

CZECHS MOBILIZE WHEN RECOGNIZED BY GREAT BRITAIN

Amsterdam, Aug. 29.—(U. P.)—As a result of British recognition of the Czechs, something like general mobilization is proceeding in the Polish, Czech and southern Slav districts, according to a dispatch to the Weser Zeitung. Hostilities between these people and the government are expected shortly. It is believed British recognition made possible the coordination of these elements.

"We must reckon with an organization comprising all the southern Slav districts," declares the Weser Zeitung. "Serious things are being prepared in Bohemia. It is significant that, simultaneously with British recognition of the Czech national council appealed to the population that it was time they should pass from words to deeds."

China to Make Bid For World Trade Following the War

Washington, Aug. 29.—(U. P.)—China expects to participate in the after-the-war struggle for world trade, consular reports here today disclosed. Announcement is made that an official Chinese commission has recommended an expenditure of from 40,000,000 to 45,000,000 taels, to convert the Wanchow pool at Shanghai into a lake, with equipment that would make it probably the world's foremost harbor.

Already China has numerous shipyards in which vessels are being built for the United States. It is suggested that these yards will turn out a Chinese merchant fleet later that will bring back the long dead sea prestige of the ancient people. Also, the war has brought many modern manufacturing establishments to China that will assist her in providing cargoes for her ships.

Miss Rankin Refuses To Concede Defeat

Butte, Mont., Aug. 29.—(U. P.)—Although Miss Jeannette Rankin refused early today to concede her defeat by Dr. C. M. Lanstrum in the race for the Republican nomination for United States senator, others predicted Lanstrum would win by 3000 votes. Miss Rankin carried Butte and Silver Bow county by 512. Lanstrum will oppose Senator Walsh in the final election. With Miss Rankin eliminated, it is predicted the so-called progressive element will support Walsh, who will also have the support of President Wilson. Walsh also is counting on the labor vote.

Hun Spy Arrested By Police in Geneva

Paris, Aug. 29.—(By Agency Radio to the U. N. S.)—Elmer Knopka, a German spy, has been arrested by the Swiss police at Geneva, for sending girl spies into France to learn the location of headquarters of American troops. The Swiss police also discovered the Knopka was rifling the mail of French soldiers interned in Switzerland.
