WOUND RECEIVED BY

OHIO VETERAN GIVES

UP METAL 11 TIMES

E. R. Montfort, Encampment

Victor, Is Past Commander in Chief of Veterans.

One of Ohio's most honored representatives at the G. A. R. convention in Portland is E. R. Montfort, a past commander in chief of the great veterans organization. He enlisted in the Cincinnati Guthrie Gray regiment, formed before the war, and which at the outbreak of the war, became the Sixth Ohio. Later he was transferred to and given a commission in the 75th Ohio Infantry.

While his regiment was repelling one

of the tiger-like charges of the Confederates at the battle of Gettysburg, the then youthful officer, was struck by a shell which drove a section of his sword and scabbard deep into his leg, almost pulverizing the bone near the hip. At 13 different times since then, pieces of metal have been taken from the old wound, the last souvenir of the conflict having been removed in 1911. "When I reached Portland the driver of the machine which met me was a man named O'Gara," said Past Commander Montfort.

"I asked him if he had ever heard of

Thomas O'Gara, who was a member of my company, but he had not. "In one of our fights, we were badly outnumbered and the Hun began to break and retreat.
