POST-SEASON SERIES IN SHIPYARD LEAGUE PLAYED AT VAUGHN ST.

The game promises to be a hard-fought contest, as each team still has a chance to win out over the St. Helens club. The losers will be eliminated from any chance of getting into the running for first place.

Manager Casey of the Cornfoot team will pit Pitcher Sutherland against the Vancouver team and Herman Pilette or Krause will hurl for the Standifer aggregation.

All games of the post-season series between the Foundation club and the winners of the championship of the second half will be played on the Vaughn street grounds. The first game will be played Sunday, September 8. The following Sunday, a double header will be played and if necessary a doubleheader will be played the following Sunday.

The winners of the championship of the league will clash with an all-star aggregation representing the league or with the Vancouver barracks team, which is composed of a number of former league players, including Gene Dumont, former twirler of the Washington Americans.

A charge of 50 cents for general admission will be made during the championship series.

\$3000 HELD TO STEEP BY BEZDEK

Coch Releases Oregon From Terms; Contract Depends on Status of Athletics.

EUGENE, Or., Aug. 28.—Hugo Bezdek, who was reported in press dispatches of yesterday as having been appointed physical director at Pennsylvania State college, has not been lost to the University of Oregon and football coach, although he has tendered his resignation as head of the university department of physical training.

Bezdek wired his resignation from the directorship of the physical training department several days ago, at the same time stating that he would release the university student body from its contract to retain him as football coach at a salary of \$3000 per season. The university authorities, although questioned several times since the receipt of Bezdek's telegram, gave out no intimation of his resignation.

Depends on Training Camp
Graduate Manager Dean Walker announced today that whether or not the student body would release Bezdek from his contract depended almost entirely on the status of the physical training department. He said that the university authorities are to be extensively curtailed under the provisions of the S. A. T. C. act.

Hayward to Take Place
If Bezdek does not return, William Hayward will automatically succeed him as head of the physical training department, according to announcement made at the university today. This provided that Hayward does not accept the offer just made him to go to Italy or France as an athletic director of the Y. M. C. A.

Pending further information regarding the status of athletics during the coming year no arrangements are being made to secure a football coach to replace Bezdek. If his request to be released from his contract is accepted, it is regarded as probable that Walker will direct the destinies of the Oregon eleven if athletics are resumed.
