Yarn Lack Puts Stop to War Service

Good Record Made in Portland by American Committee for Devastated France.

AFTER conducting with marked success the Victory yarn booths for the sale of service wool in the three large department stores, the Meier & Frank Co., Olds, Wortman & King and Lipman, Wolfe & Co., the American committee for devastated France has ceased its activity along this line on order from the government, which finds that it is necessary to conserve the limited quantity of wool for use in the manufacture of uniforms.

The sale of all service yarn in the city was taken over about six months ago by the American committee, of which Mrs. Robert Treat Platt was then chairman and of which Mrs. William H. Skene is now chairman. Mrs. J. A. Curry was general chairman for this branch of the committee's work and a successful plan was worked out by making one organization for a corps of saleswomen to be on duty all day in two and three hour shifts. Later two women assumed the responsibility at each of the three stores for the entire day. During the existence of the Victory booths thousands of dollars' worth of wool was sold, the largest sale at a single store in one day being \$28.

The committee is deeply indebted to the management of the large stores who gave absolutely free floor space and service in the way of wrapping paper, twine and the service of the cash system, and at Meier & Frank's a trained saleswoman's services were also placed at the disposal of the committee for many weeks.

It is a matter of great regret that this activity had to be abandoned, as its returns, which were substantial, enabled the committee to send generous checks to France to care for the sick and homeless, the old people and the children, who after a German invasion were left absolutely destitute with families divided and starvation staring them in the face. The help rendered by the American committee and kindred organizations. Just what means will be taken to secure funds for further work have not yet been decided upon.

Chocolate Cake

1 cup liquid
6 tablespoons fat
1/2 cup sugar
1/2 cup molasses or syrup
2 eggs
2 ounces chocolate
1/2 cup barley, or 1/4 cups oatmeal
1/2 teaspoons Crescent Baking Powder
