OREGON GUARD NOTES

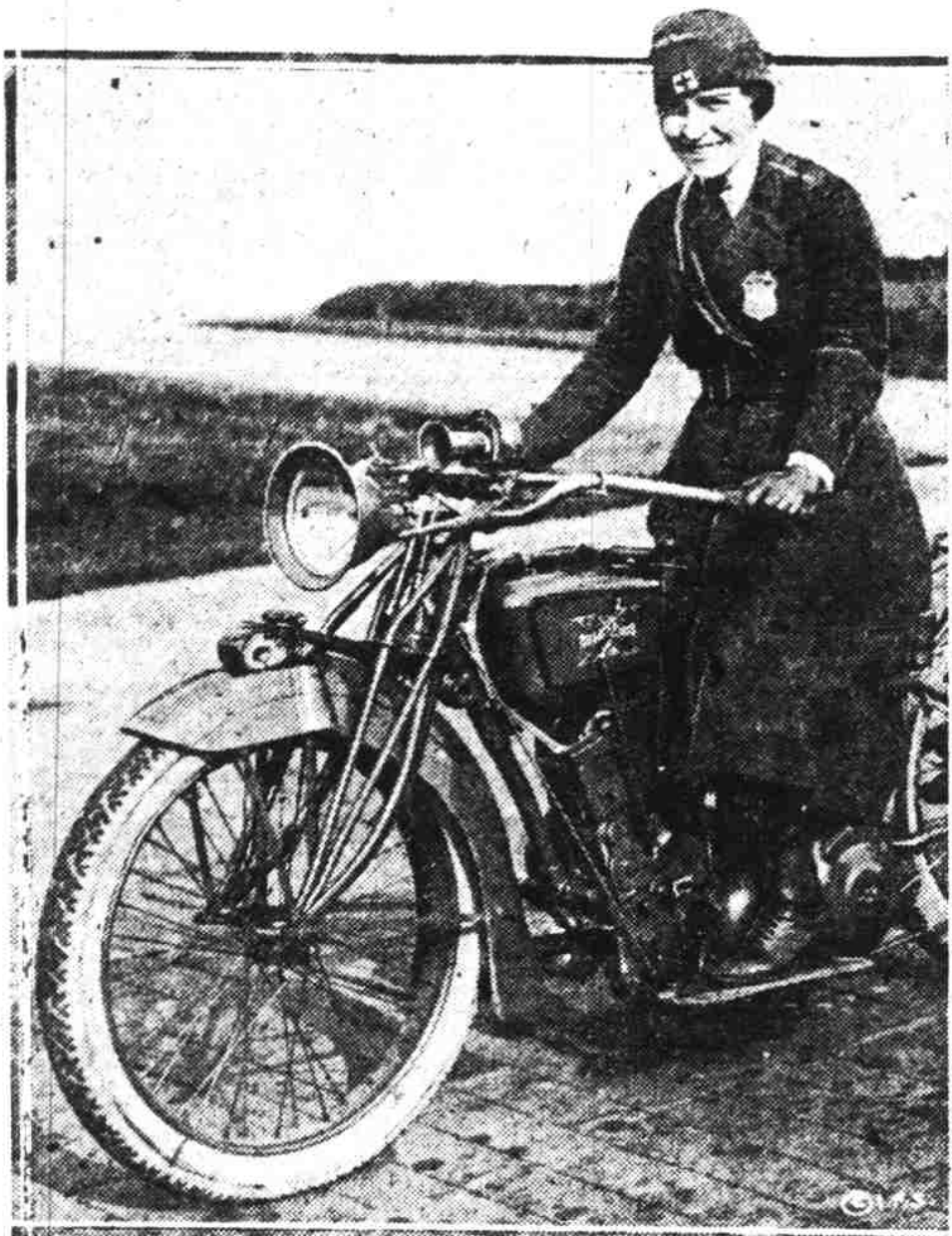

Expect Freight Solicitors Will Be Reinstated

Recognizing the value of the service rendered shippers by freight traffic solicitors under the old regime, the United States railroad administration is again employing men to act in an advisory capacity to small shippers and lines under government control. It is understood that several men formerly employed as traffic solicitors of railroad terminal lines will soon be reinstated on the staffs of various traffic departments.

Advices received from R. H. Ashton, regional director for the Northwest, state that the future of the traffic department as a necessary function of the railroad organization depends upon the efficiency of service rendered and explains the work required of it by the railroad administration. The traffic department must maintain close connection with the public and explain to shippers generally the purposes and achievements of the administration. They are also required to investigate and adjust rates, with due regard for net revenue results, and must endeavor to secure new traffic business by developing natural resources and broadening market conditions.

The department is required, too, to study and forecast business conditions in anticipation of traffic needs. Shippers and most economical routes must be chosen for all freight shipments.

Back in 1898, on September 1, Mr. Monroe gave a concert in the Portland opera house with an old style phonograph, using the records he himself made, taking in \$400 in one hour and 40 minutes.

This veteran began to do his part to save the Union at the age of 15 years, when he enlisted as a drummer boy. "Now, after I have been away from Portland for 14 years, it seems just fine to be back here," he says, "where things are moving and the climate is to be appreciated."
