretching two miles across a flat spot dominated by their guns.

The Boches in amazement threw over a barrage. But it was too late, for the diggers were gone and the doughboys in the trenches were safe in dugouts. Incidentally, it might be said, a certain sergeant is now a lieutenant.

Huns Admit Loss Of Air Supremacy

Washington, Aug. 20.—(U. P.)—The German command admits the loss of air superiority, on the military advice from France, stated Monday. Official military documents taken from German prisoners and bearing the seal of the German command, mentioned the lack of sufficient air facilities to cope with the French, British and American air forces, and ordered infantry units to stop appealing to the aerial command for protection against air raids, but to combat the raids with machine guns and anti-aircraft artillery.

Seven More Yankees Cited for Bravery

Washington, Aug. 20.—(I. N. S.)—Seven more Americans have been cited for valor on the west front. General Pershing reported in his communique this afternoon. They are: First Lieutenants H. C. Moleberry and Charles C. Rentfro, Second Lieutenant Carl C. Rice and Privates Theodore Pitticoudis, Jefferson Holt, George Holley and Charles Raffington.
