

NEW CHANNEL TO BE USED FOR NEXT PEACE OFFENSIVE

Secretary of Bohemian National Alliance Believes Huns Will Use Hungary and Bulgaria.

TRY TO SPLIT CZECH-SLOVAK

Support of Independent Bohemia Likely to Be Promised, Leaving Hungary to Deal With Slovaks.

New York, Aug. 23.—(U. P.)—That the new peace offensive of Germany will be launched through Hungarian and Bulgarian channels, was the opinion expressed here today by Vojta Beneš, of Chicago, secretary of the Bohemian National Alliance of America.

"Hun leaders believe that the only way left open to them after the Clemenceau disclosures, have destroyed the usefulness of the Austro-Hungarian government as a peace intermediary, is to send out peace feelers through what will be camouflaged as anti-Governmental and anti-German parliamentary authorities in Hungary and Bulgaria," he said.

"This should be all the easier as political corruption in both countries makes it customary for the government to utilize groups of the opposition as its disguised agencies."

"Also a peace move directed from Budapest and Sofia could lean for support on the power of the friends in this country of Hungary and Bulgaria, who now disguise their propaganda behind protestations of unflinching loyalty to the United States."

Concerning the activities of Magyar propagandists, Beneš expressed the opinion that, instead of attacking the Czech-Slovak claims in their entirety, Hungarian agents, he said, will now try to stir up discussion between Czechs and Slovaks by approaching the former with promises to support the plan of an independent Bohemia against Austria with the implication that Hungary should be left alone to deal with the aspirations of Slovak irredentists.

An article published here was referred to as indicative of the Magyar scheme. "The most interesting feature of this article is that it speaks of Czechs all the time, and does not mention the Slovaks," G. M. Milks, director of the Czech-Slovak Press Bureau, said here today. "Whether the omission was accidental or intentional, the inference is obvious. But we Czech-Slovaks should have only a contemptuous smile for insinuations of this kind."

"We may conquer or we may perish, but whatever happens, we shall stand together in the struggle for world democracy."

O. COLISTRO ANSWERS DR. C. VISETTI WITH REGARD TO VISITORS

Letter of Former Italian Consular Agent Brings Reply Concerning Reception.

Portland, Or., Aug. 23.—To the Editor of The Journal—Under the caption "Dr. C. Visetti Makes Statement on Appointment" you give your readers a letter from a Dr. C. Visetti, dismissed consular agent of Italy, in which the doctor complains of the absence of "real Italian representation" in the committee in charge of the reception of the commission of Italian newspapermen now touring the United States, under the auspices of the United States bureau of public information and due to arrive in Portland August 29.

The doctor is in bad faith, for I, myself a member of the reception committee, have already notified the presidents of the Italian societies of Portland of the impending visit of our compatriots, calling upon them to arrange a suitable reception of the visitors by the Italian colony.

It is obvious that one should read "Visetti" where the doctor refers to the apparent slight of some unnamed Italian representative. He should not complain. A man who edits a sheet such as the doctor edits, a sheet which in every issue contains vitriolic and anarchistic attacks against the Italian government and the dynasty of Savoy in an effort to stir up discontent, which would naturally reflect on the Italians' willingness to help carry on the great struggle; a Bolshevik of the purest water, whose patriotism has been challenged before the postmaster general of the United States, is not wanted in any committee of the Italian colony. He is ostracized until proofs of his devotion and patriotism to the government of the country in which he lives have been demonstrated beyond the shadow of a doubt. A knock to Italy is a knock to her ally, America. Up to the present time the evidence is against him.

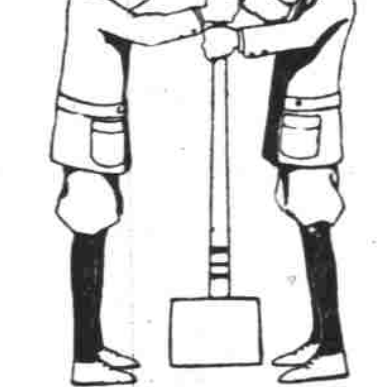
