

SUPREME COURT WILL DECIDE CALIFORNIA RACE FOR GOVERNOR

Rolph, Registered as Republican,
Wins Democratic Nomination
and Can't Run, Is View.

San Francisco, Aug. 30.—The tangled muddle of the gubernatorial contest of California, held Tuesday, is to be appealed to the supreme court, according to announcement made today by Democratic leaders, and a conference for this purpose has been called by Gavin McNab.

Returns from the election show that Governor William D. Stephens won the Republican nomination by approximately 20,000 votes, and Mayor James Rolph of San Francisco captured the Democratic nomination from Francis J. Heney by 20,000 votes, but Rolph cannot run because he is registered as a Republican and he failed to get the Republican nomination.

Heney Admits Defeat
Heney, from his home in Los Angeles, Wednesday stated that he had been defeated by Rolph and that his defeat for the nomination eliminated him from the November contest. Heney considers Stephens elected. He does not intend to contest the action of the voters.

McNab, as spokesman for the Bourbon forces, holds that while the law may technically prohibit Rolph or Heney from going into the finals, he cannot believe such condition is right morally, and he holds to the opinion that such construction of the law is an indictment of popular government. McNab said:

"Mr. Rolph solicited and accepted the Democratic nomination. The Democrats voted for him on the state's prepared ballot. If the courts declare him the nominee, he cannot in honor do otherwise than run. If he is not the nominee and the courts declare that Mr. Heney is, then Mr. Heney must run.

Supreme Court to Decide
"It must be the desire of all fair-minded men, regardless of party affiliations, to insist that the expression of the people's will should be observed. Immediate steps will be taken to have the supreme court determine the law. I shall ask for an immediate conference of all concerned."

Rolph, running for the Democratic and Republican nominations, received more votes than he needed, and the Rolph supporters are already actively boosting their candidate for the finals in November. Rolph or Heney could defeat Stephens in the November election. It is held, but Rolph seems to be the more popular of the two to make the race against Governor Stephens, who is claiming his election at the primaries.

Rolph's Views Not Known
The amendment to the primary law passed by the last legislature, which prohibits a candidate registered in one party from running as the candidate of another party if he fails to win the nomination of his own party, was put through by Henry Hays, Democrat, after a lively tilt on the floor of both houses. Stephens' supporters claim the Democrats have none to blame but themselves for the present predicament of the party.

Rolph, so far has not issued a statement and his views upon the situation are not known. Democratic leaders plan to submit the matter to the supreme court as early as possible and until that tribunal has acted, the Democrats will remain in a quandary.

Labor Demand Is Heavy
Astoria, Or., Aug. 30.—Frank M. Hanlin, local government employment agent, has a long list of vacancies to be filled. Lieutenant G. W. Cuthbertson

Celebration of the twentieth wedding anniversary of Lieutenant and Mrs. G. W. Cuthbertson of San Francisco, which was a Portland event August 25, was given added importance because the lieutenant will soon leave this port as chief engineer of one of the new \$800 ton steel steamers of the United States naval reserve.

Lieutenant Cuthbertson has already had an extensive experience in overseas voyages. Since last May he has been in the Atlantic service on a United States armored cruiser. In that capacity he has crossed the Atlantic ocean a number of times, and it was on his ship that the United States commission, which included Colonel House, Admiral Benson and General Bliss, sailed for Europe to attend the allied conference. He was also in charge of one of the naval supply boats running between this country and Ireland, and was formerly chief of the United States immigration service of San Francisco, and chief of the federal customs house of that district. He taught in the naval engineering school at Hoboken before being transferred to duty in the naval reserve, and assigned to take out the vessel from Portland.

Lieutenant Cuthbertson is a native of California, and a graduate of Stanford university. He has two sons and two daughters, one of his sons having enlisted. While in Portland the officer and his wife are the guests of his brother-in-law, Herbert Bransford, cashier of the Supply-Ballin Shipbuilding company.

Service Suspends On Independence- Monmouth Road

Monmouth, Or., Aug. 30.—According to official announcement today, the Independence & Monmouth railway will discontinue freight, express, mail and passenger service until further notice. This is effective September 1. H. Hirschberger, president of the railway, has issued no explanation of the order.

The Independence & Monmouth railroad has long had the honor of being the shortest railroad of its kind in the world, and the traffic between the two towns has made from seven to 10 trains a day necessary. Astoria, Or., Aug. 30.—J. L. Cramer, general secretary of the local Y. M. C. A. organization, has resigned and will leave for La Grande, Or., where he has accepted a similar position with the Y. M. C. A. of that city.

Members of Draft Boards to Be Paid

Washington, Aug. 30.—(I. N. S.)—Secretary of War Baker and Provost Marshal General Crowder have agreed upon a basis of compensation for local and district board members ranging from \$50 a month for districts of 100 or fewer registrants to \$200 a month for districts of 6000 or more registrants. It was announced Thursday. In making this decision, he stated frankly that the compensation has been a minor consideration with these men and that it does not equal the value of their patriotic service to the country in the operation of the draft machine.

Provision Made for Loans to Industries

Washington, Aug. 30.—(I. N. S.)—An amendment to enlarge the scope of banks to war industries is about to be adopted by the war finance corporation. It was learned this afternoon. Under the amendment banks would be permitted to make loans to war industries by depositing with the war finance corporation 143 per cent collateral without further guarantees. This would remove the burden of large guarantees from banks. It was pointed out, and serve to minimize the number of direct applications for loans from war industries to the war finance corporation.

Patriotic Judge Gets Into Trouble

Milwaukee, Wis., Aug. 30.—(I. N. S.)—Civil Court Judge A. J. Hedding believes every man should work even though he takes a vacation from his regular occupation. STORY OF BRILLIANT AMERICAN ATTACK IS TOLD FOR FIRST TIME

Wearry Brigade Expecting to Be
Relieved Is Ordered Forward
and Captures Heights.

With the American Army in France, Aug. 29.—The story of how an American brigade, worn down by sheer exhaustion, stormed and captured the strongly fortified village of Berzy-le-Sur, south of Soissons, in an exceptionally brilliant attack on July 31, may now be told, since General Pershing awarded the distinguished service cross to Brigadier General Buck, making first public announcement of the fact that Americans occupied the town.

Though our storming columns beat down the German resistance and passed through and beyond the town, French colonials on their right were held up by bitter opposition and were unable to make progress. Consequently, our men were compelled to fall back from the perilous salient formed by their advance.

Scots Also Win Recognition
In accordance with the French policy of withholding the announcement of the capture of a town until it is reasonably safe against an immediate counter-attack, correspondents were not permitted to mention that we had occupied Berzy.

Several days later, when Scottish units who relieved us, went up and took the village again, they won special commendation from the French in an official statement. Berzy, lying a few miles south of Soissons, formed one of the bastions of support by which the crown prince hoped to hold up the allied offensive against the Marne salient, while he withdrew his men and supplies from the great pocket late in July.

Americans Greatly Exhausted
Probably no single position in the Soissons region was defended by more machine guns. Our patrols had already sounded out the formidable nature of the German defenses. American units had been going through terrific fighting for several days, pushing on under a hot sun through wheat fields thick with machinegun nests, and through woods and underbrush until they were so exhausted it seemed they had reached the limits of human endurance.

Finally word came that they would be relieved on the night of the 29th. The new rain along the front line where men were hugging shellholes under a heavy bombardment. They could not restrain their cheers.

Order to Attack Is Given
But two hours before the relief was scheduled to take place, came an order from the French corps commander countermanding the previous announcement. Instead of coming back to their billets, the Americans were ordered to attack Berzy early on the following morning.

Despite bitter disappointment, there was not a murmur in our front lines. The following morning, in the face of guns of German artillery fire, Buck's brigade pushed straight down the field with all the élan of fresh troops just arriving on the battlefield. They wiped out one machinegun nest after another, and captured the village which was their objective, and even pushed on a little farther. That night they came out for a badly needed rest.

Paper Is Suppressed
Madrid, Aug. 30.—(U. P.)—The newspaper Abc has been suppressed because it published a Berlin wireless dispatch regarding Germany's reply to the Spanish submarine notes.

TURKS BITTER AGAINST HUNS FOR NEGLECT

AMSTERDAM, Aug. 30.—Bitter anti-German feeling is prevailing through Turkey, according to advices received from Constantinople, due to the failure of the Germans to help the Turks regain Bagdad and Jerusalem.

A gloomy picture of the Turkish economic situation has just been drawn by the Ottoman minister of finance in the Turkish parliament. He is quoted as having said:

"The rise of prices for necessities in Berlin has been 124 per cent, in Vienna 175 per cent and in Constantinople 127.

"It is estimated that one-quarter of the population of the Ottoman empire has perished during the war. Mothers are surrendering their babies because the government is unable to feed them."

German Peace Drive Of Huge Proportions Is Due Next Winter

New York, Aug. 30.—(U. P.)—The coming winter will witness the greatest German peace offensive thus far launched, according to Florent Gibbons, war correspondent, who addressed the New York Press club here today.

"The next German peace offensive will be put out in most attractive form," Gibbons said. "It will be plausible and insidious.

"The offensive will not be launched through diplomatic channels. The Germans will try to create a sentiment in this country for peace."

Baltimore Comes To Front With Cash

Washington, Aug. 30.—(I. N. S.)—The largest advance subscription to date to the fourth Liberty loan was received by the treasury department this afternoon. It was from the city of Baltimore for \$1,000,000.
