

SALEM TO GET MORE THAN \$1,225,000 FOR 1918 CROP OF PRUNES

Crop to Break All Willamette Valley Records; Green Prunes Are Shipped East.

Salem, Aug. 29.—This year's prune crop will break all previous records for this section of the Willamette valley, according to Robert Paulus, manager of the Salem Fruit union. He predicts that the prune crop will bring into Salem alone more than \$1,225,000 this year. The crop is so heavy that the prune growers cannot take care of it, and for the first time in a number of years dozens of cars of green prunes are being shipped to the eastern markets. In the past, the Idaho prunes have largely supplied the eastern market with the green fruit, but this year the Idaho crop was cut from 1900 to 1800 carloads to about 100 carloads by a late frost in May, so the Oregon growers are profiting by a strong demand for their prunes. The Salem Fruit union is receiving prunes from the growers day and night. The loaded wagons are lined up at the packing house at all hours of the day and night. Manager Paulus declared that every carload of green fruit that was shipped was just that much saved, as it would go to waste if it were necessary to depend on the dryers. Since last Thursday night 30 carloads of green prunes have been shipped by the union, and the run will continue for another week. Ten thousand bushels of prunes were received at the union packing house Tuesday and Wednesday. Manager Paulus says there will also be an enormous pear crop this year.

Power of \$1 to Buy Food Takes Big Drop

Washington, Aug. 29.—(I. N. S.)—The purchasing power of \$1 in the food market during the last five years has shrunk to 54 cents in Washington and Baltimore, 57 cents in Philadelphia, 58 cents in New York and Chicago, and 63 cents in San Francisco, according to figures made public today by the department of labor. The period that saw the greatest advance in the cost of food, the figures show, was from July, 1917, to July, 1918.

Bathers, Caught in Whirlpool, Are Lost

Lexington, Ky., Aug. 29.—(I. N. S.)—Miss Elizabeth Vaughn, 17, of Los Angeles, and her uncle, C. H. Lehman, freight agent of the Chesapeake & Ohio railroad at Ashland, are dead here today. Miss Vaughn was caught in a whirlpool while bathing in the Little Sandy river. Lehman lost his life trying to save her.
