## WEATHER CONDITIONS

High pressure prevails in the Northern Rocky Mountain and Northern Pacific states and over most of the country east of the Mississippi river. Elsewhere the pressure is low, the lowest readings being in Minnesota. Precipitation has occurred at a few stations in the extreme Northwest and in parts of South Dakota, Nebraska and New York. The weather is much warmer in Eastern Washington and much cooler in North Dakota. The temperature is abnormally low in Northern Nevada and abnormally high in the upper Mississippi valley. Apple Crop Fair—Advisers from Lewiston, Idaho, indicate that apple packing in that section will begin early in September. The status of the crop cannot yet be determined but a hard fight has been made on pests and it is believed that this work will be reflected in a larger percentage of marketable fruit. The season has not been entirely favorable for apples and it is not expected the high standard of last year will be surpassed.

Meeting at Commons—Special meeting at the Portland Commons mission, 22 Front street, to be conducted by the B. Y. P. U. of the East Side Baptist church this evening at 8 o'clock. Rev. L. S. Chapman will speak on "Power of the Lord in the Father."

Pay for National Guard—When a national guard organization meets with certain requirements and the state laws are in accordance with the federal regulations, a private receives about \$3.75 a

month for attending drill regularly, and officers more. As Oregon's laws do not conform with the federal law as regards the appointment of officers and some other minor matters, it is considered probable that until the legislature takes appropriate action the new O. N. G. men and officers will give their time and services purely from patriotic motives. The pay allowed officers under federal requirements does not pay for their uniforms.

Old Gentleman Injured—A light automobile belonging to the purchasing department of the city "came north on Broadway at an unnecessarily high rate of speed and ran down an old gentleman at Broadway and Alder streets Wednesday," according to the report of Officer Mallon. The man gave his name as W. A. Taylor of 602 Yeon building and the driver of the car, Charles Emery, 467 East Harrison street. The police will report the accident to the commissioners.

Reprimanded Man Strikes Policeman—Patrolman C. H. Parker reprimanded a man for failing to remove his hat when the flag accompanied by the old veterans' life and drum corps, passed him Wednesday night. Selles struck the policeman and was arrested. The policeman went to the emergency hospital for treatment. In default of \$250 bail Selles was placed in jail to await this afternoon to a charge of assault and battery.

Portland Man Honored—At the national meetings held in Chicago recently Portland was honored by the election of Dr. Herbert C. Miller of the North Pacific college as president of the National Association of Dental Faculties. This is the first time a president has been chosen from any of the states west of the Missouri river, and is recognition of the work being done by North Pacific college.

Three Arrested on Suspicion—Three late arrivals from California were arrested by inspectors Craddock and Swensen Wednesday evening in a crowd of people in front of the Liberty temple and were lodged in the city jail. The men gave their names as Earl Mohan, Walter A. Abbey and Abe Barnard. They are being held for investigation and will be tried before the municipal court this afternoon.

Lost Sultane—While A. Brown and family were riding in their automobile near Lyle, Wash., several days ago, a sultane jolted off and fell to the road, not being noticed until the party made camp. Someone on the way to Missoula, Mont., picked it up. Mr. Brown afterward learned, but was unable to return it to them. The Browns are now at the Northern hotel in this city.

Alleged Forger Arrested—George Robinson, 22, was arrested Wednesday by inspectors Goltz and Howell and is being held for investigation. It is charged that he entered the Western Salvage company at 22 Front street a few nights ago and hid away in the subcellar, and after the store was locked that he

smoked into the office. He is then said to have stolen four blank checks from the office book, and, after placing the company stamp and performing mark, to have left the place. A bogus check for \$35 was cashed at a local clothing store, which brought about Robinson's arrest.

Suit to Cancel Patent—Assistant United States Attorney Beckman Wednesday filed suit in the United States district court to cancel the patent to 320 acres in Lake county originally issued to Calvin S. Stone, who was recently convicted of perjury. Stone is now serving his sentence in the Multnomah county jail.

Regains Consciousness—Maurine Stille is reported much better at Good Samaritan hospital this morning. She has regained consciousness and has told her nurse how she happened to fall 125 feet at Rocky Butte on Tuesday afternoon. Her condition, however, is still considered serious.

Liberty Bond Stolen—A \$50 Liberty bond was stolen from the room of Gus Nelson at the Ohio hotel Wednesday, according to his report at police headquarters. Mrs. G. G. Onthank, residing at Wellington Court, reported the theft of several pieces of jewelry.
