TRIP UP COLUMBIA HIGHWAY TO BE FOR G. A. R. DELEGATES

Event Is Not for Visitors, But
for Those Who Have Been in
Prior Business Session.

No Portland persons except the drivers of the automobiles taking the G. A. R. delegates up the Columbia highway Friday will be permitted on the trip, declared Frank McMillan, executive secretary, today.

"We do not want a driver and three Portland women to appear and take one delegate," he asserted. "We want one driver and three delegates, or as many as the car will hold. Furthermore, this is the day for the delegates, and not for the visitors who have had opportunity to visit the highway while the delegates have been in business session. To this end, no one will be admitted to the Bonneville grounds without a ticket. These tickets are to be given out by the adjutant general of the G. A. R. and by the national secretaries of the various women's auxiliaries."

Plans are being made to accommodate 2000 delegates on the trip. Another boat has been pressed into service, and the three boats, the Georgiana, the Kellogg and the Dallas City, will leave the dock at the foot of Alder street promptly at 7:30 a. m. Automobiles will leave the Multnomah hotel, and no other, at 9 o'clock sharp, and only the driver will be permitted in the car.

"We want every car we can get for this purpose," said Mr. McMillan. "We have 500 more delegates than we expected to care for."

Mr. McMillan estimated that there were at least 20,000 visitors in the city.

Morning Meeting Centered in
Election of Chairman; Mrs.

The W. R. C. is closing its convention this afternoon with a busy business session, including final reports and the transaction of other business relative to closing up the affairs of a large national organization. Mrs. Eliza Brown Daggett of Attleboro, Mass., was elected president with 299 votes, the only other candidate being Mrs. Lue Stewart Wadsworth of Boston. She received 73 votes.

Mrs. Harriet Hendee of Portland, Mrs. Myra Bennington of Ritzville (Wash.), Mrs. Julia Killiam of Colorado and Mrs. Lida McKencher of Seattle, all retired from the list of candidates before the election. Other officers elected were: Senior vice president, Mrs. Lida McKencher, Seattle; junior vice president, Mrs. Minnie T. Horseman of Portland; treasurer, Mrs. Estella Plopper, Iowa; chaplain, Mrs. Minerva Botkin, Missouri. At this morning's session interest centered in the election of chairman of the national executive board. The candidates were Mrs. Hattie B. Onyette of California and Mrs. Annie Triplov of Idaho. Mrs. Onyette was elected, receiving 193 votes. Mrs. Triplov received 138 votes. A feature of the morning was the extending of greetings to Mrs. Cora M. Davis of Union, Or., a past national president, who was late in arriving. A representative of the Daughters of Veterans extended greetings from her organization and presented to the president Mrs. Knauff. The important matter to come up this afternoon is the report of the resolutions committee.
